DENBY BIG AID TO DEFENSE IN OIL LEASE CASE

Former Secretary of Navy Takes Responsibility Charged to Fall.

TESTIMONY IS VITAL

Witness Says His Advice to President Harding Led to Reserve Leasing Communication.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Much of the responsibility for the oil leasing policy of 1922 was shouldered in court here today by Edwin S. Denby, then secretary of the navy.

Called by the attorneys defending former Interior Secretary Albert B. Fall, and Edward L. Doheny, the oil magnate, on a conspiracy charge in connection with the acquisition of the Elkhills lease, the former naval secretary said he himself had suggested to Fall that the naval oil reserves be transferred from the navy to the interior department to permit steps to prevent draining by private wells adjoining.

Fall said he would help as much as he could to that end, the witness continued. Denby then broached the subject to President Harding who issued the transfer order. Fall helped draft it and Harding signed it in June, 1921, while Denby was out of the city. Some officers of the navy approved the transfer and the president was acquainted with the fact before he issued the order.

Idea of Navy Origin

The former secretary said the first suggestion of a storage project at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, also originated in the navy department and that navy officers first thought of the plan to convert naval crude oil into fuel oil for storage under a certificate plan which would not require enabling legislation by congress. The Pearl harbor contract subsequently went to Doheny.

Denby approved the conversion proposal, he said, after the plan had been held to be legal by the judge in the Doheny case. Denby began his testimony with a resume of his public career. He told of his service in the navy during the Spanish American war, of his membership of the Michigan legislature and late of congress, and of his 22 months in the marine corps during the world war, 16 months of it as an enlisted man.

Denby Advised Harding

He said that very shortly after he entered the Harding cabinet in 1921 he was advised that the naval oil lands in California were being drained by private wells near the rim of the public domain.

"I was very much disturbed by the situation," he said. "His first move, he said, was to solicit the cooperation of Secretary Fall of the interior department."

"I told him of the difficulties I saw and asked him if his department could give us any help," said Denby.

"What did Fall say?" asked defense counsel.

"He said his department had all the work it could handle, but would be glad to do what he could."

"And did you speak to any one else?"

"Yes, I presented the matter to the president."

"Did you say in substance, 'I urged the president to issue an executive order transferring the naval reserves to the interior department?'"

"What did the president say?"

"He said he would do so."

"Did Secretary Fall assist in drafting such an order?"

"He did."

Doheny Back In Court

The former navy secretary, who resigned after he had come under heavy fire during the senate oil inquiry of 1924, was preceded on the stand by a half dozen defense character witnesses, and by A. W. Ambrose, a former official of the bureau of mines, who had been named by previous witnesses as having helped draft the royalties terms of the Doheny Elk Hills lease. Ambrose testified that the royalties were in fact negotiated by navy officials with Doheny representatives. Defense counsel disclosed today that Doheny probably would take the stand for questioning about his oil leases, and the \$100,000 he advanced to Fall before the lease awards were made.

This morning Mr. Doheny was back at his place in the court room, and his physicians said he appeared definitely on the way to recovery.

He still was obviously weak, however, and his infected arm, which has required two minor operations during the past five days, still was in bandages and a sling.

Fall Faces Second Trial

80 PER CENT WET, BUT VOT EDDY, IS PIERCE'S CLAIM

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 8.—Casual Americans who participated in hot political campaigns and then let party machines run the country, were ripped up the back by Governor Walter M. Pierce of Oregon, who also hurled a shaft at people who "vote the other fellow dry and are wet themselves behind closed doors."

These, he said in an interview, throwing mudballs.

The Oregon executive is here today to address a Methodist men's conference.

Describing himself as a "prohibitionist for 43 years," Mr. Pierce said sixty per cent of the country votes dry, but is actually wet, adding:

"Men honestly trying to enforce the prohibition law are without the support of the people. They are deserted by the Christian thinking people when trying to perform their duty."

Christians are easily misled by politicians, the governor said, condemning the "vote 'er straight" cry of political parties where a ballot is concerned. This doctrine, he declared, may lead to wrecking our party form of government. True Americans must be Americans first and party politicians second.

"By nature of their training, which is one of having faith in mankind, the Christian people are the most easily misled of any class of citizens. Because of their faith it is easy for unscrupulous, adroit and designing politicians to get to the flock of Christianity and mislead it."

LUMBERJACK IS HELD AS SUSPECT IN MURDER HUNT

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8. — The police today picked up George Hutchins, a lumber jack from Portland, on suspicion that he might be the dark stranger who has killed a number of women in the northern city. San Francisco and elsewhere Hutchins was pointed out to detectives by Willard McGlone, a Portland lumberman, who is visiting here. McGlone said that Hutchins strongly resembled the descriptions of the stranger.

Hutchins admitted having come from Portland, but stoutly denied all knowledge of the stranger and his crimes.
