WASHINGTON HAS \$2,000,000 FOR ITS UNIVERSITY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, Oct. 25.—With revenue of \$2,000,000 in sight for next year, regents of the University of Washington said here today that the faculty will be enlarged and a building program put under way.

The information concerning additions and improvements was gleaned when the regents adjourned at noon for lunch. "The university, regents said, will have more money next year than ever before in its history, though some expenditures will be pruned.

Some salaries are to be increased. It was said that the budget for the 1927-1928 biennium will be kept within a 1.47 levy passed by a special session of the legislature for the university over the veto of Governor Hartley and approved by the state supreme court. The promises a yield of \$1,700,000 and student fees, rentals and interest are regarded as sources for \$300,000 more.

Regents revealed that recommendation of Dean Thomson, acting president of the university, for 68 more teachers would not be approved in full, but that the policy would be to increase salaries rather than to put on men for special courses.

Beef tea which she drank before starting was drugged, her trainer afterward discovered.
"The first attempt I made I nearly went to sleep in the water," she declared. "Some one had put drugs in the beef tea I drank before starting. My trainer proved this beyond a doubt."

AMERICAN TO GET LETTERS OF MARY QUEEN OF SCOTS

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The Daily Sketch says a collection of letters of Mary, queen of the Scots, and of her son, James I. of England, probably will go shortly to enrich "the largest private library in the world, owned by an American in California."
A connoisseur, William H. Robinson of Newcastle, says the Sketch, acquired them from a Scottish castle where they had been for centuries. Letters written by James I are not rare, but few written by Mary are in existence. This collection is said to contain seven letters by Mary, including one signed jointly by her and her husband, the Earl of Darnley.

"Gland" Quacks Defeat Aims of Science

Gullible Rejuvenation Seekers
Eager Purchasers of All
Sorts of Nostrums

Declaring that the Steinbach method of rejuvenation of the human body by means of gland treatments has proved successful in a majority of cases, Hugh Fullerton, in an article in this week's Liberty, shows how it has been discredited in popular favor by the absurdly exaggerated claims of the "monkey gland" quack doctors. Explaining that the medical profession is bound to silence about the treatment until it has been proved to be absolutely successful, Fullerton says:

"Taking advantage of the enforced silence of the ethical physicians, the fakery have exploited the discoveries of Steinbach. Their activities have served to cast discredit upon the entire rejuvenification treatment through the endocrine glands.

"So bold have the charlatans become," the writer exclaims, "that one blatantly advertises that Dr. Steinbach has abandoned his methods in favor of the one proposed by the fakery. Another openly offers to supply chopped glands to medical men. In scores of drug stores they are advertising gland capsules, serums, and other nostrums. Others are pretending to revivify the human race by using everything from radium to psychic treatment.

"The 'monkey gland' story created prejudice against the whole idea of rejuvenation," the writer continues. "It was the creation of a reporter who confused laboratory experiments on animals with the treatment of humans, but it probably served to delay the development of the rejuvenification treatment and operation for years."

"To a lay investigator," Fullerton writes, after a careful study of the method and its results, "it appears that Dr. Steinbach missed the big opportunity. If he had advertised the treatment as a beauty restorer, he would have converted most of the feminine sex by this time.

"I found the women who had taken the treatment," the writer explains, "not so much interested in life extension as they were in the fact that their hair had become glossier, their complexions improved, the pouches gone from under their eyes, the cheeks rounded, and their legs more shapely."
