DOUGLAS COUNTY'S ROAD PLEA AWAITS NEW LEGISLATURE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1.—More than \$1,000,000 will be spent by the federal government on Oregon roads during 1927-28. Of this sum \$578,000 is to be expended during the coming year.

The program for this work was made today by federal road officials and the state highway commission. The 1927 program was completed while that for '28 was tentatively set.

The most dangerous spots on the Oregon Caves road in Josephine county are to be eliminated next spring by the government. The bureau will spend \$15,000 on the work.

The commission, which heard numerous requests for placing of roads on the state road map, took them under advisement at the hearing yesterday, not wishing to commit the commission to an enlarged road program pending the approaching session of the legislature. Among requests was one from Douglas county that the North Umpqua highway be put on the federal road map.

The county has spent \$125,000 on the road and the forest service has built a nine-foot road for a ways, but there are 22 miles in the forest where nothing has been done. It was argued that the road would give access to central Oregon and provide a road from that section to the ocean at Winchester bay and Coos bay. As a recreational feature it was stated that it would reduce the distance between Portland and Crater Lake by 90 miles.

CHURCH NEWS

Tourists Enrich Three Northern States.

400 Million Dollars Pour Into Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin in 1926.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 29.—The annual summer crop of the northern outdoors was a bumper one this year. Eight million visitors in the three states of Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan, yielded a gross income to the three of some \$400,000,000.

The last of the harvest is now being gleaned as the deer hunters defy the snow and cold for their pilgrimages.

State highway departments this year gave an official air to the tourist crop statistics through road counts. In Wisconsin the count showed figures of a "foreign" invasion greater by nearly a million than the population of the state.

Michigan's summer playgrounds drew more than three million, and Minnesota a million and a half.

Most of the figures show an in-

crease of 25 per cent over last year. One accurate comparison is the number of non-resident fishing licenses issued. Michigan sold 75,000 such permits, Wisconsin 60,000 and Minnesota 28,000.

Substitution of a 32-candle power headlight maximum for the present 21-candle power maximum, more flexibility for spotlights, stricter adjustment enforcement and the recognition of the use of the double filament bulb as equivalent to dimming on wet highways were endorsed at a meeting of the Oregon Automotive conference in Portland last week. The conference will draft a bill to be presented to the legislature. Members approved of increasing the spotlight beam maximum to 125 feet and of legalizing a movable for 75 feet distance before the vehicle. In the bill will be provision for the employment of an engineer to supervise light testing stations and more rigid enforcement regulations for violation of light laws.

CANYON ARMY IS DRIVEN BACK IN FOOCHOW BATTLE

Result Lessens Danger to Foreigners There and at Hankow; Unions to Be Pacified.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PEKIN, Dec. 1.—The danger to which foreigners at Hankow and Foochow have been exposed as the result of unrest and factional fighting is lessening. Dispatches from foreign sources in the latter city received here today say there is fighting between the loyal Fokienese troops defending the city and the invading Cantonese. These advisers declare the southerners were defeated back toward Canton. The various consuls there, however, are requesting their governments to send gunboats to protect their nationals. At Hankow the situation eased as the Cantonese moved a step nearer in their desire to establish their capital city at Wuchang, near there, by which they hope to unify control over the disintegrated republic.

An official message from Canton announced that the southern government would move to Wuchang December 5th, its first group of officials and government archives. Diplomatic circles expect this move to contribute toward the pacifying of Hankow, which has been ruled by labor unions for several weeks. A general anti-foreign strike is threatened there, but once the Cantonese establish their capital at Wuchang it is believed the situation will change.

The unrest at Hankow now is attributed to absence of strong authority. Return of the American destroyers Pope and Truxton, which is expected soon, is expected to contribute to the pacification of the city. These craft only recently left Hankow after having gone there to protect American lives and property. With a renewal of unrest they were ordered to return and join British and French forces in guarding the city.

CIRCUIT COURT COMPLETES JURY TRIALS TODAY

The circuit court today dismissed the jury, when a non-suit was declared in the case of the Douglas Creditor's Association against Paulsen, ending the jury trials for the November term, which has been the longest any in recent years. The evidence in the case of the state against Allen Hamilton, accused of non-support, was all in yesterday evening, and the attorneys completed the argument this morning. The jury deliberated only a short time before returning a verdict of guilty. As no other jury cases remain for trial at the present time the jury was dismissed after almost a month of continuing attendance. Several equity cases now remain for trial before Judge Hamilton.

Did You Ever Stop to Think

George Fort Milton, editor of the Chattanooga News, says:

"THAT the return of the Democratic party to the Jeffersonian principle of majority rule is essential for its future success."

The rule under which the party has operated since 1836 in nominating its candidates for president is not really a two-thirds rule—it is a one-third rule.

Under it, the wishes of the minority are able to block the will of the dominant wing of Democracy.

The one-third rule is a child of hate. It grew out of Andrew Jackson's anger at John C. Calhoun. Had it not existed in 1860, the Democratic party might not have split and the Civil war might have been delayed, and averted.

Under the one-third rule there is no harmony but the harmony of hate. Nominations made under it are nominations by cancellation, and the candidates are selected by a process not of deliberation, but of exhaustion.

Eliminate the two-thirds rule and you eliminate the veto exercised by Tammany Hall and the bosses. Majority rule is popular rule, and makes for honest government.

Y. M. C. A. Claimants Losers Both Ways.

Cannot Collect Damages From Germany and Ineligible to Soldier Bonus.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Y. M. C. A. workers during the world war were not "civilians" or "a part of the civilian population of the United States" within the meaning of the treaty of Berlin, and therefore are not entitled to recovery for damages against Germany for loss of property in the war's prosecution.

Overruling the contentions of the American Commission, Edwin B. Parker, umpire of the German-American mixed claims commission, here held that the Y. M. C. A. personnel serving with the A. E. F. was "engaged in activities aimed at the direct furtherance of military operations against Germany or her allies."

The question immediately arose as to whether the association workers, in the light of the decision, might not lay claim to benefits under the veterans bonus act. While this point is said never to

have been tested in the courts, local officials of the veterans' bureau say no such claim could be recognized.

Those entitled to benefits of the various veterans' acts are described as any commissioned officer or enlisted man, or any female in the army and navy nurse corps "when employed in the active service" under the war or navy department.

A "veteran" under the bonus act is defined as "any individual member of the military or naval forces of the United States at any time after April 6, 1917, and before November 16, 1918."
