BRITISH MINERS REJECT PROPOSAL OF GOVERNMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, Nov. 18.—A. J. Cook, the miners' secretary, announced today that the vote of the men was against acceptance of the government's strike settlement proposals by a large majority.

All the large districts were against acceptance by considerable margins, he said, except in Yorkshire, where there was a very small majority in favor of acceptance.

The members of the miners' executive meeting this afternoon to consider the situation were gloomy and perplexed. The delegate conference which last week recommended that the miners accept the terms will meet tomorrow in an endeavor to solve the difficulty.

CLEW IN FLUKE CASE IS FOUND SPITE WORK TRICK

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 18.—A new "clew" in the mysterious death of Mrs. Mabel MacDonald Fluke has been blown up completely. Detectives Leonard and Hyde announced today.

William MacDonald, father of Mrs. Fluke, from a woman who hinted that C. E. Willis might have killed Mrs. Fluke, who was found strangled to death in the attic of a house she owned three weeks ago.

Hyde and Leonard, who ran down the "clew," ended by giving Willis a clean bill of health and announcing that the calls were probably made by Mrs. Nettie Graves to embarrass Willis because he had had her arrested on a charge of assault and battery against Mrs. Willis' trunk.

Friday's game should be quite interesting and close. Ashland defeated Klamath Falls, but the team which gave Roseburg its worst drubbing of the year. The "dope" would give Ashland an advantage over Roseburg, but the local boys have shown considerable improvement in their last three games, and the contest should be between two well matched teams.

WIDOW OF DOCTOR McGEE, TILLAMOOK, PLACED ON TRIAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Nov. 18. — Trial of Mrs. Eva N. McGee, charged with causing the death of her husband, W. G. McGee, began here today. Dr. McGee died here August 17, as a result, the state alleged, of poison administered during an illness.

Mrs. McGee was indicted several weeks after her husband's death. She was held under arrest a few days, and then released on \$20,000 bail furnished by friends. Since then Mrs. McGee has been living with a son in Portland, but returned to her old home here on Tuesday.

The state has subpoenaed a dozen witnesses, while the defense has summoned 32. The little court room was packed to overflowing before the trial opened at 9 o'clock.

Questions of the prosecution attorneys indicated that circumstantial evidence would be relied upon. Venue men also were asked whether they were opposed to hanging women.

Mrs. McGee sat in the prisoner's dock with her face hidden in a handkerchief. Only once did she look up during the morning session. Then tears were flowing from her eyes.

At her side sat her seventeen year old son, Donald McGee. Just inside the rail sat Mrs. Travis, of Coquille, adopted daughter of the defendant. All about her were friends of Mrs. McGee.
