Motion Picture Industry to Unite With Science in Giving World the Teachings of Medicine and Surgery

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)
MONTEREAL, Oct. 29.—American motion pictures entered a new scientific field today, that of medicine and surgery, sponsored by one of the world's leading medical societies, the American College of Surgeons.

Will H. Hays, head of the picture industry, joined with the scientific men in the plan to give the entire world the benefit of medical and surgical pictures. The board of regents of the college adopted the report of a special committee advocating the use of movies. Mr. Hays, who spoke at the meeting, expressed the belief that the motion pictures could be made a factor in developing a stronger race. He also was on the speakers program of the convention of the college which convened after the regents meeting.

The special committee suggested that a bureau of information be established in the headquarters of the college of surgeons in Chicago to make available to the medical profession information as to what films are obtainable for both lay

and professional use, where such films can be obtained, and whether they are reliable and satisfactory for teaching purposes. This committee suggested that it would be inadvisable for the American College of Surgeons to undertake the production of such films, or to enter the commercial field in any way.

Outlining its plans, the committee said: "We feel assured, first, that motion picture films can and will occupy a large place in the teaching of medicine; second, that steps should be taken to stimulate the development, production and use of proper films for purposes of medical teaching; thirdly, that while there are distributors and producers handling such films, there has been no definite centralization of supply and no definite standard of reliability."

Part of the committee's work would be to determine and develop the demand for such films by communications and various medical or surgical bodies through the country and elsewhere.

CHRISTMAS GIFT BOXES BE PROVIDED AGAIN THIS YEAR

Chamber of Commerce to Follow Out Plan Adopted Last Year to Advertise County.

Douglas county gift boxes as a Christmas suggestion for the residents of the county to send to friends in other parts of the land were approved last night at a meeting of the directors of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce. Last year these gift boxes were made up and used for the first time. They met a fine response in the short time they were available before Christmas so this year the directors decided to have the boxes packed earlier than usual.

Each box will contain 12 pounds of English walnuts, one 5 lb. box of sweet potato, one can of pears and one can of loganberries. Some boxes will be made up in which prunes will be pitted and stuffed with walnuts and rolled in sugar, making a dainty confection, but these will sell at a higher price than the regular gift boxes.

The regular box will sell for \$2.00 which will include the cost of shipment to any given point. The Chamber of Commerce will address and ship the boxes at any time designated by the purchaser and to any address. A special rate has been granted by the express company to make possible the \$2.00 price per box.

The cooperation of residents of the county in this matter is particularly urged. The gift boxes afford an opportunity for some splendid advertising for Douglas county. Last year's sales have resulted in numerous orders for walnuts, prunes and other products, and attention can be called to the county's resources in a very effective way through these boxes which afford a delicious Christmas gift.

Last year's records show that these boxes reach their destinations in due shape. Only one box out of the hundreds sent out went astray and it was replaced by the express company. One case was found in which the box failed to reach the person to whom it was addressed because it was intercepted by a negro servant who was so captivated by the delicious contents that he devoured them himself.

FRUIT GROWERS WIN ROUND IN LEGAL BATTLE

Sgobel-Day Action Thrown Out of Federal Courts.

NO TRIAL THIS TERM

Decision Comes too Late to Get Case Before Circuit Court in November Session.

Fifty-one Douglas county prune growers who are waging a court battle against Sgobel and Day, a nationally known fruit and vegetable wholesale concern, won the second round in the fight today when the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld the late Judge Wolvorton in his decision dismissing the case from the U. S. District Court.

The case is one in which W. T. Craven, of Roseburg, holding the assigned claims of fifty prune growers of the county, brought suit against Sgobel and Day for damages aggregating approximately \$7,000. The growers allege in the complaint that the firm of Sgobel and Day contracted for the purchase of green prunes, guaranteeing a certain definite price per suitcase box. These growers declare that they were given a definite agreement as to the price to be paid for their fruit, but that when settlement was made that the price given was considerably below the figure guaranteed them.

The claims were all assigned to Mr. Craven who brought suit for the difference between the aggregate sum received and the amount promised the growers.

