WE LEARNED OUR LESSON.

Making exaggerated statements purely for political effect, on the theory that the public can either be fooled, scared or inveigled into voting for a candidate because he pictures himself and his hobbies as superior to all others, is part of the game of politics as played in this nation, says the Manufacturer. In California, the Dakotas, southern states, Pennsylvania, New York and other sections, aggressive campaigns have been carried on to destroy private business, on the theory that public officials are better qualified to operate such undertakings as power development and distribution, the manufacture of fertilizers, the operation of flour mills, grain elevators, cement mills, insurance companies and similar enterprises. While campaigns to establish socialism have been long, strenuous and costly, this doctrine has gained little foothold in the United States, for the simple reason that our people cannot be fooled. The rural press comprising some 14,000 daily and weekly newspapers, goes into the homes of a majority of our sober-minded, thinking citizens. These papers are not operated merely as newspaper manufacturing plants. Their editors are individuals well known in their communities and they express their personal convictions through their editorial columns. These convictions are overwhelmingly against the encroachment of officialism into the life and business of American citizens. Attacks upon American business and industry come almost wholly from individuals, blocs or organizations which would derive personal or political gain by substituting politics for business in our industrial affairs. The people realize today more clearly than ever before, that the business of the nation cannot be run by constantly changing officeholders who have no knowledge of the operation of properties over which they had have control under public ownership. We have not forgotten our experiences with political management of the railroads during the World war.

No one seems to know whether we will have a Republican or Democratic United States senator after the election smoke has cleared, but there's a lot of wild guessing.

It will be over tomorrow evening—with the usual joint efforts. But the I-told-you-so-fellow will still be on the job for a few days.

If you don't do anything else tomorrow, be quite sure that you get to the polls to vote, and take a neighbor or two along with you.

Vote early—but not often.

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LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

STARMER REPLIES TO YOUNG

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 1.—Editor News-Review: The letter of G. W. Young in the News-Review last Saturday, wherein Mr. Young proves to his own satisfaction that Frederick Stelwer is wet, by the testimony of a man whose utter unreliability is clearly shown in the testimony itself, doesn't really deserve an answer.

I do, however, want to take space enough in your paper to call attention again to the testimony upon which Mr. Young relies in his attempt to "soak" Stelwer. The testimony as quoted by Mr. Young is as follows:

E. F. B. Ridgway, being cross-examined while a witness on the part of the plaintiff in rebuttal, by Frederick Stelwer, one of the counsel for the defendant, in the case of W. R. Taylor vs. Harry Kuck, in the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Umatilla county testified in part as follows:

Q. Cross examination by Stelwer.

Q. Had you been drinking that night?

A. No, you bet I had not.

Q. You never drink?

A. Once in a while I take a drink, just like you.

Q. You frequently drink the liquor you take in these raids, don't you?

A. No, sir, I do not.

Q. You never did?

A. No, sir.

Q. Do you give any of it away to your friends?

A. Yes, sir, I did once, to you.

Q. Are you sure about that?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. You never drink it yourself?

A. Yes sir, I said I drink whiskey.

Q. You drink liquor you take in raids yourself?

A. I have taken a drink of it, yes, sir.

You will notice in reading this testimony that the witness in question first denied that he drank from the liquor secured in a raid, then, on being pressed by further questions, admitted that he did drink such liquor. In other words, the witness, although under oath, lied, as is proven by his testimony itself.

Every jury is instructed that a witness found false in one part of his testimony is to be distrusted in the rest of his testimony.

Mr. Young wouldn't accept that man's testimony as of any value whatever, in a law suit. Yet Mr. Young swallows it hook, line, sink and all when it may help Mr. Young to help his candidate, Bob Stelwer.

Stelwer's enemies have gone over the record of his life with a fine-toothed comb. All they could find upon which to base their accusation is a bit of testimony of a self-proven liar. Charges based on such unreliable statements are of the same character as the Slush Fund charges, that have also been proven to be political propaganda.

Fred Stelwer's reputation has been made in Umatilla county. What that reputation is can be easily determined. Stelwer received over three votes from Umatilla county citizens for every one vote given Stanfield, both candidates having for years claimed Umatilla county as their home.

A prefer to accept the judgment of three-fourths the Republican voters of Umatilla county as against the testimony of a lying booze-drinking witness.

ATTENTION CALLED TO IMPORTANT ISSUES IN SENATORIAL CAMPAIGN

To the Editor: There are many important questions which the voters will be called on to answer on the ballot tomorrow, one of the first of which on the vote for U. S. senator is, "Is Stelwer a drinking man?"

There is every indication that he is. Senator Eddy who professes to know whereof he speaks says he is not, and that he is practically a "teetotaler."

If the senator is correct why did the Pendleton ministers of Stelwer's home town according to Friday's paper refuse to endorse him and pass a resolution stating that the Anti-Saloon league in endorsing him had acted unwisely.

Who is in a better position to know whereof they speak the Pendleton ministers who live almost next door to him and probably rub elbows with him almost every day or Senator Eddy who lives some three or four hundred miles away?

Surely the senator would not doubt the word of a group of ministers.

Another question is, "Was Stelwer fairly nominated as claimed?" Well, the Multnomah grand jury by the number of indictments they returned against a number of his adherents over the circulation of the alleged yellow ticket did not seem to think so.

If these charges are substantiated and there is good reason to believe they will be, would a nomination thus tainted with fraud be a fair nomination? Stelwer was on the ground in Oregon, and if he did not know what was going on in his behalf he should have known, for if the votes were fraudulently obtained he would have received the benefit of them, regardless of the claim of his friends that he had nothing to do with it, which fact alone would forbid them to claim anything under the sanctity of the Oregon primary law.

Again it is laughable to see how some of Stelwer's most ardent followers refuse to give Stanfield due credit for putting over the O. and C. land grant tax refund bill.

To this let me say. To whom did the people of Roseburg give an appreciation banquet recognizing him as the moving spirit, along with Mr. Cordon and Mr. Gore, for their services in this great achievement. Was it Mr. Adams and Mr. Hawley, or was it Mr. Stanfield?

What was this banquet to be as the kiss of Judas? If not why acclaim Stanfield and break bread with him over something he had done and then repudiate him?

The fact of the matter is that Senator Stanfield stayed on the job and sacrificed his primary campaign for the people of Oregon. FARGO, N. D., Nov. 1.—Queen Marie turned to North Dakota farmers today to ask advice how to help the farmers of her own country.

At a radio station in St. Paul last night the queen invited Dakota farmers to meet her today to discuss agriculture with her. She arranged to take into her car at succeeding stops two farmers and their wives, and in informal chats with them learn how they till the soil, what their crops are, how they manage their homes and how they reap a profit from their acres.

An Indian bonnet awaited her majesty at Mangum, where North Dakota Indians, in tribal costumes, arranged a dance in the queen's honor. To further enliven the day the royal party also welcomed a opportunity to ride horseback at Medora, where, in the Bad Lands section, a rodeo was assembled.

Rumenians, living in North Dakota, nearly all farmers, planned to meet their queen at Dickinson to give her their own knowledge of farming conditions in their adopted country.

Thousands thronged the concourse as the queen's train pulled into St. Paul to be met by Governor Theodore Christianson and Twin Cities committees.
