SPECIAL ROAD TAXES VOTED BY 33 DISTRICTS

Large Sum of Money to Be Raised During Year for Improvements.

PROJECTS ARE NAMED

Each District Specifies Where Money Is to Be Spent—Payment Is Ordered.

Thirtythree road districts of Douglas County have voted special taxes to take care of improvement work during the coming year. Forty-four districts held elections but eleven of them voted down the propositions offered. Of the 33 districts voting taxes, 18 have gone the limit, authorizing a levy of 10 mills, the most that can be voted in one year by a district. Two paving jobs, one west of Roseburg towards Melrose, and the other leading Glendale with the Pacific Highway have been authorized. The districts voting taxes and the projects upon which the money will be expended, are as follows:

District 39, South Deer Creek, 2 mills, general repaving.
District 40, Drew, 10 mills, Elk Creek road to the Jackson county line.

District 41, Melrose, 6 mills, 1 mill on the Otisville road, 1 mill on the Dorner section, 1 mill on the Cleveland road, 1 mill on the Callahan road, 1 mill on the Woodruff section and 1 mill on the Elgar road.

District 73, Reedport, 8 mills, completion of the McKinney hill extension of the North Fork road to A. D. Edgerton's ford; 3 mills on the Sulphur Springs and North Fork road.

District 74, 10 mills, Leon Lake, travelling and grading all roads.
District 41, Brewer district, Myrtle Creek, 3 mills, Buck Fork, Bilger Creek and Frozen Creek roads and also piece leading to cemetery.

District 4, Reedport, 10 mills, Sulphur Springs road, starting at boat landing to west branch. One-half of tax to be spent on the new survey to North Fork from Sulphur Springs.

District 70, Oakland, 3 mills, 23 mills for grading and packing on the Elburn road, beginning at the end of the rock work, and 2 mills on the Wilson road.

District 71, Glendale-Creek, 10 mills, 5 mills between Lone Rock Bridge and De Bernard's 2 mills on the south side of the Umpqua and 3 mills on McCann Hill on the Rock Creek road.

District 12, Looking Glass, 2 mills, Coss Bay Wagon road from a line at the top of Looking Glass Hill to the Honey Valley district line.

District 56, Ten Mile, 10 mills, eight mills on the A. E. Hushnell road and 2 mills for maintenance.
District 28, Wilbur, 23 mills, one mill on the Wilbur-Garden Valley road; 13 mills on the Brodzo road.

District 21, Curtin, 5 mills, 23 mills to be applied on the Bear Creek road; 23 mills on the Buck Creek road.

District 52, Oakland, 5 mills, 23 mills to be applied from the Charles Hamilton place to the west end of the district and 23 mills from Hamilton's to Oakland.

District 49, Leon Lake, 10 mills, from the J. A. Boak place to the mouth of Mill Creek.

District 3, Gardiner, 10 mills, 5 mills to be spent on the county road leading from the Roosevelt highway north of Gardiner to the Lane county line; four mills on the Roosevelt highway; 1 mill on the road leading from the corner of Commercial and West streets in the town of Gardiner eastwards to the intersection of Commercial and Front streets, thence north on Front street to the Roosevelt highway; 1 mill on the Gardiner-East Gardiner road.

District 24, Yoncalla, 23 mills, to be distributed to the Elkhead-Yoncalla, Bopth, Howell, Scotts Valley and Daugherty roads.

District 19, Glendale, 5 mills, from the end of the pavement on the Glendale road to the junction on the Pacific highway for paving.

District 47, Camas Valley, 10 mills, all roads.
District 47, Sunshine Valley, 4 mills, Sunshine School house to Deer Creek road.

District 42, Myrtle Creek, 5 mills, from Kelley bridge to Nugget post office on South Myrtle.
District 27, Roseburg-Melrose, 10 mills, paving west of Roseburg.

District 69, Tyoe, 6 mills, from Umpqua post office to the line below Rock Creek School House.
District 73, Anchor, 10 mills, for finishing the road through Meranda and McGinnis property on the 1926 survey and extending the survey.

District 23, Rice Valley, 3 mills, from the Rice Valley school house to the Yoncalla city limits.
District 25, Yoncalla, 19 mills, on the new road beginning at Mrs. Moore's then running south-east of Paul Ludwig's, thence south to P. P. Ceybird's and also for graveling and grading on the market road.

District 22, Yoncalla, 5 mills, 23 mills on the Skelley road and 23

District 5, Sutherlin, 2 mills, from pavement to Shupe's corner and elsewhere where needed.

Texas Wives Under Big Legal Handicap.

Archais Constitution Doesn't Permit Them to Control Business Affairs.

DALLAS, Dec. 3.—A Texas wife lost a foot in a street car accident. She won a judgment of several thousand dollars in a suit for loss of the member, but her husband

collected and spent the money. Another woman worked for her living. Her spouse, who was a wastrel, appropriated her week's pay and applied it to his own debt. The court upheld him, returning the law that in Texas a wife's earnings are under her husband's exclusive control.

Husband is Benefactor.

Such is the legal status of some wives in Texas as the state's first woman governor prepares to leave office. Many maintain that the election and the defeat of the woman governor had nothing to do with the emancipation of women. The presence of a woman governor, however, has accentuated the legal status of women.

In Texas, rents and revenues from a wife's separate property, and her wages, do not belong to her but are a part of the community property which is under the husband's exclusive control.

He Controls Wife's Profits.

She cannot encumber or convey her separate real estate without her husband's signature. She cannot be the joint maker of a note nor the surety on a bond without

the joinder of her husband. If she is in business, her profits are in his control.

If an unmarried woman is a partner in business, her marriage dissolves the partnership, because a married woman's disabilities are such that she cannot continue in the relation of a partner, even with her husband.

Evasion impossible.

When Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson became governor she had a court declare her a "feme sole" (unmarried woman), for trading purposes, under a 1911 statute, but lawyers state this law has little practical effect on a married woman's status, since she is bound by constitutional limitations.

Among legal causes for divorce, one act of adultery on a wife's part is sufficient, but a husband must have abandoned his wife and lived with another woman.

Legislatures have struggled for half a century to lift some of these limitations, but the Supreme Court has held that the legislature can neither diminish nor enlarge the constitutional definition.
