Add One Thing More to Wonders of Radio

R. M. sends us the story of a young bride who asked her husband to copy of a radio recipe she wanted, says the Boston Transcript. He did his best but got two stations at once, one of which was broadcasting the morning exercises and the other the recipe. This is what he took down:

"Hands on hips, place one cup of flour on the shoulders, raise knees and depress toes and mix thoroughly in one-half cupful of milk. Repeat six times. Ruble quickly one-half teaspoonful of baking powder, lower the legs and make two hand-knobled eggs in a sieve. Exhale, breathe naturally and lift into a bowl."

"Attention! Lie flat on the floor and roll the white of an egg backward and forward until it comes to a ball. In ten minutes remove from the fire and rub smartly with a rough towel. Breathe naturally, dress in warm flannels and serve with fish soup."

Accidents of Nature

Great voices are rare and undoubtedly owe their wonderful plenty of tone to the incident of vibration of those physical characteristics which lead to the production of song. The human musical instrument, though built of living tissues, resembles in structure the reed organ pipe fitted with a vocal humana stop. In both cases the note depends on the vibrations of a column of air produced in the organ by a reed and in the voice by the vocal cords. The human air chamber corresponding to the organ pipe is composed of the larynx and the bronchial system beneath it. The throat, mouth and nasal cavities form the resonators which by vibration in lungs and sinuses are able to pick out and emphasize component parts of the fundamental tones produced in the larynx. The lungs form the bellows which produce the upward blast of air and upon their quality depends the voice.

"Kicking" Habit Strong

The tendency to kick on the part of a few suggests the chronic kicker and not the philosopher. "This chronic kicking can be better illustrated by a little story. A man was led to the electric chair. Before he was seated he was asked: 'Is there anything you would like to say before the death sentence is carried out?'

"Yes, there is," he answered with that sureness that comes from chronic kicking. "The man I killed for kicking my dog for biting him ought to be shot. My lawyer was a crook and it took three appeals and two repleves to break me. When I came here I thought I would get decent treatment, but you gave me a bed with bum springs, and the food has been fierce, and pointing to the electric chair, 'I'll bet that d—n thing don't work.'"

Fern's Long History

The fern is one of the oldest of land plants and its fossil remains are known to abundance from the Paleozoic era of geologic time. 100,000,000 years ago. Ferns were especially numerous during the Carboniferous period when hundreds of feet of their solidified remains were deposited to form the present-day coal beds, around which the industrial progress of modern civilization largely centers. Among the few living representatives of these very old types are the flowering ferns, a small but widespread group, and the Marattiaceae, which is now confined to a small number of species found only in tropical regions. In addition to these very old types there are today about 8,000 species of ferns known.

New Use for Masks

Gas masks of the type that protected soldiers during the World war were pressed into service by a crew of workers in London while hunting leaks in the city gas mains. The hazard of the job was increased by the necessity of working in deep trenches where vapors had insufficient chance to escape in case flows of considerable pressure were encountered. With the masks, the workers were able to make a thorough search.

Found Traces of Old Race

small children, yet these former husbands and parents, as appears from the record of twenty-four cases on the circuit court docket, to which I call your attention, have failed to comply with the order of the court, and many of them have failed altogether.

"The law exacts this support, which is in part directed by the degrees referred to. Failure to do so without a reasonable excuse is a felony and punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary of the state."

"I request that you investigate each of these cases to the end that you may ascertain the ability of these apparently dishonorable and unnatural individuals by reasonable effort to comply with these decrees and to present by indictment those who are not complying with the law. The district attorney will advise you relative to any question of law that may arise in regard thereto, and I call your inquiry may be referred to the court."
