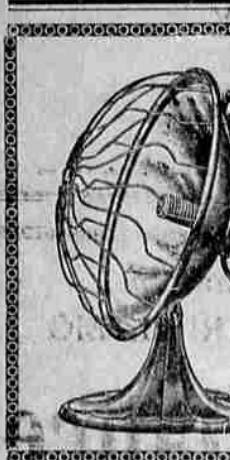

BERRIE RESIGNS POSITION; NEW MANAGER IS HERE

O. M. Berrie, who for the past thirteen years has been associated with the Standard Oil Company, has resigned his position as local manager and is planning to enter a private business enterprise in Roseburg. His position here has been taken by A. D. Abbott, until recently of Bend. Mr. Abbott having arrived in Roseburg today to take up his duties.

Mr. Berrie has been employed by the Standard Oil Company for slightly more than thirteen years, working up from an office position to a place as manager of the Roseburg station, one of the most responsible positions in the state. He was recently offered a transfer to another important station, but desiring to go into business on his own behalf, having faith in the future of Roseburg, he tendered his resignation. Mr. Berrie states that he believes Roseburg to be on the verge of a great era of prosperity and he desires to have a part in the future development. He states that he is not yet ready to announce his future plans, but will be in a position to do so within a few days.

Mr. Abbott, who takes over the managerial position here has been at Bend for the past 41 years, and previous to that time was at Marshfield. PARENTS WILL VISIT SCHOOLS THIS EVENING

The grade schools of the city will be thrown open tonight to parents for the annual visitation night. This is a part of the observance of Education Week and each year parents are given an opportunity to visit the schools and see them in actual operation. Because of the fact that many of the parents cannot get away during the daytime the schools are operated in the evening so that the parents may observe the manner in which the schools are conducted. As some parents have children in two or more of the schools the grade schools are to be open tonight to the Junior High school, Friday night, and the Senior High school, Thursday night, November 11.

One-quarter of the day's school work is to be eliminated in the grade schools this afternoon. The students will return at 7:30 this evening accompanied by their parents and will then go through the program lacking in the afternoon's work. The parents will have an opportunity to meet the instructors and will learn through actual observation just how the children are being instructed. Last year several hundred parents availed themselves of the opportunity to visit the schools, according to City Superintendent M. S. Hamm, who today expressed the hope that parents will keep in mind the visitation days and attend the open classes.

The Junior High school will hold two periods after 7:30 o'clock Friday, November 12, while on Thursday, November 11, the Senior High school will combine its visitation day with a dedication ceremony at which time the new building will be officially dedicated.

TOMB OF ANCIENT RULER OF EGYPT BEING EXPLORED

CAIRO, Nov. 10.—Dr. George A. Reisner, assistant professor of Egyptology at Harvard University, has issued a report describing the work he has done on the tomb of Queen Nefertiti, mother of King Cheops and wife of Seneferu, first sovereign of the fourth dynasty. The report says the identification of the tomb is based on two inscriptions in gold hieroglyphs on the back of a carrying chair. Dr. Reisner asserted he found evidence that the Nefertiti died some time after Cheops came to the throne and was buried at Dahshur, on the west bank of the Nile and directly south of the great pyramid. The tomb was rifled by thieves and when the violation was discovered Cheops' secretary transferred the body to a new tomb at the entrance of the pyramid Giza. This tomb is a vertical shaft cut 100 feet through the limestone to the chamber opening from the bottom. Everything in the former tomb was brought out, even the things the thieves had smashed. The discoveries included a bed and three chairs of gold, silver implements and tools, six of which

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are solid gold, fifteen of copper and the remainder of flint; a dozen wooden panels with inlaid floral designs and faience, framed in gold; household vessels, including three gold cups, a copper basin, 28 alabaster vessels and five boxes of linen, almost entirely disintegrated.

Many of the vessels found represent the traditional types of the third dynasty. Perhaps the most impressive discovery was a gold chased jewel box bearing the queen's name and containing twenty silver anklets, graduated to fit the leg upward, each anklet with calcite, lapis lazuli and cornelian.

Dr. Reisner has now begun to remove the canopy on the alabaster sarcophagus, together with the panels bearing the name of Seneferu. The canopy's frame work is an astonishing piece of work. All the tensions and mortises are sheathed with copper. It has copper attachments for curtain or doors. The sarcophagus will probably be opened in December.

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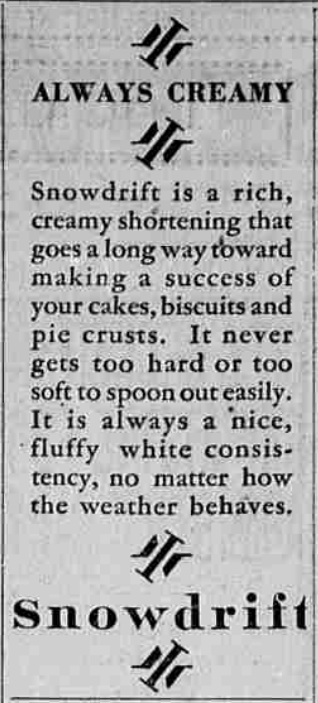

the town concerning its occupants and the extent of the tornado damage. Each name that passed over the wire meant death or injury to some friend or acquaintance of Miss Carpenter—the cited but she continued for long hours to plug through the calls.

Into each home in the community the hand of tragedy reached and scattered death or injury to its occupants or relatives or friends. But through some quirk the tornado avoided the center of La Plata, which embraces only four square blocks.

At Cedarville, which has 75 occupants, a train on the Washington, Brandywine and Point Lookout railway, was stopped by a fallen tree. Owen P. Grimes, a brakeman, heard screams from his home 50 yards away. He ran to the house to find Mrs. Grimes under an overturned stove which crushed her hips. Her dress was in flames. Two of the three children also were injured.
