After revising a book he has written on the part the 91st division took in the World war Major General Johnston will come to Portland from the east to reside permanently, he said.

Miss Lane was born in Evansville, Indiana, and was past her 80th year at the time of death. She came west when a young woman and for many years made her home in Reno, Nevada. She visited with relatives in Roseburg on numerous occasions and formed many friends in this city. Miss Lane was a niece of the late General Joseph Lane. For several years she was connected in school work, teaching at the schools in Canyonville and Rogue River over 50 years ago. She was a member of the Episcopal church. No immediate relatives survive. The body will arrive in Roseburg from Portland Thursday morning and will be taken to the Roseburg Undertaking Parlors. Funeral arrangements will be made later.
