AN EXAMPLE OF SELFISHNESS.

The American people may not chase the almighty dollar as much as some would have us believe, and yet one can find many examples of gross selfishness in their daily conduct. The way many automobiles are operated is about as good an illustration of that as anything can be. The story of wrong automobile operation is not contained wholly in the ghastly record of accidents which is daily spread before the American people. [There are many drivers who never yet have had any serious accident, yet who are likely to at any time, and who are constantly displaying this coarse spirit in their relations to the public. Their attitude seems to be that it is everyone's duty to look out for them and to get out of their way, and if people have to jump a little to escape them and if they just narrowly escape being run over, then these arrogant folks do not care. If anything happened they might be able to find some minor respect in which these people had not showed perfect care, and think that that excused the driver. The public streets, however, are created for the common use of all the people, and drivers of automobiles do not have any mortgage on them or any understanding by which they have the exclusive and preferred right to operate in them. As they are capable of doing such terrible injury, they ought to be extremely careful that they keep their cars so under control that if anyone else is neglectful for an instant, as people can't help being at times, they can stop and avoid an accident. For these drivers to come tearing down a street as if they owned the whole highway and it was everyone's business to stay on the walks until they had passed, shows what a fundamental streak of selfishness runs through the public nature.

The attempt to foist upon the people of Oregon a system of "nuisance" taxes under the guise of a sales tax on cigarettes and tobacco should be given the stamp of disapproval at the November election, once and for all. Aside from any question of the merits or demerits of tobacco, or of the injustice of heaping an additional burden on the smoker, already heavily taxed by the Federal Government, a principle of taxation is involved on which the voter should not be misled. One of the basic principles of democracy is that the cost of government shall be distributed equitably over all the people in proportion to the benefit each one derives, and that no one person or group shall be required to pay for the support of others. A sales tax is the direct antithesis of this principle. Whether it be on tobacco, candy, or cosmetics, the effect is the same.

We don't know what will happen next in the nasty fight being waged in the senatorial contest in Oregon. It's going from bad to worse and the better citizenship of the state will be mighty glad when the ballot boxes close Tuesday evening.

Who said it was going to be a quiet election?

Some time ago a daily newspaper came out with eleven crime stories on its front page.

One man who read that array of misconduct threw the paper down and his hands up and declared that the country was going to what Sherman said war is.

At first glance such a crime-showing is discouraging, but on second thought it is not so discouraging. Eleven crimes among 110,000,000 people is about one crime to every 10,000,000 people. That percentage is not disheartening.

If you set 10,000,000 eggs and hatched all but one, you would think that a marvelous record. If you had 10,000,000 bites and caught a fish for every bite save one, you would think that a miracle. If you made 10,000,000 investments and had all but one succeed you could control the finances of the world. If you gave the telephone operator 10,000,000 numbers and she got only one wrong, you would think you had died and gone to Heaven.

Unlawful conduct—even as frequent as it is in the United States—is proportionately a rare thing. Were it not a rare thing newspapers would not put crime stories on their front pages.

It is because wrong behavior is uncommon that it makes good copy. Good behavior is the commonest thing in the world; therefore it attracts little attention. You don't find the columns of the press filled with stories about men who do not rob banks, cashiers who do not embezzle, people who do not kill other people, men who do not desert their wives, women who do not quit their husbands, chaps who do not beat their hotel bills, and men who do not handle their parents-in-law.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

DR. C. H. BAILEY TAKES EXCEPTION TO STATEMENTS MADE BY SENATOR EDDY.

Editor News-Review: In yesterday's News-Review appeared a letter from Senator Eddy urging Republicans to vote for Mr. Steiwer, so that the so-called present prosperity may not be interfered with.

I would like to ask every farmer in Douglas County to question himself how much of this prosperity has landed on his door step. While manufacturing interests have been well taken care of the past five or six years, what has the present administration done for agriculture? Agriculture means the farmer, and every farmer should stop to consider what this means to him personally.

The National Farm News has in its Washington office letters and telegrams from more than 35 Congressmen and U. S. Senators promising to support legislation that will lift agriculture to the plane of prosperity enjoyed by other economic groups in America, but the name of Mr. Steiwer nor that of Congressman Hawley appears in the list.

In fact, Mr. Steiwer told an audience at the Muddy Creek Grange fair last month that the salvation of the farmer depended upon "hard work and co-operation." Do you as a farmer want to work any harder than you do now? Congressman Hawley is in this class, being the only Oregon member of Congress, with the exception of Congressman Crumpacker of Portland, to vote against the McNary-Haugen Bill.

Senator Stanfield and Mr. Haney have both promised to vote for farm legislation, if elected, as in fact every candidate in Oregon for congress or both tickets has so promised, with the exception of Steiwer, Hawley and Crumpacker.

