STRONGER LAW ON COMMUNITY FUNDS ASKED BY MEIKLE

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 29.—To get away from the tiresome and futile practice of "passing the hat" to raise funds for community enterprises and advertising, legislation will be attempted at the legislature this winter authorizing counties to levy a tax up to one cent per \$100 of assessed valuation to create a state publicity fund. Such a levy would be optional with the counties. This plan was made known in an address at the chamber of commerce luncheon today by Otto Meikle of Portland.

The present Oregon law to the same end Mr. Meikle said is impracticable since it requires a special vote of the people.

The plan is to be developed further at a meeting of prominent

Multnomah county citizens in Portland this week.

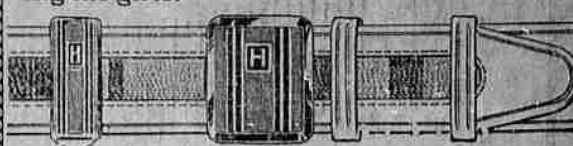
