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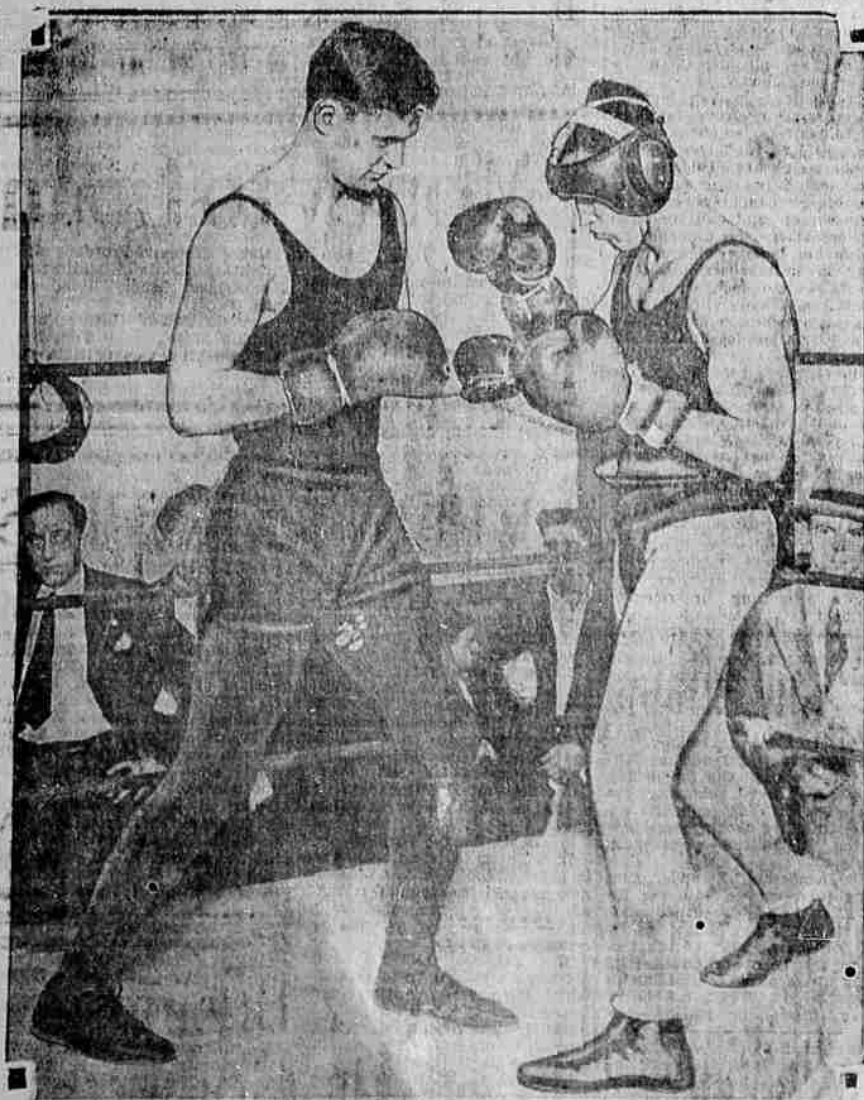

SCIENTISTS FIND 61ST ELEMENT IN THE ATOMIC SCALE

BOLOGNA, Italy, Nov. 6.—Proof of the discovery of one of the missing chemical elements in the series of 83 has been accepted by congress of scientists, meeting here.

Isolation of the element, which is 61 in the scale of atomic numbers, was made by Professor Luigi Rella head of the chemical institute of Florence, in conjunction with Dr. Fernandez, professor of physics, and Signora Brunetti.

Actual discovery, it is said, was made more than a year ago but was confined recently on a larger scale.

Professor Rella's discovery fills another gap in the atomic scale in which the British scientist Moseley classified the elements of "forms of matter which cannot be decomposed by any means known to science."

The other missing numbers in the Moseley scale of 82 are given in the encyclopedia Britannica as 43, 75, 85 and 87.

Two of the most important discoveries of elements in the present generation were that of Helium (No. 2) by Ramsay in 1895 and of radium (No. 88) by M. and Mms. Currie in 1898.

SHOOT AT EUGENE WILL BE SECOND LARGEST IN U. S.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 6.—The second largest trapshoot in the United States will be held in Eugene next May when the Lane county sportsmen's association will be host to the shoot of the Pacific coast. It was revealed at a meeting of the group here last night. The American trapshoot association has awarded the Pacific coast division shoot to the Lane county organization.

The shoot has not been held in Oregon for several years. This year's meet is at Del Monte, Calif. The meet is second only to the annual trapshoot association event in Ohio.

More than 200 entries are expected here. O. M. Fox, vice president of the national association and manager of the Pacific coast zone, will be here to take charge of the zone event.

Notice of School Election to Increase Tax More Than Six Per Cent Over That of the Previous Year.

MARKET RATINGS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6.—Local dairy markets were somewhat mixed at the close of the week with some lines recovering from earlier losses and others still maintaining a week's undertone. Production and receipts are the ruling factors in the butter and egg situation, although the trend of outside markets is also being watched very closely.

Various grades of fresh eggs display strength at the close, especially small sizes which advanced two cents a dozen to 29 cents. Firsts and mediums were posted a cent higher at 45 and 36 cents respectively. On the other hand current receipts dropped two cents in the face of heavy arrivals. Top grade eggs held steady and unchanged at the 47 cent level.

The butter market continues unsettled with cube prices unchanged on the dairy board and a more or less mixed deal on butter fat prices. Forty-four cents in Portland seems to be the ruling price on fats but some offers were put out this week as high as 48 cents. Prints held at the 46 cent price throughout the week and no change has yet been announced for Monday.

In country dressed meats the demand for choice veal improved after a weak start and prices held around 16 to 16½ cents. Hogs followed the decline at the yards and choice light pork sold down to 18 cents but was steadier at the close with fancy hogs bringing up to 18½ cents.

Interest in poultry market is centering on turkeys. Receipts are improving and so far quality has been good. Sales for prime dressed birds are being made around 42 to 45 cents.
