OREGON DEATH RATE SLIGHTLY DECREASED.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The department of commerce announces that the 1925 death rate for Oregon was 1,116 per 100,000 population as compared with 1,139 in 1924. This decrease in 1925 is more than accounted for by decreases in the death rates from measles (from 11 to 9.1 per 100,000 population), pneumonia, all forms (from 74 to 67), tuberculosis, all forms (from 71 to 65) and diabetes mellitus (from 21 to 17).

Volstead Act Faces Fresh Onslaught

Augmented Wet Forces in Congress Prepare Measure for Modification, but Predominant Drys Are Expected to Put Through Their Own Bills, Instead, to Make Law Stronger, Bitter Battle Looms.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The wets in Congress are planning their fight strategy, so as to block any administration drive for more dry laws at the coming short session.

Should this maneuver prove successful, they will advance to the counter-attack with some of their own proposals for modification of the Volstead Act, but admittedly without any hope of forcing a breach in the dry army.

The wet forces will have some recruits as a result of the recent prohibition referendum in eight states, but the dries still hold the preponderance of numbers in both the House and Senate and are certain that they can flatten out any attempts at modification.

Leaders of the wets concede that once the dries can bring their proposals to a vote, they can win, but with crowded calendars at a three months session of Congress they insist they have the membership necessary to talk the administration proposals to death.

To Bolster Dry Law. As Congress assembles its faces nearly a score of wet and dry measures, with the administration pressing for only four—one to tighten up enforcement of the Volstead Act; one to authorize the distillation of medicinal liquor; one to create separate bureaus of prohibition and customs in the Treasury; and one to place prohibition field agents under the civil service.

The wets will concentrate their attack on the Golf bill to make the Volstead Act more drastic and especially on that provision permitting the issuing of warrants for raids on private dwellings, in which it is known liquor are being made for commercial purposes.

Other features of this measure are government supervision over all manufacture of malt cereals and the handling of all denatured alcohol and rum, and the searching by the Coast Guard of American vessels beyond the twelve mile limit where there is reason to believe they are liquor carriers.

Wet Plan Opposed. As a counter proposal the wets will urge the Edge bill to amend the Volstead Act, so as to make the definition for malt beverage the same as that for claret and fruit juice—"intoxicating in fact." This would leave to the courts the determination of what constitutes an intoxicating beer.

the one-half of one percent now allowed. When the wets and the dries come to grips, Representatives William D. Upshaw, dry Democrat of Georgia, and John Philip Hill, wet Republican from Maryland, will engage in their farewell exchanges on this subject as both retire from Congress in March. Upshaw was defeated in his primary campaign, and Hill withdrew to run for the Senate.

Wets Are Augmented. With Representative Hill, Representative Thakam, Republican, and Gallyvan, Democrat, both of Massachusetts, again will make up what the dries of the House have dubbed the "Three Musketeers." They will have a larger following this session than last, however, as a number of congressmen from the states that voted wet in November—New York, Illinois, Wisconsin and Montana—expect to become active in the fight.

In the Senate the thundering voice of Senator Willis, Republican, Ohio, will be clearly heard championing the cause of prohibition. Assisting him will be his colleagues, Senator Fess, Republican, and Senator Sheppard, Republican, but mild-mannered dry Democrat from Texas.

Edge and Edwards, of New Jersey and Bruce of Maryland, again will constitute the shock troops for the wets with Senator Reed, Democrat, Missouri, who recently delved into the political activities of the Anti-Saloon League, standing stoutly against more dry laws and ever ready to bring his reasoning, with and savagism into play in any forensic encounter over the wet and dry issue.

SALEM YOUTH IS SHOT BY BROTHER. SALEM, Ore., Dec. 6.—Harvey Kaser, 13, was accidentally shot through the abdomen Sunday by his brother, Oral Kaser, 15. The two boys were on the way to inspect some traps when the 22-caliber rifle carried by the older lad, who was walking behind his brother, was discharged. The wounded youth was dragged to the road and taken to the hospital. While serious, his wound is not regarded as vital.

ALL-AMERICAN ELEVEN NAMED BY GRANTLAND RICE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Michigan has its famous Dummies, Osterbaan and Friedman, on the All-American football team selected by Grantland Rice for Collier's Weekly and made public today.

The make-up of the first eleven, with six representatives of the midwest, four of the east and one of the far west, follows: Ends, Hanson, Syracuse and Osterbaan, Michigan; tackles, Wieland, Kavey, and Smith, Brown; guards, Cunningham, Georgetown, and Shively, Illinois; center, Boeringer, Notre Dame; quarterback, Friedman, Michigan; halfbacks, Kaer, Southern California, and Baker, Northwestern; fullback, Joesting, Minnesota.

Notre Dame Winner. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 6.—Speed on the breaks, head work in the pinches, ability to kick goal when it was needed, and baffling strategy, gave the Notre Dame football team a 13 to 12 victory over Southern California here Saturday.
