GERMANY CHAFES UNDER MILITARY GRIP OF ALLIES

GENEVA, Dec. 6. — Germany will make a determined effort before her delegates leave Geneva to secure a definite agreement upon an early date for cessation of the inter-allied military control. This declaration was made to the press today by a number of the German delegates at the end of the first meeting of the 43rd session of the League of Nations council.

Bitterness among the German people over the inter-allied con-

rol is steadily growing, the spokesmen continued, and the question must be reckoned with as even more important than that of reducing the army of occupation in the Rhineland.

Moreover, Germany will insist upon modification of the project to invest the league with the right to investigate German armaments, which it is expected will be substituted for the inter-allied control.

It was deemed significant that foreign minister Stresemann of Germany did not insist as was expected, upon immediate discussion of the plan for investigation of German armaments by the league.

He thus created the impression that he hopes to secure concessions in the private conversations which will pursue outside the council. Failing to get what he wants there he undoubtedly will push the matter publicly in the council.

GERMANY PAYING U. S. DEBT UNDER THE DAWES PLAN

BERLIN, Dec. 6. — From her own resources Germany has punctually met her second annual payment in conformity with the Dawes reparation plan. Seymour Parker Gilbert, Jr., agent general for reparation payments, in his annual report says the execution of the Dawes plan proceeded normally during the second year and that payments totalling in exact terms \$16,944,574 gold marks were received from Germany during the period from September 1, 1925, to August 31, 1926.

Distribution to the creditor powers was carried out regularly and without difficulty. The share of the United States amounted to \$3,949,000 gold marks. This included an accumulated balance carried over from the first year, amounting to 15,309,000 gold marks.

STEP-FATHER ROSEBURG WOMAN DIES COTTAGE GROVE

Joshua Porter, one of the old settlers of Cottage Grove, a step-father of Mrs. H. U. Cochran of this city, died at his home shortly after noon Saturday after a two weeks' illness, which resulted from a paralytic stroke. Mr. Porter was a native of Missouri and was about 76 years old. He crossed the plains when a young man and settled in Oregon, making his home at Link Hollow, near Eugene, and later in Eastern Oregon. He afterward went to Cottage Grove where he spent most of his life and was well known. He was one of the oldest members of the Cottage Grove Masonic Lodge. Surviving him are a widow, Emma Porter, and three step-children, Fred Arnold and Joe Arnold of Portland, and Mrs. H. U. Cochran of this city. Two brothers and three sisters also survive. The funeral was held at the Mills chapel in Cottage Grove at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon with Rev. Linn reading the services. Masons had charge of the service at the grave and interment was held at the I. O. O. F. cemetery in Cottage Grove.

TIGER FLOWERS' MANAGER THINKS DECISION UNJUST

CHICAGO, Dec. 4. — An official reconsideration of the referee Yanger's decision, which took away Tiger Flowers' middleweight title and gave it to Mickey Walker was sought today from the Illinois Boxing Commission by Walk Miller, Flowers' manager.

Miller sent the commission a letter stating his appeal, and expected to confer with them. The commission plans to meet tomorrow to discuss the case.

In a statement after the match, Yanger cited rule 7 of the Illinois Boxing Commission's code, in support of his decision awarding the match and title to Walker. The rule says: "In case of minor foul-

such as hitting with the open gloves, clinching or prolonging contests after warning has been given by the referee, he shall have the power to disqualify offender and award the decision to the opponent."

Flowers repeatedly was guilty of slapping and flicking with his gloved hand open, Yanger declared.
