HEROIC SEAMEN STICK TO POSTS AS SHIP SINKS

heavy list. All but one of the life-
boats were smashed by the tempest-
uous waves.

Into this boat the 12 rescued
men sought safety. The steamer
wallowed in the heavy seas until
seven o'clock, when she took her
plunge to the bottom without the
men in the engine room and stoke
holes or the wireless operator mak-
ing an attempt to reach the small

boats.
The rescued men say they had
been for 17 hours with no water
and but little food when the Luck-
line picked them up. They assert
that while they were at the mercy
of the waves they were passed at
close range by a large steamer
which ignored their rockets and
other signals of distress.

Fe.

Americans Among Needy
Between 300 and 400 white
Americans or Canadians are ur-
gently in need of shelter. The
American relief committee in Ha-
vana is making strenuous efforts
to get tents to the sufferers.
It is believed that the first es-
timate of 32 fatalities on the is-
land, including 17 Americans, is
substantially correct. Relief work-
ers, however, have as yet been un-
able to reach Los Indios and all
points in the extreme western sec-
tion. None of the better known
American residents are more than
slightly injured. The majority of
the inhabitants are said to have
suffered some hurt.
Property losses are heavy and
aid is needed in the work of recon-
struction.

Tripoli Is Hottest Place
For years it has been supposed
that the world's hottest region, if
not its hottest spot, was at Green-
land ranch, in Death valley, Cali-
fornia, where on July 10, 1923, the
temperature reached 134.1 Fahr-
enheit. Now the world hears that in
Azizila, a town in Italian Tripoli,
North Africa, the people sizzle at
a temperature of 130 above. Azizila,
the well named, is a desert village
25 miles inland from the Mediter-
ranean. The people are poor and
live in underground dwellings, to
which sloping tunnels lead eight to
ten feet under the surface and
through small openings to cham-
bers hollowed from the conglomer-
ate rock. Something like a cellar
is required to keep cool, notwith-
standing until 1911 this region con-
ducted an almost continual war
with the Turks and Arabs on one
side and the Italians on the other.
No wonder Death valley is a pleas-
ant place compared to it.

Antique Drug Mortars
Many years ago a loan collection
of antique mortars was shown at
the New York College of Pharmacy
which was insured for \$25,000. The
most expensive mortar of the lot
was one lent by Enrico Caruso, the
tenor, who bought it from J. Pier-
pont Morgan for \$3,000.
At a recent sale in London a col-
lection of 50 bronze and bell-metal
mortars was sold at prices ranging
from \$1 to \$27 each. The highest
price was brought by an eleven-inch
mortar with two handles bearing
the inscription, "Thomas Castle,
Edward Neale made me, 1037,"—
Western Drugist.

The Domesday Books
When Queen Victoria came to the
throne the national archives were
scattered in about sixty places, but
by an act passed in 1838 they were
concentrated in the public record
office, which now contains records
of the chancery, exchequer, various
courts, and departments of state,
such as the treasury, home office,
foreign office, war office, admiralty,
board of trade and customs.
Amongst the principal exhibits
are the Domesday books, that are
the outcome of a general survey of
England ordered by William the
Conqueror at the end of 1085.—
London Answers.
