HIGH MOROCCAN WEDDING MARKED BY USUAL RACKET

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MARRAKECH, Morocco, Oct. 29.—Oriental splendor surrounded the wedding ceremonies which united Mohammed, son of the sultan of Morocco, to the daughter of El Glaoui, Pasha of Marrakech and the most powerful lord of the Atlas district.

The religious ceremony was held yesterday. The royal bridegroom, escorted by hundreds of magnificently caparisoned horsemen, rode into the palace, where his father, the sultan, and the bride waited. He entered to the crash of thousands of rifles and the cacophony of mingled native and European bands.

As the party disappeared within the walls, the gates were barred, for the long and elaborate ceremony must be held in strictest privacy.

Outside, on the vast parade grounds, another scene was taking place. The famous black guards kept back the immense and enthusiastic throngs, while, after wave of horsemen executed intricate maneuvers. This continued until everything was obscured by the dust and the waiting daylight.

It was the climax but not the end of the rejoicing which began last Sunday, for at night the fetes especially reserved by tradition to the women folk were inaugurated. About 10,000 women residents entered the palace walls, there to sojourn and feast for ten days.

The bride and bridegroom are not participating in the festivities at the palace together, Moslem law requiring them to remain away from one another in the day time for seven days.

There was great rejoicing among the sultan's subjects when he offered wedding garments to all those desirous of following his son's example by taking wives.

Today those who accepted the offer were promanaging the town attired in long heavy trousers and big sleeved shirts with large open collars, a costume which they believe will assure a harmonious married life and the advent of children within a year.

WALLA WALLA TO CLOSE FOR STADIUM DEBUT

WALLA WALLA, Oct. 29.—Two hundred and twenty-nine business concerns, theatres and both golf clubs will close Saturday from 1:30 to 6 o'clock for the dedication of this city's stadium field and stands and the annual football contest between Whitman college and University of Washington.

DEMOCRACY MUST BANISH DEMAGOGUE SAYS DR. A. B. HALL

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 29.—Declaring that the public frequently regards more quickly to passion and prejudice than to reason and logic, Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon, told teachers of eastern Washington here today that the worst menace to democracy today is the demagogue.

"An examination of many persons over long periods has shown us that very often the intensity of a man's convictions are in proportion to his ignorance of the matter involved," Dr. Hall said.

Illustrating the use of suggestions, tests show that most people

form their opinions by reference to cartoons or headlines and not to the editorials or the body of the news story.

"By using such words as socialism, bolshevism or anarchy or tyranny the established phrase comes into play. You can get people to vote against anything they don't understand. In flattery of the public, the demagogue finds the public to be faultless and all ills of public life due to the boss or machines of the opposition party. As a matter of fact, the boss of a machine represents what the people have chosen."

"The solution to the problem of the demagogue is to train people in the habits of intelligent political behavior, so that they won't forget the fundamentals of intelligent conduct in the heat of the campaign."

AIMEE DISCLAIMS CLOTHES FOUND IN ORMISTON'S TRUNK

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 29.—Aimee Semple McPherson, Angelus Temple evangelist, whose preliminary hearing on conspiracy charges ended yesterday, today positively denied that any of the gowns and women's wearing apparel found in Kenneth G. Ormiston's trunk in New York belonged to her. She characterized as "ridiculous" any intimations that the apparel was hers.

Mrs. McPherson also bitterly denounced those who would connect the clothing found in the trunk with her and defied authorities to prove that any of the expensive robes, gowns or dainty lingerie ever were her property. Mrs. Minnie Kennedy mother of the evangelist, and co-defendant in the conspiracy charges, seconded Mrs. McPherson's denials.

After her emphatic statement the evangelist became jocular.

"It doesn't affect me in the least," she said. "They seem to have found a lot of expensive garments in Ormiston's trunk, and it is to be expected that the authorities would immediately declare the case solved. The clothing is not mine, and furthermore I know or care nothing about it."

While Mrs. McPherson was denying any knowledge of the clothing in the trunk, District Attorney A. J. Keyes, who claims that the discovery of the clothes "solves" the McPherson case, sent a strand of hair found in a boudoir cap in the trunk to the University of California at Berkeley for examination and analysis by E. O. Heinrich, twenty member and authority on hair. Several strands of Mrs. McPherson's hair accompanied the specimen, Keyes announced.

This strand of hair, found in Ormiston's trunk, was forwarded to Keyes by air mail and the trunk with its contents is now on the way to Los Angeles.

Keyes made public a list of the contents of the trunk, which follows:

A lace bodice can, containing a single strand of reddish hue hair. A silk evening dress, red with grayish lavender collar and lining. An expensive and ornate evening gown, bearing the notation that it was imported by a Los Angeles store. It is of yellow gold cloth with cold mesh head trimming. A black beach cap and a blue flannel cape.

A light blue and white two piece dress. A black evening dress, covered with black jet scales.

Two head pieces of brilliants. One has imitation pearls at the side, the other a single pearl in the center.

A pair of black satin pumps, showing considerable wear, with buckles.

TIMBER EDITOR THINKS SIBERIA NEEDS OUR HELP

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 29.—

George M. Cornwall, editor of the Timberman, Portland, predicted here today in the annual meeting of the Pacific coast logging congress that young American foresters "may find themselves" crossing the Pacific to Siberia to assist the Russian people economically to

harvest their timber crop. L. T. Murray, Tacoma, chairman of a study committee, reported that "several of the patented spark arresters in use do not meet the standard of service essential in good fire protection."

On the program were P. Z. Caverhill, chief forester of British Columbia, and Major L. R. Andrews, secretary of the British Columbia Foresters' association. Registration reached \$60.

"Tremendous changes," remarked Cornwall, "have been marked in the world's history since purchase of Alaska and particularly in the evolution of Russia. The Russian timber crop is probably the greatest in the world."
