ORGANIZATION IS FORMED BY LOCAL FRUIT GROWERS

A number of Douglas County horticulturists gathered recently at the County Agent's office and organized the Douglas County Horticultural Society. The officers so selected for the years 1927 were:

E. Moyer of Dillard, President; R. A. Busenbark, Vice-President; and B. W. Cooney, Secretary-Treasurer.

Agent Cooney states that annual dues paid to the county organization will affiliate the member with the State Horticultural Society and entitles the members to all reports and proceedings of both organizations.

The constitution and by-laws of the county society are so framed that any one interested in the development of this industry may be a member.

The County Extension program of work insofar as it relates to horticulture will be conducted in close cooperation with the county organization, states Cooney. This county has many horticultural problems demanding solution and the growers feel that more progress can be made where the problems are being attacked in an organized manner.

The organization has filed a request with the state society to hold the state meeting at Roseburg for the year 1928. This request is being favorably considered by the State Society.

Douglas County has horticultural interests second to no other county of the state. Why not let the world know there is a place called the Umpqua Valley.
