EXTRAVAGANCE AND BUSINESS.

In attempting to analyze the present situation in business, comparisons between the present situation and that existing in 1920 should be made. As was the case then, there has been a big total of business done, and some people feel that we are in danger of running into such an industrial depression as started in 1921. The big feature of the 1920 business was a riot of personal extravagance. Men and women who previously had had very small incomes, all at once found themselves earning high wages, and they spent that money as if they expected those wages would always continue. The result was a demand for merchandise so great that many factories could not keep up with it. What happened next was that a multitude of merchants, fearful of not being able to obtain goods, would order about twice as much as they needed. Then when the so-called buyers' strike came on, and sales fell off, the merchants had ordered very much more than usual, but their sales were less than commonly. A great surplus of goods was created, and the industries had to slow down until that surplus was absorbed. Many families are now spending about as freely as they did in 1920. But the merchants are better prepared for trouble. They have learned not to order goods unless they feel fairly sure of selling them. The increased use of advertising helps them to be surer of working off their goods. They are not in such danger of getting loaded up with unsalable stock. The golden mean between personal extravagance and miserly economy is hard to strike. Many persons spend too much, yet if they slow up on buying, it throws people out of work. Those who are not saving anything are in most cases spending too freely. That kind of expenditure produces a feverish stimulation that is harmful to business.

Two years ago Senator Lynn Frazier of North Dakota was disowned, with others, by the regular Republican organization of the senate because he had supported LaFollette for president. Having a clear working majority at that time, the regulars felt duty-bound to chasten their insurgent brethren. But times have changed. The regular Republican majority in the senate will have disappeared when the seventieth congress convenes, and in its place will be 47 Republicans, counting both regulars and progressives, but not including Senator Frazier, who is still in office. It takes 48 members to comprise just one-half of the senate. Frazier is needed for that extra member. He has been solicited to return to the party fold, with the promise of receiving all of the committee positions which he would have held but for his ostracism in 1924. So far Frazier has been silent on the situation. One imagines that he is deriving a great deal of personal satisfaction from it. He may be pardoned from doing so, for after playing the part of a black sheep it is doubtless sweet for him to realize that he has now become so necessary to those who thrust the role upon him.

Uncle Sam is still trying to put his house in order on account of the 18th amendment to his book of rules. Thirteen members of the coast patrol were indicted at New York yesterday for alleged collusion with rum runners, and about the same time a federal grand jury at Chicago indicted 74 persons on liquor ring charges, among them a batch of court and police officials. The cleansing process seems to be a difficult job, but Uncle Sam generally finishes whatever he starts, and it's not likely he'll fail on this occasion.

Major Brown, leader of a mob that lynched the murderer of a woman at Douglas, Georgia, last September, has been sentenced to life imprisonment. Eleven other members of the mob are still to be tried. From which we judge that lynching is no longer winked at in the south, at least in the state of Georgia. Another credit entry in the ledger of civilization.

VOTE ON SCHOOL TAX QUESTION

take the computation of this year, upon which we based our opinion of the excess over the six per cent limitation:

The 1925-26 special tax levy was \$80,847.57

From which deduct the bond and interest payments on bonds authorized by a direct vote of the voters

25,850.00

Which leaves the amount to be used as a basis to be used in computing the six per cent increase allowed

54,997.57

Six per cent of which is

3,299.85

And by adding the bond and interest payments, to be cut out of this

levy

21,000.00

We find the amount the Board can legally levy

79,297.42

Which is \$1,550.15 less than it could levy last year.

Therefore the excess over the six per cent limitation is \$8,263.94, while the actual increase in tax is only \$6,713.79.

I was asked the other day by one of our good patrons what would happen if this increase should be denied, and if it would mean that the school would have to be closed.

My reply was in the negative, that the school must continue to operate, but that it would mean an increase in the warrant indebtedness of the district, which at the present time costs the taxpayer \$2,600 a year in interest alone, and if it were increased each year by \$8,000, as would happen if additional funds are not provided, interest payments will increase by about \$600 each year, and I deemed it better business to pay now than to have to pay six per cent interest for a number of years and later to have to pay the bill anyhow.

Only Taxpayers Vote

Monday's election to vote upon this question is for taxpayers only. In school district affairs only freeholders may vote, on matters relating to bonds, tax increases, etc., although all voters are privileged to vote for directors or school officers. As the matter is one of extreme importance to the district, it is particularly urged that there be a large number of the taxpayers out to vote upon this matter. The school meeting is to be held at the Junior high school building at 2:30 o'clock and the voting will be started at that time, the polls remaining open until 5 o'clock in the evening.
