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SPREE LEADS TO FATAL GUN PLAY IN LUMBER CAMP

Jack Strum Is Killed Near La Grande by Charles O'Hara, Often in City Court.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LA GRANDE, Ore., Nov. 8.—Charles O'Hara, about 45, is in the county jail today and Jack Strum, 25, is dead, shot through the abdomen with a charge of buckshot, the result of an altercation at a lumber camp Saturday near Five Points, 12 miles from La Grande. O'Hara, spending a day and night wandering in the mountainous region, returned to a camp a quarter of a mile from the scene of the killing and was arrested. He made no statement.
According to eye witnesses, O'Hara, under the influence of liquor, fired the contents of a shot gun through the stomach of Strum during the noon hour and then fled into the woods. Strum died shortly after an ambulance rushed him to the hospital here.
Officers took up the hunt for O'Hara but were unable to find him, a heavy rain washing out his tracks and making attempts to follow any trail difficult.
When O'Hara returned to the lumber camp last night about 6 o'clock he surrendered his gun and asked for something to eat. Officers took him into custody as he was finishing his meal.
O'Hara has been convicted several times in municipal court here on charges of drunkenness, the records reveal.

cohabitation was sufficient to deal with the case. The penalty in such a case is three months in jail. Morton has already been in custody for six months, awaiting trial, but upon pleading guilty was given the maximum sentence so that he will spend nine months in all in jail for the crime.

Name Withheld
When arraigned this morning Morton refused to give his true name. He admitted that Morton was a fictitious name, but declared that he preferred to be indicted in that manner. He is known to have a long record for check operations in 17 different states, this information having been obtained through the Sacramento bureau of identification. He has served prison terms in two states, officers say.
For several weeks, prior to his arrest here, he had been living at Medford, and was quite well known there, for he has a personality which causes him to be very likeable and interesting, and he can make friends readily.

Check Case Displeases
Judge Hamilton exhibited displeasure over the indictment of Robert Cook, alias Charley Adair. The boy is from the lower Umpqua river and is accused of passing a worthless check at Reedsport. Merchants taking checks do so at their own risk. Judge Hamilton said, particularly where the person passing the check is an irresponsible boy. The court should not have to give time to cases in which the merchant failed to give proper consideration to checks presented to him, Judge Hamilton declared. If the boy had desired to stand trial, instead of pleading guilty, he would have a good defense in the fact that such care was not taken, the judge said. The boy was given a light sentence of 30 days in jail.
Allan G. Hamilton, indicted for non-support and James Wood, charged by the grand jury with incest, were also arraigned. Mr.

EDUCATORS OF NATION TAKE UP SUZZALLO CASE

standing leader of education throughout the country, president Henry Suzzallo made the victim of political intrigue and the growth of a great state university obstructed. Therefore, after consulting with the members of the executive committee, the officers and many members of the association, I officially protest against the summary and unwarranted action of Governor Hartley's personally selected trustees and hereby offer our services to your association and to all other organizations within the state of Washington, which are working to save that state and the nation from an educational calamity by restoring Dr. Suzzallo to the presidency of the university. Let me know in what way we can act most effectively."

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Hamilton being represented by Attorney Abraham and Mr. Wood by Attorney John T. Long. In each case the defendants were given until tomorrow morning to enter their pleas.

It is expected that both of these men will stand trial. Hamilton is accused of having deserted his family and going to Klamath Falls in company with another woman, leaving his small children to be cared for by other persons. He was arrested and brought back to Roseburg, but was released on bail.

James Wood, who was indicted for incest, is a resident of the Garden Valley community. His daughter, who recently gave birth to a child, is the state's principal witness.

Several of the other indictments returned will doubtless result in trials.

Shelley Case Interesting
Local interest centers largely in the Shelley case. Mrs. Shelley, who is indicted on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, shot her husband, Frank Shelley, local power company employee, July 16. They had been having domestic trouble, a divorce action having been heard in court a short time previously and a decree being denied. On the night of the shooting they had been quarreling and Mrs. Shelley during the course of the altercation procured a revolver and shot him through the chest. His life hung in the balance for several days, but he has now recovered from the wound. She was arrested, but friends furnished bail, so that she was held in custody only a few days. She is expected to stand trial on the charge.

George Gardner, who was indicted for possession of hash, was apprehended near Peel a few weeks ago. According to officers he was in the act of operating a still when arrested.

Roy Tipton, who is accused of assault and battery on Steve Pearson of Winchester, is said by officers to have struck the man during an altercation between Tipton's brother and Pearson.

Harry Thomas and William Blackett, who were charged with a statutory offense, have been out on bail, since the filing of charges against them by Earl Davis, of Roberts Creek, who claimed that she was taken for an auto ride and criminally attacked. The grand jury found the evidence in the case insufficient for an indictment.

Reedsport Case Heard
The circuit court this morning took up the case of H. J. Lyster against Paul Bernhardt, an action for money transferred from the justice court at Reedsport. Mr. Lyster claims that he loaned the defendant \$200 and that the money has not been paid. Bernhardt, on the other hand, claims that the money was given as first payment on an automobile, on which \$800 is still due, and that Lyster, not wanting to complete the contract, has refused to make further payments and has brought the loan claim in an effort to recover the money paid down.

Attorney J. H. Napier represents Mr. Lyster and Attorneys J. H. Austin of Reedsport and Dexter Rice of Roseburg appear for the defendant.

PASSENGER TRAIN STRIKES FREIGHT; 12 PERSONS HURT

HAGERSTOWN, Md., Nov. 8.—Twelve persons were injured this morning when a passenger train on the Western Maryland railroad from Baltimore to Hagerstown ran into an open switch at Thurmont and crashed into the rear of a freight train on a siding.

The three said to be most seriously injured are mail clerks.

Samuel O. Strate and George W. Ross, mail clerks of Baltimore, were injured internally besides suffering cuts on their faces and hands.

The passenger train was running at high speed when it crashed into the engine of the freight train that had taken a siding, badly damaging both locomotives and the mail car next to the passenger engine.
