Did You Ever Stop to Think

Charles C. Maes, general manager of the Houston, (Texas) Post-Dispatch, says:

"That reader confidence is an index to a newspaper's worth from the vantage point of the advertiser.
"That reader confidence is an equally important index.
"That character in a newspaper builds reader confidence and brings about a feeling of implicit trust on the part of the public; and this generous good will is reflected directly in the public attitude toward the newspaper's advertising patrons.
"That the newspaper which possesses a broad measure of reader confidence often has a pulling power entirely out of keeping with its listed circulation.
"The public's appraisal of a newspaper as being trustworthy, accurate and moved by ethical motives—or as lacking in these values—is vitally important to the advertiser from a dollar and cents standpoint."

TOURIST FUNDS USED TO RESTORE POPES' PALACE.

AVIGNON, France, Nov. 12. (AP)—Funds gleaned from tourists, mostly Americans, are making possible restoration of the historic Palace of the Popes here.
Built in the Fourteenth Century, the famous structure which has been the residence of several Pontiffs, fell into decay during the Nineteenth Century when it was used as a military barracks.
Poverty of the Municipal Treasury had made it impossible to restore the palace until two years ago when a sojourn tax daily on tourists was instituted and soon between 40,000 and 50,000 francs was raised.
This money is being used to restore the noble edifice which stands on a lofty hill overlooking the Rhone valley.
