1923. She is represented by Attorney J. H. Austin.

Denertion is charged by Clarence C. Wilson in bringing suit against Anna Wilson. They were married at Grand Forks, North Dakota. Attorney W. G. Benson of Reedport appears for Mr. Wilson.

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DRUNKEN INDIAN AT FORT KLAMATH HAS BRIEF REIGN

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 26.—Notorious two-gun men who performed here in the early days will henceforth take a back seat in range history, their place having been usurped by Walter Jones, an alcoholically inspired Klamath Indian.

Jones used four guns last night to impress a short lived reign of terror upon the town of Fort Klamath, 40 mile south of here, adjoining the Klamath Indian reservation.

Deputy Sheriff Ferguson, stationed in Fort Klamath, walked into the muzzles of Jones' guns after the latter had fired four shots, and captured the latter when his high powered rifle jammed. Jones' armament consisted of two rifles and two shot guns. His exhibition, which began about midnight last night, will be terminated today when he will face a liquor charge here, officers said.

Ritchie Stands For State Vote On Liquor Law

CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—The Democratic creed of state determination offers the "one and only solution" of the prohibition question, Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland told Democrats at a luncheon given by the Iroquois Club today.

The executive, who has been spoken of as a possible Democratic candidate for president, said he was convinced the Volstead law could not be enforced, and suggested that the question be turned back to the state "so that each state may handle it in accordance with the convictions and will of its own people."

"Either the Volstead Act must be changed or it must be enforced, and I am convinced it cannot be enforced," he said. "We have spent nearly \$150,000,000 trying to enforce it and have sacrificed nearly four billions of dollars in taxes while the effort has been made and our last state is worse than the first."

YOUTH SEVENTH PERSON ARRESTED FOR GIRL MURDER

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 26.—Richard O'Day of Kirkland, 19, arrested yesterday at La Pine, Ore., was the seventh youth taken into custody in investigation of the death of Letitia Whitehall.

Nobody has been accused of the death of Miss Whitehall, whose body was found November 14 in a slough ten miles from her home near Kirkland, which is across Lake Washington from Seattle. But startling things were learned concerning the doings of young folks in Kirkland, and arrests have proceeded on the ground of a search for clues to the tragedy.

O'Day was taken to Bend, Ore., and a deputy sheriff went from here after him. He is to be questioned about an automobile that burned up after he drove it within 24 hours of the disappearance of Miss Whitehall October 30. The car burned along a road to Redmond, which is in a different direction from Kirkland than the slough.

KLAMATH THIEVES INTERRUPT CARD GAME; TAKE \$400

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 26.—Three masked robbers, using a green sedan for a getaway, robbed players in a card game at the Owl Social Club of \$400 in cash and made their escape at 4 o'clock this morning.

Two men held up the card room while the third remained at the door, near the machine. Entrance to the locked basement club room was made by ringing the bell and shooting a gun in the ribs of the attendant who answered the bell, forcing him to lead the way down to the card room.

Police were notified immediately and pursued the fleeing car along the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway to Keno. There the robbers turned their car into a muddy side road leading to Dorris, California and police were forced to abandon the pursuit because they had no chains.

SUPREME COURT REVIEW OF MYERS CASE TO BE ASKED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—A review of its own decision in the famous Myers case in which it was held that the president had the right to remove presidential appointees without the consent of the senate, is to be asked of the supreme court. Former Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma, was advised today by Will H. King, an attorney of Portland, Oregon, that this course had been decided upon. King is counsel for Frank S. Myers, whose removal as postmaster at Portland by President Wilson precipitated the fight.

Under the rules of the court, time for asking a review would expire December 5, and Senator Owen was requested to ask for an extension of the period for sixty days.
