DRY LAW OFFICERS CAPTURE MEN WHO IMPRISONED THEM

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 7.—Cap-

tors and captured in turn aboard the French rum schooner, *Arsene* J. J. D. Mathews, assistant prohibition administrator of the Gulf Zone, and Petty Officer Handley today were once more in charge of the elusive liquor running crew which for a week had defied the united pursuit of government vessels and merchant men.

The ship lay at anchor in Puerto, Mexico, where customs officers had custody. Further word from Mathews was awaited regarding the adventures of the federal men and the crew who fought a duel of wits which involved the aid of the elements and the resources of the United States government and foreign agencies.

What methods were used to again gain control of Frank Wood, giant negro captain, whose resource, desperate daring and cunning is a byword on rum row, remained to be told.

The only information available today was a brief cablegram dispatched by Mathews from the Mexican port in which he reported that the ship was in custody and that he and Handley were safe.

A week ago, government forces took over the schooner in the Gulf of Mexico, near the mouth of the Mississippi. Mathews and Hand-

LARGEST CIGAR CHAIN STORES IN WORLD COMBINE

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—The two largest cigar chain stores in the world, the United Cigar Stores, and the Schulte Retail Stores corporation, are reported to have pooled their interest in a new \$250,000 venture for the manufacture and distribution of tobacco products.

The New York Herald-Tribune says the companies have reached an agreement whereby each will maintain its identity but both companies will cooperate through the United and United Tobacco corporation, a holding company organized eight months ago by persons associated with the United Cigar Stores company.

The holding company will purchase half of the stock of the Schulte corporation and a large portion of the stock of the United Cigar Stores company. The president of the new company will be a business associate of George J. Whelan, president of the United Cigar Stores company, while his brother, Charles A. Whelan, and David A. Schulte, head of the Schulte corporation, will be vice presidents.

This agreement, the Herald-Tribune says, is believed to be the first step for the amalgamation of chain stores which has been a subject of negotiation for more than five years. The United Cigar Stores company operates 3,000 retail stores in the United States while the Schulte chain reaches almost 300.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7.—The two children continued to occupy the center of the stage in the domestic drama being enacted by Charles Chaplin, film comedian, and his estranged wife, the former Lita Grey.

Mrs. Chaplin says that her first duty is to look after her children's welfare. She announced yesterday that she was thinking of nothing else. She said she had refused an offer to go on the stage and in fact had no desire for a career.

"My children come first. I intend to see that they are brought up properly and receive a good education," she explained.

The comedian, who has abandoned work on his unfinished picture, yesterday called at the home of Mrs. Chaplin's grandparents, where she is living with the two boys, for a second visit with his sons. Mrs. Chaplin abandoned herself from the role while the father played with the boys.

In the meantime all the activities at the Chaplin studio have ceased. Officials announced that the plant probably would remain shut down until the first of the year. They explained that the interruption of work of the Chaplin picture already had cost approximately \$100,000, and that each day's delay would cost an additional \$15,000.

Chaplin's attorney, Lloyd Wright, explained that his client was "too low in spirit and mind to go on with the comedy." The lawyer added that negotiations with Mr. Beebe, representing Mrs. Chaplin seeking a settlement of the couple's marital difficulties, was practically at a standstill.
