IMMIGRATION ACT RESULTS PRAISED IN DAVIS' REPORT

Rejection of Undesirable Aliens at Ports Abroad Improves Grade of New Citizens.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Administration of the Immigration laws, vested in the Labor Department, during the past year was "the most satisfactory since the adoption by Congress in 1921 of a limitation policy."

Secretary Davis of the Labor Department said today in his annual report: Due in part to the stationing of United States medical and immigration inspectors abroad, the number of immigrants excluded after a long journey to this country was reduced to a minimum.

"Thus there has been realized the second step toward the ideal of selected immigration," the Secretary said. "The act of 1921 which gives to United States consular officers abroad a certain amount of discretion in the granting of visas where doubt arises as to the admissibility of an intending immigrant was the first. The stationing of our immigration and health officers abroad in the countries furnishing 90 per cent of the immigration is the second. It is my opinion that a third and final step in a complete process of selecting immigration can be accomplished if Congress will but approve some method of priority in the granting of what are now referred to as 'non-preference' quota visas. Of quota immigrants, on the ground of humanity, I would provide for preferences to be issued to husbands, wives, and minor children of alien residents in the United States."

Would Exempt Quota.
"Wives and unmarried children under 18 years of a citizen of the United States are non-quota immigrants under the act of 1921, which is as it should be, but the class should be extended to include the husband of an American citizen and a provision should be added permitting the entrance, if the quota be exhausted, of minor unmarried children and dependent fathers and mothers of citizens of the United States."

The Secretary repeated recommendations first made in 1925, that Congress allow the importation of special or skilled labor, under careful restriction, when need exists in American industry. This expansion of the total immigration possible, he suggested,

should be balanced off by empowering the president to shut off immigration entirely during periods of industrial depression in the United States.

Never has the nation been in a situation more prosperous and contented, Mr. Davis said. "America is today the richest country that has ever existed," he declared. "The prosperity of America is one in which the American workers fully share. The poor we still have with us, but hopeless poverty except, perhaps, among the aged and infirm, is now almost unknown."

HALF OF IDAHO'S WOOL POOL SOLD; 31 TO 36 CENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 8.—Approximately 685,000 pounds or close to half of the big Idaho wool pool, put up for sale here yesterday, was sold. The other half of the 1,369,000 pound pool will be offered for sale probably right after the first of the year. Some lots may be sold privately.

The sale was well attended with buyers bidding actively although offers generally were low. Prices ranged from 31 to 36 1/2 cents a pound on the lots sold. While many of the best clips were disposed of, there were several well-known lots of fine wool on which offers were rejected. Buyers who represented eastern firms, made the highest offers, outbidding most of the local wool men. The Lafayette Woolen Mills of Rhode Island, and Haines, Bromfield and Kin-kadee of Boston were the two largest buyers. Purchases made by them will be shipped east immediately.

GOOD PRICES EXPECTED FOR XMAS TURKEYS

Market to Open at 45 Cents or Better According to Indications.

QUALITY EXCELLENT

Prevalence of Young Toms Expected to Put Premium on Birds From This County.

The Christmas turkey market will open this week, although the bulk of the birds are not expected until next week, receiving dates being the 15th, 16th and 17th. One buyer, however, is now said to be in the field contracting in the Oakland neighborhood for turkeys to be delivered at Oakland on the 10th for shipment to distant eastern markets.

Indications are that the Christmas buying will be the best for many years. The price, it is believed, will be in the neighborhood of 45 cents per pound, or better, and the receipts, so far as Douglas county is concerned, will be eagerly sought by buyers for the Christmas trade. It is believed, because the birds will be of such exceptional quality.

Locally young hens bring the best price, but on the city markets it is the young gobblers that go at a premium, and consequently buyers are willing to add a little to their price when they can procure particularly choice lots of young gobblers to supply the city dealers. At Thanksgiving time the small percentage of gobblers in the birds killed was particularly noticeable. The gobblers matured later than did the hens, and as a result the Christmas birds will run larger in percentage of gobblers, so that the trade demands will be better supplied and the trade stimulated.

The Christmas turkey market promises to be exceptionally good. The fowls purchased at Thanksgiving time were largely disposed of, and the cold storage holdings are reported to be extremely light. Therefore if there is the usual demand on the part of consumers the market should absorb the Christmas offerings.

Wholesale dealers are expressing fear of the high prices through their trade journals. They declare that at the high retail price, which the buying dealers will make necessary, consumers will turn to geese, ducks, chickens or other fowls for their Christmas dinners rather than turkey. At the existing price it would be ruinous for the wholesaler to have to put his birds in storage and chance the probability of an equal price next year. Consequently they do not expect, they state, to stock up heavily in excess of the orders obtained previous to buying time.

On the other hand, with the market short in supply there is apt to be sufficient competitive buying to supply orders to keep the price up, which will be to the benefit of the grower. The main fear is that the price will attract foreign shippers and a great number of birds imported from South America, in which case the market will be affected.

Douglas county is this year coming to the front again in the turkey industry after many years of neglect. At one time Douglas county produced more turkeys than any similar area in the country, but in the last few years other commercial crops have attracted the attention of growers, while the low prices paid for turkeys discouraging many poultry raisers. Recently, however, the turkey market has been stimulated and the prices paid have been encouraging, while the losses in other farm crops caused many to turn to turkeys for farm profits. The work this year has been well justified and the turkey growers have made good money. Douglas county is particularly adapted to the raising of turkeys and birds from this section, because of their high quality, nearly always bring a higher price than turkeys raised in any other portion of the country. Indications are that growers are becoming more and more interested in turkey raising and that within a few years Douglas county will again be far in the forefront in this important and growing industry.

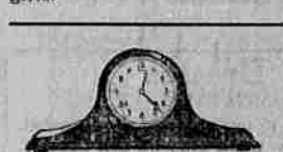

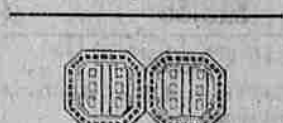

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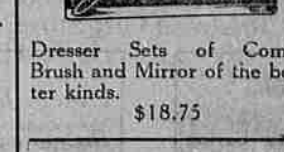
