Surprising Finds Made in Australian Caves

Astonishing finds have been made in the Wellington (Australia) caves, which include fossil remains which have been identified as those of the marsupial lion, an animal which combined the pouch of the kangaroo with the general characteristics of the African lion. Few specimens of the remains of this marsupial have been found in recent years. It has been described as one of the fiercest and most destructive of predatory beasts known to naturalists. Other new discoveries in these stalagmite caves have been classified as those of the diprotodon, an animal of the kangaroo type, but immensely greater in bulk than a full-grown rhinoceros. The fossils indicate an animal with an enormous head and a thick, strong neck, extremely large, chisel-shaped teeth and well-marked fingers and toes. The foot structure shows that these animals or their immediate ancestors were tree-climbers, the big toe being placed nearly at right angles to the others in order to enable it to obtain a grip as it mounted.

Bishop Has Honor as London's Patron Saint

One of the earliest bishops of London was St. Erkenwald, whose "festival" occurred recently. He was a Londoner born and bred, so it was only fitting that shortly after his death, which took place in 663, he should be acclaimed London's patron saint. St. Erkenwald restored the first St. Paul's cathedral, and was buried within its walls. In 1163 London was partly destroyed by a great fire that burned old London bridge and a portion of the cathedral, but stopped at his shrine. Pious folk professed to regard this as a miraculous intervention of the dead saint and from thence on his tomb became a place of pilgrimage. Many of them brought rare and costly gifts, so that in course of time Erkenwald's magnificent tomb was ablaze with precious stones.—Chicago Journal.

Really People's Bank

Napoleon I headed the list of stockholders, with 30 shares in his name, when the Bank of France was founded in February, 1800. It was constituted in the form of a joint stock company, with a capital of 30,000,000 francs, at that time about \$6,000,000. The Bank of France differs from other central banks in that it deals with private individuals. It makes loans as small as \$1 and the law requires it to do so. In an ordinary year before the World war the institution made 247,735 loans in sums not more than \$2 and of the 8,900,000 separate bills discounted at Paris in one year, 4,804,000 were for amounts less than \$20, says the Albany News. It is the bank of the people. Peasants and millionaires look upon it as their own.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

IF BOB STANFIELD IS "WET" STEIWER OUGHT BE "SOAKED"

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 30.—Editor News-Review: Why all this chatter about Bob Stanfield being "wet" and Steiwer "bone dry"? The court records of Umatilla county, published in the Portland Telegram of Wednesday, October 27, having been supplied that paper by Joseph K. Carson, democratic candidate for congress, is conclusive proof that Mr. Steiwer's "dry" proclivities are not one ounce better than Mr. Stanfield's. If the present senatorial struggle is to be fought out on a "wet" and "dry" issue, where shall we look for a real "dry" candidate among the three aspirants. Surely Mr. Steiwer cannot claim adherence to the prohibition party. But in the face of the published records of Umatilla county, herewith reproduced from the Portland Telegram, the Anti-Saloon League of this state is putting forth every effort to defeat Senator Stanfield, advocating support of either Mr. Haney or Mr. Steiwer. Read the following statement of facts from the records of Umatilla county and see "whos who" on the "wet" and "dry" issue. Surely Mr. Steiwer is not the logical "dry" candidate:

Joseph K. Carson, Jr., Democratic candidate for Congress, in an open letter to Dr. Walter H. Nugent, declares that he furnished evidence to the Anti-Saloon League that Frederick W. Steiwer was not dry. Mr. Carson's letter follows:

October 28, 1926.

Dr. Walter H. Nugent, 922 E. Burnside street, Portland, Ore.

Dear Sir—You are quoted by the Oregonian of October 26, 1926, as saying that I appeared before the members of the headquarters committee of the Anti-Saloon League and was asked to furnish evidence that Mr. Steiwer is not dry. This you say, I failed to do.

I read to you a part of the transcript of testimony taken in the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Umatilla county in the case of W. R. Taylor vs. Harry Kuck. I quote this in full for your information:

Reporters Notes, Book 7, page 82.

E. F. B. Ridgway, being cross examined while a witness on the part of the plaintiff in rebuttal, by Frederick Steiwer, one of the counsel for the defendant, in the case of W. R. Taylor vs. Harry Kuck, in the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Umatilla county testified in part as follows:

Cross Examination By Steiwer.

Q—Had you been drinking that night?

A—No, you bet I had not.

Q—You never drink?

A—Once in a while I take a drink, just like you.

Q—You frequently drink the liquor you take in these raids, don't you?

A—No, sir, I do not.

Q—You never did?

A—No, sir.

Q—Do you give any of it away to your friends?

A—Yes, sir, I did once, to you.

Q—Are you sure about that?

A—Yes, sir.

Q—You never drink it yourself?

A—Yes, sir; I said I drink whisky.

Q—You drink liquor you take in raids yourself?

A—I have taken a drink of it, yes, sir.

State of Oregon, County of Umatilla, ss.—J. J. Beckwith, the duly appointed, qualified and acting court reporter in and for the sixth judicial district of the state of Oregon, for Umatilla county, hereby certify that the above and foregoing is an exact transcript from the testimony given by E. F. B. Ridgway at the trial of the case of W. R. Taylor vs. Harry Kuck, and is a correct transcript of the questions and answers as given. Said cause being tried beginning January, 1923.

Any right-minded man innocent of such a charge would, to my mind, vigorously deny such a statement. The act charged by the witness is far worse than drinking. It is far worse than buying whisky from a boot-legger because the witness charged him with having received liquor taken by a peace officer in raids.

It is inconceivable that an innocent man could be charged with such an offense and yet sit quietly by and make no effort to deny it. It would appear that you do not want to be convinced.

Premature Periods
Mrs. P.—My little girl of three years and eight months is having what is known as premature menstruation. While it is not common, there are records of cases in the medical literature of children and babies menstruating (most cases only for a short time). It cannot always be told what the cause is, but evidently it is some internal gland disturbance and something which has stimulated the ovaries.

After a complete physical examination by a children's specialist to be sure there is no tumor or anything pressing on the ovaries, there is no treatment; just bring up the child as a normal child, with correct diet, fresh air and sunshine, plenty of sleep, and correct mental surroundings.
