SOUTH DEER CREEK GRANGE PROPOSES SUPER ROAD PLAN

**JUDGE TURNS DOWN
GUILTY PLEA FROM
AN "INNOCENT" MAN**

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8.—Federal Judge Bean announced from the bench today that he doesn't want any innocent persons pleading guilty in his court.

The announcement followed the plea of George B. Howard charged with violations of the liquor laws on five counts.

Assistant United States Attorney Helgeson read the information against the prisoner, then explained the government's side of the case.

"What have you to say?" asked the court, addressing Howard.

"Well, your honor, I have no money to fight this case. I'm not guilty, but I'm going to change my plea to guilty and have it over with," replied Howard slowly.

"You know whether you are guilty or not," snapped back Judge Bean. "Are you?"

"No, sir, I'm not."

"Then the former plea of not guilty will stand. I'm not going to let a man come in and plead guilty to a crime he didn't commit. The court will appoint an attorney for you."

Howard was arrested last week by federal prohibition agents.

**FOUR-YEAR-OLD CHILD
IS BRUTALLY TREATED**

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8.—Black and blue, burned and bruised, four-year-old Dorothy Lettler was taken in charge by the humane society today.

Mrs. F. M. Swanton, its manager, declared the society would obtain a warrant for the arrest of Mrs. Ruth Carroll, about 48, the step-grandmother of the child, in whose care Dorothy has been.

Dorothy's mother, aged 18, is separated from her husband, and had placed the child with her step-mother four months ago.
