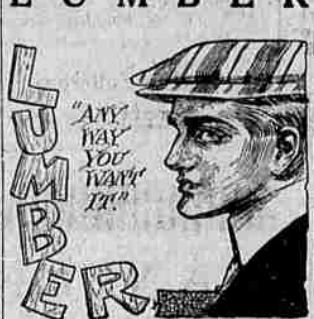
Leave for Portland—
