

R. H. S. BEATEN BY NORTH BEND, SCORE 25 TO 0

Percentage Football Tactics
of Coos Bay Team too
Much for Locals.

GOOD EXHIBITION

Game Furnished Real Thrill
for Spectators as Play-
ing Was Close
Until Last.

The Roseburg high school foot-
ball team lost a hard-fought game
to North Bend yesterday by a score
of 25 to 0. Playing a perfect game
of percentage football, North Bend
wore the Roseburg team out and
punched over three of its touch-
downs in the last half.

The Coos Bay team possesses a
punter of exceptional high school
ability and made good use of this
valuable player. Time and again
during the first quarter North
Bend punted on first down, making
Roseburg carry the ball. A fast
quarterback and halfback did
good work in returning the ball so
that North Bend obtained the best
of nearly every exchange. Near
the end of the first quarter Rose-
burg was held for downs on the 37-
yard line, and from that point
North Bend bucked the ball over
for the first score of the game.

In the second quarter Roseburg
rallied and drove the ball into
North Bend territory and several
times punched through to the 15-
yard line, but lacked the drive
necessary to penetrate the goal line
defense of the rugged Coos Bay
team. North Bend had a fairly
heavy line and a fast, shifty back-
field, playing not only a strong
game on the offense, but having a
good defense as well.

In the third quarter North Bend
came back after the rest and from
the kickoff drove the ball down
the field with a series of reverses
and crisp cross plays. The Rose-
burg line stiffened, however, at
that score and for the rest of the
quarter the game was up and back.
In the last quarter, however, the
strain proved too much for the
regulars who have been suffering
from injuries since the Eugene
game, and the same substitutions
as usual were necessary, so that
the team was considerably weak-
ened. North Bend taking advantage
of this fact by opening up with
a series of brilliant passes and
sweeping end runs, which during
the last ten minutes of play netted
two touchdowns.

Throughout the game Roseburg
did most of the carrying of the ball,
but the team tired itself out by its

hard play. Twice the Roseburg de-
fense recovered the ball on downs
inside the five-yard line.

The team was well treated at
Coos Bay and the North Bend team
was praised as being clean and
sportsmanlike in all ways.

Roseburg's next game will be
with Bandon here on Armistice
day. Bandon has a team which is
reported to be about equal to
Marshallfield and North Bend, so
that the game here will doubtless
be a good one.

DOUGLAS COUNTY TURKEY CROP IS ON THE INCREASE

General Situation Indicates
a Good Price for the
Thanksgiving
Market.

Douglas county's Thanksgiving
turkey crop is to be larger than
usual, according to present predic-
tions, while the price is expected
to be good. Although several of
the turkey raising states are pre-
dicting larger crops than usual, yet
the general supply is said to be be-
low the normal mark, so that there
are good prospects for a strong
Thanksgiving market, unless
heavy imports are received from
foreign countries. With the pros-
pects of better turkey prices this
year, many farmers who have been
giving little attention to the in-
dustry in the past few years, have
resumed turkey raising, it is stated,
while at the same time the lower
broccoli acreage is also in a
measure responsible for the in-
crease in turkeys, as the affinity
existing between turkeys and broc-
coli prevents the two from being
raised in the same communities
and an increase in one means a
decrease in the other.

The quality of the birds this
year is reported to be excellent,
and with prices giving more and
more attention to strict grading
the Umpqua Valley will this year
attract a great deal of attention in
the turkey market.

Prices at the present are uncer-
tain. Buyers, as usual, are cau-
tious about stating prices but pre-
sent indications are that the price
will be well over 40 cents per
pound. Several hundred birds, pur-
chased by the farm bureau ex-
change, brought 42 cents and were
sent to Alaska. It is believed that
the general Thanksgiving price will
be higher than that figure.

Turkeys will probably be received
during the week of November
14, depending upon the destinations
of the birds.

FOOTBALL GAMES ON COAST TODAY AFFECT STANDING

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—
With two Pacific Coast Conference
games and one intercollegiate con-
test on the bill in the northwest,
interest in far western football
centered in that section today.

The outstanding event was the
annual classic between the Uni-
versity of Washington and the
University of California at Seattle.
With California staggering under
four successive defeats the Wash-
ington Huskies were hoped to win
their second successive victory
over the Bears.

The Huskies eleven went through
a light workout last night and ap-
peared in better condition than at
any time during the season. The
squad is intact with the exception
of William Charleston, halfback
who is on the injured list. His
place was filled during practice by
Charles Carroll, who started against
Whitman College a week ago.
Coach Nibs Price of California,
said that he would probably start
Earl Jabs at fullback, leaving Cap-
tain Bert Griffin, who was slightly
injured last Saturday, on the bench.