Senator Eddy also stated that Mr. Adams, private secretary to Senator Stanfield, was the power that put over the bill which will lower your taxes about 25 per cent, or was it Congressman Hawley? A prominent Republican has told me that Mr. Adams has been forced to introduce the bill to reimburse the land grant counties, and if Mr. Eddy does not know this fact, he is not being taken into the confidence of his party. I suppose if Senator Eddy gets his school bill through the next session of the Legislature his secretary will be responsible for its passage. Such arguments that a private secretary is responsible for legislation, are ridiculous, and if Mr. Adams had any gratitude in his make-up, he would not desert the man who raised him from a job of selling auto tires to the position of private secretary to a United States Senator. He would be a better sport if he sunk or swam with Senator Stanfield.

I want to urge the farmers of Douglas county to vote for their own interests, just as other classes do, and a vote for either Mr. Steiwer or Congressman Hawley will be a vote in opposition of placing agriculture on an equality with other industries. In Illinois a tradition magnate contributes to both old parties; in Pennsylvania Mr. Mellon, the chief adviser of the President, boasts of spending millions to obtain the nomination of Senator Pepper without a protest from the White House, while in Indiana the mess is just as bad or worse.

When the morning newspaper in Oregon can practically read out of the primary every candidate for U. S. Senator but its own, with direct primary in our state is a dead letter, if Mr. Steiwer is nominated, and an assault on the direct primary is on all over the country. It costs the bosses too much to nominate its men by this method, and the information as to cash outlay is too apt to reach the people. Do you want to see your privilege of nominating candidates by the direct primary taken away and this power placed in the hands of a few politicians?

Let's forget the party fetish. Neither the Republican nor the Democratic party has done anything for agriculture, though a plank on this subject has been in both party platforms for the past two campaigns. And neither old party, as a party, intends to do anything for you, provided they can keep you in line by such arguments as Senator Eddy puts forth. Our only salvation as an industry, and the only method whereby the average farmer will come into his own is by voting for candidates who will promise to give you an even break. Neither Mr. Steiwer nor Congressman Hawley has promised to do this.

VOTES FOR STEIWER URGED

Editor News-Review: With your permission I would like to tender a few facts and ideas of mine regarding the senatorial situation in Oregon with particular reference to Douglas county.

To begin with I will make the assertion that it would have made little, if any, difference what senator—Stanfield or Steiwer—had the latter been senator and seeking re-election he would have had the land grant tax propaganda to work with irrespective of what senate committee appointments he held.

The seniority rule stuff regarding committee appointments we hear so much about of late, is largely a myth. I would more readily believe men are appointed on them who can be controlled by the different party leaders.

Anyway what does the tax refund sum in the aggregate amount to the Republican party in comparison to the election of a Democratic senator, particularly now.

breaking faith with his party in coming into the senatorial race. I certainly do. The senator must surely know he will not be elected. Well then! What is his object in competing? Revenge, spite or what?

Independent candidacy may be all right but not by one who has taken his chances at the primaries and been defeated.

If we want a high classed citizen—a man whose character is beyond reproach we will certainly vote for Steiwer. Besides we want to consider this fact: That Stanfield can't be elected and that we would only be throwing our franchise to vote for him, and that if we give him any great number of votes neither will Steiwer be chosen, and a Democratic senator will occupy the position. Another thing; it seems to be doubtful at this time whether or not the Republican party will have a good working majority in the next congress, if Oregon Republicans don't want unintentionally to contribute to such a result by being the indirect means of electing a Democratic senator, by electing a split vote they will to a voter cast their ballot for Steiwer. A very large majority of voters invariably vote the primary ticket and I am doubly sure they are not going to make an exception this time, but it is going to take every Republican vote to be certain. You recollect even ex-president Roosevelt was defeated when he ran independently against ex-president Taft and as a consequence the Democratic party carried the presidency.

If we go to sleep and let this happen it will be goodbye for some time to any government favors in the way of appropriations for our Douglas county projects, etc.

So let every Republican—female as well as male—voter in Douglas county come out and place their vote for Steiwer and by so doing avoid the stigma that could otherwise easily attach to the Douglas county division of the Republican party as stated above.

The reason I emphasize Douglas county so strongly is because Stanfield seems to have little favor in any other part of the state. Vote for Steiwer and you will not be sorry. MARKET RATINGS

 PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 28.—Butter and egg prices are now on the downward trend in the local dairy market, following price declines in other coast markets. Egg receipts still continue moderate and no severe slump is anticipated. Butter receipts are increasing and with the heavy surplus holdings throughout the country further declines would not be unexpected.

For the day all grades of eggs are posted a cent lower on the dairy exchange with extras now down to 45c, first 45c and pullets 37c. Peewees dropped two cents to the 25c level and current receipts remained unchanged at 45c.

Other coast markets have declined this week with San Francisco and Los Angeles, two of the principal markets, now down to 50c and 53c respectively.

In the butter list extra and prime first cubes declined a half cent to 40c and 38c respectively. Other grades remained unchanged.

Milk unchanged; best churning cream 42¢43¢ per pound net shipper's track in zone 1. Cream delivered Portland 44¢ per lb. Raw milk (4 per cent) 22¢ cwt. f. o. b. Portland.

Poultry steady; less 5 per cent commission; heavy hens 25¢26¢; light 16¢; springs 21¢25¢; pekín white ducks 24¢; colored, 15¢17¢; turkeys, live 32¢34¢; dressed 43¢44¢ lb.
