

To The Voters of Douglas County:

Is Senator Stanfield entitled to ask or expect from the people of Douglas County support of his INDEPENDENT CANDIDACY for election as United States Senator? We believe that he is not, and submit for your consideration the reasons for our belief

(1). Senator Stanfield's one outstanding work in his six years as United States Senator was his support of the O. & C. tax bill. For his work on that bill we frankly concede him great credit. The fact remains, however, that he was able to do real service in that work because he had a committee appointment given by a Republican administration and had Republican support. He also had the organized support of the state of Oregon behind him.

Stanfield held his committee assignments because he was elected as a Republican senator. There is considerable doubt as to whether he can hold those committee appointments if he is elected on an Independent ticket.

(2). Senator Stanfield made a solemn promise before the primary election that he would not be a candidate

at the general election if he was defeated at the primary election. He has violated that promise and his stated reasons for so doing are not sufficient to entitle him to any consideration.

(3). The primary election law of Oregon will be violated and outraged and become of absolutely no effect if defeated primary candidates are not required to comply with the primary law.

(4). Gratitude to Senator Stanfield for one outstanding public service in six years of service should not outweigh these other considerations.

(5). We will elect a Senator to serve the state and not as an evidence of personal gratitude. Service such as Oregon needs can only be rendered by a Republican Senator who can hold committee appointments under a

Republican administration and secure that administration's co-operation.

(6). We, who supported Senator Stanfield at the primary election, asked for his nomination as a Republican candidate. Had he received that nomination, he would have had the full co-operation of the Republican organization in Oregon and in the United States Senate. Having failed to secure that nomination, he has lost the right to expect the Republicans of the state of Oregon to support him in his Independent candidacy.

(7). FREDERICK STEIWER, BY VIRTUE OF HIS NOMINATION at the primary election, is morally and legally entitled to the full support of the Republican Party of the state of Oregon. That support should not go to help the personal ambition of Senator Stanfield, to the detriment of the welfare of the state of Oregon.
