## LAND SUIT IN CIRCUIT COURT

A verdict for the defendant was returned today in the case of Alex Sawyers against Rudolph Harness. The case was one in which Mr. Sawyers was endeavoring to collect money claimed for lumber which he accused Mr. Harness of using in the construction of a road to a gravel bed. The jury found in favor of Mr. Harness, who denied using the lumber.

The case of Mrs. S. J. Blakely against Frank Burkett and O. G. King was held in court today. Mr. Blakely claims that for more than 50 years his family farmed a certain tract of land that Burkett and King, purchasing the adjoining property moved their fence over on his land, taking in about 6 acres, for which he asks damages in the sum of \$250. The defense claims that they had the property surveyed and that the line ran inside the field claimed by the Blakely family. Mr. Blakely claims the land by adverse possession, while the defense maintains that the fence which had at one time been constructed to enclose the property, had been allowed to fall down, holding for this claim in rebuttal of the adverse possession issue. Attorneys Wimberly and Cordon appear for the plaintiff and Attorney B. L. Eddy for the defense.

## Stolen Dodge Recovered: Does Balancing Feat

The balancing feat performed by Ellery Hall in the Armistice day stunts with his Dodge sport roadster was one requiring exceptional skill in handling a car and great smoothness in a clutch. The clutch in Mr. Hall's car is a 7-plate dry multiple disc type, enclosed. The car was recently stolen and recovered near Wolf Creek.

To balance the automobile, it was necessary to drive slowly up two board troughs laid across elevated roller bearings as fulcrums. Very slow and steady approach was necessary in order to stop the car when it was perfectly balanced in the air about one foot from the ground in delicate teeter fashion.

Several other cars tried the stunt but none succeeded in holding the balance as long as Mr. Hall. The clutch in his Dodge is standard in all types manufactured in the last few years.
