PUEBLO, Colo., Nov. 16.—Fire caused damage of \$750,000 in the east warehouse of the Holly Sugar corporation at Swink, Colo., late last night, and one fireman was seriously injured.

The blaze was under control early today but it was not expected to be extinguished before two or three days. Molten sugar was running in streams from the immense pile of 160,000 sacks which filled the warehouse.

Everett Wiswell, Lajunta fireman, was injured internally and his leg was broken while fighting the flames.

### COOLIDGE PUTS TAX PLAN UP TO CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—Having disclosed that there is enough money in the treasury to warrant a 15 per cent credit on this year's income taxes, the administration feels that the next move is up to congress.

It was said at the White House today that President Coolidge thought congress the best judge of what should be done with the surplus. The pronouncement was taken as an indication that in his annual message Mr. Coolidge probably would not attempt to work out details of the refund proposal, but would inform the senate and house they must fight out that question for themselves.

Secretary Mellon has suggested that the money returned to the taxpayers be remitted in the form of a credit on next year's payment, half of it to be deducted from the March installment and half from the June installment.

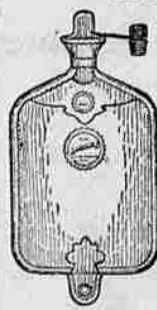