The company immediately filed a motion to transfer the case from the Circuit Court to the federal court on the grounds that the company is incorporated under the laws of another state, and that the amount involved took jurisdiction out of the hands of the state courts.

The matter was argued last January before Judge Wolvorton, who passed away recently. Attorney Eddy, of Roseburg, appearing on behalf of the fruit growers. Judge Wolvorton, after hearing the statement of the case, ruled that the state courts have jurisdiction and that the case should be dismissed from the federal court. The fruit company then appealed from this decision, the case then going before the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Decision Affirmed. Attorney Eddy appeared before that court on September 25 and an argument was heard by the court and the matter taken under advisement. The court has considered the case since that time, and a decision rendered by Mr. Eddy to appeal to the effect that the appeal has been denied and that the Judge Wolvorton's decision has been affirmed.

This brings the case back to the Circuit Court for trial, but it will probably be too late to get the issues before the court during the November term. As the action is one in which both sides are contesting every inch of the ground, the legal technicalities are being carefully observed and there is no question but that the litigation will be long drawn out.

The eventual outcome, however, is one which will be of much importance to the fruit growers of the county, not only in the matter of the financial returns to those directly interested, but in relation to future activities of fruit buying concerns within the county, and the results will be closely watched.

CHILDREN'S FARM HOME HAS MOST SUCCESSFUL YEAR

The report of the Children's Farm Home given by the Office Secretary, Mrs. M. J. Meers, at the State W. C. T. U. Convention held in Gresham, October 15th, showed that fine work has been done during the past year. The acreage is all pledged and \$7,434.42 in the treasury ready for payment. The full amount will be collected by the time the notes are due.

Five cottages are filled with happy boys and girls, to the number of 115 and the Lane county cottage nearing completion will be ready for children December 1st, making room for twenty boys. Other counties are planning for cottages, Coos and Clackamas have already started their campaign and the four southern Oregon counties, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson and Klamath are uniting for one from that section.

At the Farm Home Board meeting on October 19th, it was decided to erect the next cottage built outside of special county campaigns, in honor of Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh, the woman who has done such splendid work in establishing the Home. The Farm Home Board are confident that the people of the state will be pleased with this decision and that they can depend upon them to make this campaign a success. We are very glad for this activity for cottages for the need for more room is very great and we hope several of these cottages will be erected early next year.

QUEEN MARIE NOW "WAR WOMAN" OF N. DAKOTA SIOUX

Reputed Slayer of Sitting Bull Draws Royal Blood and Crowns Her With Feather Bonnet.

SPOKANE, Nov. 2.—Queen Marie sped across Montana today with a blood spot on her finger and an eagle feather head dress as evidence of her rank as woman chieftain of the Sioux Indian nation. She was made a blood sister and "war woman" of the tribe at ceremonies in Mandan, N. D., yesterday.

Before placing the feather bonnet on the queen's head, Chief Red Tomahawk, master of ceremonies, reputed slayer of Sitting Bull, took one of the queen's fingers, and with a sharpened flint, picked the skin. Blood appeared, but Marie only smiled. The test of courage was satisfactory and the symbolic bonnet was placed on her bobbed tresses.

Ordinarily, the designation, "war woman," is given to Indians only when they have distinguished themselves on the field of battle.

In the case of Queen Marie, the Indians recognized her services to Rumania during the World war as meriting the highest rank the tribe could bestow.

For the first time in her visit to this country, Marie lost her composure yesterday, when, after she had knelt on a buffalo robe during the ceremonies, the robe was picked up by a group of chiefs and she was carried a short distance to the ceremonial wigwam. A startled expression held the queen's face for a moment, but she was laughing when she was lowered to the ground.

The queen spent a large part of yesterday's daylight ride across North Dakota in conversing with a group of that state's farmers and their wives, who boarded the train at various stops.

Her Majesty was told of diversified farming and cooperative enterprises in her own country of Rumania has far to go to catch up to this country's modern farming methods. "A real woman," was the comment of the farmers and their wives after they had talked to the queen.
