

FEW CHANGES IN BASKETBALL RULES FOR THIS SEASON

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 6.—Changes in basketball rules for the coming season will not affect the playing on the coast to any great extent in the opinion of Coach Bob Hager, Aggie cage mentor. The rule stating that a diameter be drawn in the center circle parallel to the end lines to denote the part of the circle belonging to each jumper may be left out as far as Pacific coast conference basketball is concerned, according to Coach Hager.

"Requirements for air pressure of 13 pounds for the ball may be easily enforced if the conference adopts a valve ball instead of a lace one," remarked the Orange coach. "The valve ball in its present state is not entirely satisfactory as it often leaks air. The metallic substance on cover decidedly affects the dribble and also the shape of the ball. The conference may adopt a ball at its meeting this week in Portland, but it is doubtful if the valve ball will be adopted," concluded Coach Hager.

Here are the changes in basketball rules for 1926-27:

Rule 1, Section 3—A diameter is to be drawn in the center circle parallel to the end lines.

Rule 4, Section 1—An air pressure of thirteen pounds is recommended as a satisfactory inflation for the ball. This applies to the valve ball which permits the use of an air gauge.

Rule 6, Section 6—If an injury takes place while the ball is in play, the officials are to withhold their whistles until a play has been completed.

Rule 6, Section 7—The umpire is given authority to disqualify players for flagrant unsportsmanlike conduct.

Rule 8, Section 5—Each center player shall stand with both feet on or inside his half of the center circle.

Rule 11, Section 1—"Time Out" shall not be granted for a substitution or at the request of a captain after the ball is in position for one or more free throws. Such "time out" may be granted between the calling of the foul and taking it to the free throw line, but not thereafter until the throw or throws have been taken, whereupon the old rule governs. In case of free throws awarded to both teams "time out" may be granted while the ball is being taken from one free throw line to the other.

Rule 13, Section 6—If two or more free throws are awarded to the same team, at least one of which is for the personal foul, the ball is in play if the last free throw is missed.

Rule 15, Section 13, Penalty. (a)—If a player fouls in the act of throwing for goal, the goal counts if made. The clause, "if the ball has left the player's hands when the whistle blows for the foul" is eliminated.

Rule 14, Section 11, (a)—Center ball instead of nearer free throw line.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 6.—Local produce markets were slow in getting under way and trading was very sluggish. Liberal receipts and lack of a favorable demand brought about the weakness.

Country dressed meats were nominal. Not enough inquiry was shown along the street to establish new price levels. Calves were dragging at 15 to 15½ cents. Country dressed hogs are holding barely steady at 16 to 16½ cents but lower prices are anticipated before the day is over.

The poultry market is generally steady although trading is quiet and little interest showing. Supplies are liberal for the nearer call shown now. Live hens selling at 18 to 26 cents, depending on weight; springs nominal at 22 cents with broilers quoted at 25 to 26 cents. Turkeys are quiet with the few fancy dressed birds coming in now bringing 38 to 40 cents.

The fresh egg market is slow and weak with receipts liberal. Eggs still listed at 42 cents on the exchange but there is some price shading among dealers.

Butter is slow with production heavy and coolers well stocked. Stronger markets abroad have stimulated hop buying in the Pacific northwest and boosted values

slightly. Between 1500 and 2000 bags are reported to have changed hands in this state recently at prices ranging from 20 to 23 cents. As high as 24 cents was paid in Yakima with sales ranging down to 19 cents. In the south some business is reported in Mendocino at 18½ to 20 cents and Sonoma at 23 to 24 cents. All told, close to 5,000 bags have been sold in the three coast states within the past week.

Some improvement is shown in the export demand for northwest prunes but as yet there have been no advance in prices. A fair export movement is expected throughout the winter. Domestic demand, however, is stagnant both for Oregon and California stock. Values have sagged again in the south, especially on the larger sizes, as producers have not moved the tonnage up to this time that was expected. A check of northwest stocks is said to show 20,000,000 pounds still unsold with growers holding about 7,000,000 pounds of this stock.

\$60,000 ASKED BY YOUTHS' FARM UP TO LEGISLATURE

Budget Board Undecided as to Item's Right Place; Forestry Dept. Gets Large Increase

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 6.—The state budget commission has tentatively agreed to pass up to the legislature without recommendation an item of \$60,000 in the budget of estimated requirements of the children's farm home near Corvallis, a new state aided institution.

The money is desired for the construction of an administration building, including residence for the superintendent, to cost an estimated \$47,000 and one other building to cost \$13,000.

The budget does not make it clear whether the institution is asking this as an appropriation from the state, or whether it is simply mentioned as one of the needs of the school, so it is not probable that the commission will act on it.

This institution, like several other state aided institutions, most of them in Portland, receives funds from the state according to the number of inmates on a per capita basis, the per capita allowance being established by law. Occasionally some of these institutions ask for appropriations in addition to the per capita provision.

Forestry Coin Increased

The appropriation that the commission has voted to recommend to the legislature for the state department for forestry is an increase of \$40,000 over the legislative appropriation of two years ago, or \$125,000 against \$85,000. The full amount asked by the department has been approved by the commission.

The entire amount, if allowed by the legislature, will allow the employment of at least 12 men during the fire season.

The forestry department has access to other funds that are not appropriated by the state. There is a law requiring private timber land owners to patrol their own lands, but if they do not do so, that the state department provide the patrol service and collect the expense of the owner by assessment in the same way that taxes are collected. E. A. Elliott, in his budget, estimated that \$190,000 will be collected in this manner for the years 1927 and 1928.

TRAPPER REMEMBERED IN WILL OF MILLIONAIRE.

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 6.—Ten thousand dollars and a hunting lodge in the Cascade mountains is the legacy received by George H. Moody, trapper and guide of McKenzie Bridge, from Herman O. Vogel, Los Angeles millionaire, who died at Innsbruck, Austria, last month and whose will was filed for probate in Los Angeles Saturday, disposing of an estate of \$2,500,000.

For the past several years Mr. Vogel has been an autumn visitor in the Cascades on hunting trips and Mr. Moody has been his packer and guide. In 1915 Mr. Moody built a hunting lodge for Mr. Vogel at Elk Lake. Later this lodge was sold and another hunting lodge built in the McKenzie bridge district. This is the one willed to Mr. Moody.

"Up Salt River" Dates From Clay's Time.

Enemies of Defeated Aspirant Bribed His Boatman to Enter That Stream.

SHEPHERSVILLE, Ky., Dec. 3.—"Up Salt River," having long been a popular expression with a mottled origin, but Dr. G. C. Crist, the grandson of General Henry Crist, Kentucky Congressman, traces the phrase to a campaign of Henry Clay for the Presidency.

The Sunday before the election, the local legend goes, Clay was far down the Ohio river and hired a boatman to row him to Louisville. Clay's opponents bribed the boatman, and when the skiff bearing Clay reached the mouth of Salt River, the boatman quietly slipped into the smaller stream, his passenger being unaware of the move.

After the votes were in, someone asked as to Clay's whereabouts. "He's gone up Salt River," was the reply.

The phrase is a popular figure of speech to denote dismay or defeat.