In the second coast conference
contest, Washington State College,
the only team to defeat the Uni-
versity of Washington this sea-
son, clashes with the University
of Idaho at Moscow. The Wash-
ington Cougars, though nominally
looked upon as the probable victor,
were seriously handicapped by the
loss of four first string players.

Undeclared St. Mary's College
which took its place among the
strongest teams of the west by
conquering California, meets Gon-
zaga University of Spokane in the
intercollegiate battle. The Saints
were favored to win.

At Walla Walla, Wash., Whitman
College opposed the College of
Idaho in the northwest conference
game.

No outstanding contests were on
the gridiron program in California.
Stanford University, which loomed
as a conference winner by defeat-
ing the University of Southern
California last week, expected to
wallop the University of Santa
Clara, at Palo Alto, while U. S. C.
took a day off, having nothing to
do until the affair with the Oregon
Aggies next week.

MUSSOLINI NOW HOLDS ITALY IN KING-LIKE GRIP

the activities of anti-Fascists at
home or abroad and suspension of
licenses of all anti-Fascist news-
papers and periodicals.

Only the establishment of a re-
sponsible penalty for those
responsible for previous attempts
against the life of Mussolini failed
of enactment by the grand coun-
cil. It is understood that Minister
of Justice Rocco insisted that ap-
proval would be at variance with
all the legal traditions of Italy.

Italy Is Accused.
PARIS, Nov. 6.—Public interest
was intense today in charges that
Italians were seeking to create a
division between Spain and France
because of the operations on
French soil of conspirators who
tried to set up "the state of Cata-
lan" in Spain.

Minister of Justice Sarraut says
enough evidence has been obtained
to justify the belief that there is
close connection between the Cat-
alan affair and the activities of
Colonel Ricciotti Garibaldi, grand-
son of the Italian liberator at Nice.
Garibaldi, working with other
Italians, it is asserted, planned to
betray the Spanish Colonel Fran-
cisco Marcial, leader of the Cata-
lans, and his followers, to the
Spanish police, and thus pave the
way for Spain to declare that
France was lax in allowing a con-
spiracy to be hatched on French
soil. Some 125 arrests on the bor-
der by the French broke up the
conspiracy.

Rome Denies Guilt.
Rome advises characteristically as
absurd the belief held in France that
Italian police agents were implicat-
ed in the plot. The advice says
that the Fascist regime is in sym-
pathy with the Spanish govern-
ment and that Rome gave it the
first notice that the plot was brew-
ing.

Garibaldi is declared by leading
anti-Fascists of Nice to be a trait-
or to their cause. The police of
the Riviera resort are of the opin-
ion that Garibaldi and the other
Italians were not concerned in the
Catalan conspiracy but engaged in
seeking out other prominent anti-
Fascists in France; that it was
their intention to entice anti-
Fascists into Italy, implicate them
in plots against Mussolini and have
them put in jail.

Garibaldi, who was brought to
Paris from Nice for examination,
is being held as a guest of the po-
lice. He has admitted receiving
100,000 francs from an Italian po-
lice official.

Colonel Macia has told the police
he financed the expedition partly
with his personal fortune and partly
with money provided by Catal-
ans in South America. The Ital-
ians who joined the movement
brought nothing for the treasure
chest, he said. The French police
insist the Italians had engaged in
this. There is a certain amount of mild
indignation that France's tradition-
al right as an asylum for political
exiles should be abused and the
country used by political plotters
and counter plotters.

Hooper of Massachusetts. Three
grandchildren also survive. They
are Mrs. Gerald Geddes of Rose-
burg, Mrs. Lucy Arthur of Califor-
nia and Roy Hooper of Massachu-
setts.

Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at
the chapel of the Roseburg Under-
taking company, with Rev. Joseph

The \$5,000,000 libel suit of John-
than M. Davis, former governor of
Kansas, against the Kansas City
Journal-Post and its owner, Walter
S. Dickey, was ended Wednesday
by Judge John C. Pollock of the
federal court of Kansas City, Kan.,
who issued a decree in favor of the
Journal-Post and assessed the costs
of the case against the former gov-
ernor. The newspaper was instru-
mental in bringing charges against
the governor on the last day he
was in office that he had sold a
pardon.

Davis, acquitted, subsequently
brought suit against the publica-
tion and ran for governor at the
election just past. He was defeat-
ed.

Harry M. Daugherty, former at-
torney general of the United States,
and Thomas W. Miller, former
alien property custodian, must face
trial again on a charge of con-
spiracy, according to announce-
ment by United States Attorney
Henry R. Buchner of New York.
The court will be asked to set the
trial for next month.

The recent trial of Daugherty
and Miller resulted in a disagree-
ment by the jury. They were in-
dicted for conspiracy to defraud
the federal government in connec-
tion with the payment of \$7,000,000
to a Swiss corporation for a war
claim.
