OREGON COLLEGES NEED FINANCIAL PLIGHT OF STATE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 2.—Out of consideration for the stringent financial condition in which the state stands at the present time, neither the University of Oregon nor Oregon Agricultural College, in submitting to the state budget commission, their estimated financial requirements for 1927-28, made any requests for new building appropriation. Each, however, lays before the commission the pressing need of new buildings, faculty additions, etc., to take care of the increasing enrollment.

The university asks for no appropriation by the legislature. This does not include the medical college of the university, however. The university proper estimates its receipts for the coming two years at \$2,032,143. The requirements are estimated at \$2,019,093.

"It is obvious," says the report to the commission, "that even with the most rigid economy a 68 per cent increase in enrollment cannot be adequately cared for by an increase of 9 per cent in income."

The estimated revenues for Oregon Agricultural College, according to its budget estimate, are \$2,621,750 and estimated requirements are the same amount. From the 1925-26 funds it is estimated that \$98,021 will be left for additions and betterments.

The budget commission has tentatively approved for O. A. C. the same legislative appropriation as two years ago, \$197,601. The college receives continuing appropriations of \$280,450.

Albert Tozier, caretaker of the provisional government park at Champees, appeared before the commission yesterday and asked a total of \$6050. He was allowed \$5,000.

Henry L. Corbett of Portland, who will be president of the senate at the next session of the legislature, while here a few days ago,

cautioned the members of the commission privately against recommending any more money for any state activity than they honestly believe the legislature will see fit to appropriate. This care should be taken, he said, to facilitate the work of the ways and means committee.

THREE MEN INJURED IN \$500,000 FIRE IN FRISCO.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SAN FRANCISCO, ec. 2.—A two-story building occupied by Larkins and company, dealers in automobile bodies, and by a garage and repair shop, was swept by fire today causing a loss estimated to be in excess of \$500,000. Three men, including one fireman, were slightly injured and eighty automobiles were destroyed.

Lieutenant William Wilson of the fire department was injured while rescuing a woman and child from a threatened apartment building nearby. Police aroused hundreds of occupants of nearby apartments and they dressed very hastily and rushed to the streets. A number of aged persons and invalids were carried out.
