In response to an invitation from the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce, five members of the Roseburg chamber attended the weekly forum luncheon held in the neighboring city yesterday, returning last night with a report of a most enjoyable time.

The Roseburg delegation was composed of George Smith, John Farrington, A. J. Hochradel, C. S. Heinline and H. E. Cully.

The forum luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce at Grants Pass is featured, they state, by talks by new arrivals in the community. Each week all of the men who have moved into the city or county during the week are the guests of the chamber and are called upon to tell their reasons for making their home in the county. At yesterday's meeting there were six new arrivals from as many different states present at the meeting.

The members of the Roseburg delegation made short impromptu talks, urging a closer cooperation among the cities of southern Oregon, feeling the need for an organization of the cities of the southern part of the state to work for the mutual interests of those cities.

The weekly forum luncheon of the Grants Pass chamber is a spirited affair, the Roseburg men report, and the spirit shown there is remarkable and is largely responsible for the fine progress which is being made in the development of the industrial and agricultural life of Josephine county.

FOURTH WOMAN OF PORTLAND IS MURDER VICTIM

California.

Friends of Mrs. Myers said today that she had been engaged to marry Lawrence Stangle, of Portland.

With the death of Mrs. Myers added to the death of Mrs. Florence Monks in Seattle, and a similar killing in San Francisco, together with the deaths of Mrs. Beata Withers, Mrs. V. A. Grant and Mrs. Mabel McDonald Fluke in Portland, police along the entire coast are admittedly baffled by the actions of the "strangers."

Case Similar.

The four Portland cases bear striking similarity. Mrs. Withers was found dead in a trunk in the attic of her home. The body was cramped down in the trunk, clothing had been piled on top of it and the tray put in place, after which the lid was closed.

Mrs. Grant's body was discovered in the basement of her home, and the body of Mrs. Fluke was found in the attic of her house, a scarf knotted tightly about her neck.

Considerable dispute has arisen over the deaths of the three Portland women and the cases are carried on official police records as undetermined, despite the fact that a coroner's jury agreed that Mrs. Fluke committed suicide, and that Mrs. Grant died a natural death. In the Withers case the coroner's jury failed to agree, three voting for suicide and three for murder. Police investigators, however, are not satisfied with the verdicts and the murder theory has received staunch support.

Founder of Scottsburg Subject of Sketch

Captain Levi Scott First Saw Umpqua While Surveying Road to Klamath.

An interesting sketch of northern Douglas county pioneer events, dealing chiefly with the founding of the town of Scottsburg by Captain Levi Scott, who came to Oregon in 1844, appeared in the Oregon Journal of November 26. It was written by Fred Lockley, who obtained his information from W. W. Scott, a grandson of Captain Levi Scott and now living at Creswell, Oregon.

The article recites that Captain Scott first saw the lower Umpqua region in 1846, while on his way from Polk county to the Klamath country in search of an easier route for emigrants to the Willamette valley than by way of The Dalles. Among his companions on that memorable journey were his son, John, and Jesse and Lindsay Applegate. The party surveyed a road by way of Klamath valley and met a party of emigrants whom they escorted to their future homes northward. Mr. Lockley's article continues:

William J. J. Scott and his son John settled in the Yoncalla valley. The following year Jesse Applegate, John Long, J. P. Cooper and a man named Jeffery settled in this neighborhood. The first one to take up a donation land claim in that vicinity was Warren N. Goodell, who in 1847 took up a claim on which the town of Drain was later built.

In 1850 Captain Levi Scott went down the Umpqua and founded the town of Scottsburg. Next April the governor issued a proclamation designating Scottville, as Scottsburg was then termed; Aiken's place at Umpqua Ferry, Resin Reed's place and Jesse Applegate's home in Yoncalla valley, as polling places for the election of officers for the newly-created county of Umpqua. Scottsville was renamed Myrtle City, but was shortly thereafter changed to Scottsburg.

Major Kearney, later famous as a Civil war general, was sent out by the government to survey a road, and he employed Jesse Applegate and Levi Scott as his guides. Captain Levi Scott, from frequent trips over southern Oregon, became thoroughly acquainted with this whole district. While going from Southern Oregon to Fort Hall on one of his trips Captain Levi Scott's companion, a man named Garrison, was killed near Granite Ridge by the Indians, and Levi Scott himself had his left arm pinned tightly to his side by an arrow that went through his arm and entered his body. He shot and killed the Indian who had wounded him and put the other to flight.

"At one time Scottsburg was the capital of 'Southwestern Oregon,'" said W. W. Scott, in telling Lockley of the early days of Southern Oregon. "Here in this old tin box are a lot of deeds made out by my grandfather, Levi Scott, for lots in Scottsburg, to David Thompson, William Golden, Levi Knott, R. J. Ladd, D. W. Stearns, A. C. Gibbs, Cyrus Hedden and many others. The Heddens still live at Scottsburg. Scottsburg itself was washed away in the high water of '61 and '62. My grandfather, Levi Scott, was a tanner by trade, but he was also an expert carpenter and cabinetmaker and made chairs, tables, bureaus, etc., for himself and his neighbors. He was the first janitor of the state university."
