ROAD PAVEMENT WEST OF TOWN TO BE CONTINUED

Sylmon Valley District Unanimously Votes Special Tax Levy for Road Purposes.

The pavement west of Roseburg is to be continued next year according to the almost unanimous vote of the public-spirited people of road district Number 37, located in the Sylmon Valley locality. At the road meeting held at the Sylmon Valley school house, recently, a proposition to vote a special 10-mill tax levy for road purposes was adopted almost unanimously. The money voted will be used to continue the pavement which was built westward from the Soldiers Home this year. The county court will undoubtedly continue its cooperation through the market road fund which will give considerably more money for the project than can be raised by the district alone. The pavement to the west is very important as the road leads into some of the richest agricultural land in the county, and heavy loads of farm produce are brought in to market from that direction.

The district also adopted a resolution asking the city of Roseburg to cooperate with the district by paying the piece of road just inside the city limits. The chairman, R. A. Busenbark and the secretary, L. E. Goodbourne, were instructed to draw up the resolution and forward it to the city council of Roseburg in an effort to secure action if possible.

The city has on several occasions attempted to secure the paving of the road, but the efforts have been blocked as sufficient signers could not be secured for the paving petition. The city has even initiated proceedings, but as A. J. Bellows owns almost one-half of the property on the street and is opposed to the improvement it has been found impossible to get the pavement in. It is possible, however,

that in view of the petition of the Melrose people, and if the cooperation of a sufficient number of the residents of the street is obtainable, the city may be able to force the pavement through as an emergency measure.

TWO ROUTES FOR FARM FAMILIES

The urge of westward migration did not cease with the covered wagon, according to W. G. Ide, manager of the land settlement work of the State and Portland Chambers of Commerce, who has received word from Arthur Foster, the department's representative in the midwest, that the Old Oregon Trail and the Pacific highway will both serve as the route for farm families on their way to Oregon.

On Monday three families left Murray county, Minnesota, by automobile, the Peters, Logghearts and Van Edens of that county starting on their trip to the farms which Mr. Foster has been instrumental in assisting them to choose in Oregon.

Dozens of other families on whom the field representative has been calling are now arranging their affairs so that they may be free to locate permanently in Oregon.

For the next ten days, Mr. Foster will be operating in the farm districts in the neighborhood of St. Paul and Minneapolis, where he has found large groups of families who feel the lure of the Northwest and are especially anxious to investigate the opportunities to carry on dairying where there are mild winters free from the long cold periods which they experience in the east.

Further impetus to the effective distribution of settlers upon their arrival was added by the hearty endorsement which this activity received at the semi-annual meeting of the State Association Commercial Organizations' Secretaries in Portland last week. The importance of obtaining the names of new settlers' old friends in the east was also stressed as of vital importance. No better source of names of prospective settlers can be obtained in the opinion of many of the secretaries who find eager people eager to come where old friends have preceded them.

INVITATION TO BE SENT TO COOLIDGE IN FORM OF BOOK

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Nov. 10.—President Coolidge will be invited to visit the Pacific northwest next summer by the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with a movement including other commercial organizations of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. The plan, initiated by the Spokane chamber is for presentation to the president of a book containing offers of hospitality by all organizations participating.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 10.—Invitations for President Coolidge to visit the Pacific northwest next summer are pouring in from all parts of the four states for binding in books to be presented to the president, James A. Ford, executive secretary of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce and chairman of a committee which has the matter in hand, declared today. It is planned that the entire congressional delegation from the Pacific northwestern states will present the volumes to the president next month.

COUNTESS KAROLYI GIVES UP ATTEMPT TO ENTER AMERICA

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 10.—Countess Karolyi, wife of Count Michael Karolyi, who is barred from the United States, will not visit or even attempt to enter the United States. She made this clear today at a hotel here, when she told reporters she had wired her attorneys in New York to drop her suit, now pending in the United States courts "in regard to my treatment by the department of state."

"We have had trouble enough, and I am looking for peace. I once thought that I might find a home-site in the United States. I much admire that country, but Secretary of State Kellogg, its official mouthpiece, has said that he does not want me or mine. That closes the matter, for we shall never go where we are not wanted," said the countess.

A visa to enter the United States as denied Countess Karolyi by the American department of state in October 1925, when she sought to complete a lecture tour there.

GOVERNOR PIERCE HEADS SOCIETY TO AID CHARITY WORK

SALEM, Nov. 11.—Governor Walter M. Pierce is president and his private secretary, W. C. Lightfoot, vice president of the Oregon Foundation, a charitable organization which filed articles of incorporation yesterday with the state corporation department. Mrs. Mary H. Breck is secretary and treasurer.

The organization represents a movement started in California by the governor's brother, Charles M. Pierce, who said it would be extended to other states. He said the only purpose of the incorporation in Oregon at present is to hold the name that has been selected. The ultimate purpose, according to the papers, is "to aid in charity work in any way that will benefit mankind."

Headquarters will be in Portland. No assets are listed.

Notice of School Election to Increase Tax More Than Six Per Cent Over That of the Previous Year.

848 UNREGISTERED VOTERS SET RECORD AT KLAMATH FALLS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 11.—A new record was established election day, November 2, when 848 unregistered voters were sworn in at the 17 precincts of Klamath Falls by freeholders.
