WHERE CAN WE GET WITH THIS CONDITION?

How the schedule of Southern Pacific freight rates places Roseburg at a great disadvantage is shown in the preface to the annual report of J. E. McClintock, president of the Chamber of Commerce. Selecting canned goods for illustration, Mr. McClintock stated that the freight rate per hundred pounds from Portland to San Francisco was 28 cents, to the same destination from Salem 32 cents, from Eugene 35 cents and from Roseburg 45 cents. It was cited further that apples, for example, could be purchased in Roseburg, shipped to Salem, canned there and re-shipped back through Roseburg to San Francisco cheaper than the Roseburg cannery could sell the commodity direct on the San Francisco market.

In the face of such unjust discrimination what chance for success has a local industry competing in outside markets? And under such a handicap how can we expect to secure new industries aside from those which would depend on local patronage alone? It is also well to ask if the city intends to submit to a continuance of the discrimination, or whether there will be a protest with a real punch behind it? Let's have concerted action and impress upon the proper authority the fact that industries in Roseburg are just as much entitled to a square deal as those in other cities. An aggressive movement now would be timely. Freight rates all over the country are being assailed, particularly those relating to products of the soil, in which commodities Roseburg is chiefly interested. Pertinent to the local situation is the following excerpt from the annual report of Secretary of Agriculture Jardine, given to the public today:

"Transportation charges, although not overhead in the proper sense of that term, nevertheless are often a burdensome, uncontrollable factor in farm business. Farm commodity prices especially in areas distant from markets, are seriously depressed by high freight rates. It is my conviction, often stated, that we must have substantial readjustments in freight rates. There have been no freight rate reductions of importance on agricultural commodities in the last year. [The Department of Agriculture's index of freight rates indicates that they are still 58 per cent higher than before the war.]

The greatest problem in this country is lawlessness, according to a ballot recently taken among the members of the National Economic league. The fundamental idea of democratic government is that the people shall go together and establish certain rules or laws for the general good, and unless these rules are obeyed, the general good will not be secured. A school in which the rules are constantly broken will not do much work, and similarly a country in which the laws are ignored will fall far short of the results it might obtain. When people break the laws, they not merely spoil the results aimed at by such regulations as far as they are concerned, but they help to spread abroad an impression that the laws have broken down, so that everyone can do as he pleases. The result is that all kinds of harmful abuses flourish.

\$5 INCREASE IN DIVORCE FILINGS SUBJECT OF TEST

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10.—Constitutionality of an act of the 1925 legislature providing for an additional \$5 filing fee in divorce cases is attacked in the case of Mrs. Margaret Wright of Portland against Joseph Beveridge, Multnomah county clerk, which was argued in the supreme court yesterday.

The act was for the purpose of providing funds to apply to increased salaries granted district attorneys. In the suit Mrs. Wright demands that the county clerk should accept as a filing fee in a divorce case the statutory amount less the \$5.

Unquestionably the average minister leads a more careful life than the average layman; so when that particular preacher conspired with his wife to go to such spectacular lengths to gyp his church out of \$57.00, they must have been in a terrible need of money.

It is not right to subject a minister or anybody else to such pressure. It is not right that any church in a country that is enjoying unparalleled prosperity, should so poorly pay a pastor that he is impelled to steal. It is not fair to place anybody in the way of too much temptation. It would be a sin to put a truly hungry boy in a pantry filled with jam and cakes and pies that he could not eat without making himself a thief.

NUT GROWERS OF OREGON ASK FOR PROTECTIVE LAWS

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Dec. 10.—Salem was chosen for the next annual convention of the Western Nut Growers association, at the close yesterday of a two-day meeting. M. P. Adams of Salem, was elected president; Ira Powell, Monmouth, Oregon, vice president; A. A. Quarberg, Vancouver, Wash., Washington vice-president; C. A. Shuster, Corvallis, secretary-treasurer.

Adequate tariff protection for the growing American nut industry against invasion of foreign nuts is asked in a resolution adopted at the convention. An embargo by Oregon, California and Washington against eastern walnut plants was urged owing to alleged diseased conditions of the eastern stock. Another resolution asked an embargo against importation of shelled nuts, which were declared to deteriorate rapidly.

Diet and Health

ALCOHOL IN BREAD?

It seems to be generally conceded that those who have been alcoholic and are breaking their habit, consume large amounts of candy, and it is a well recognized fact that candy engenders a craving which is quite intense.

Does the candy produce an alcoholic intoxication and craving? There are always some yeast germs which get into the intestinal tract and whether the fermentation of the excess sweets does cause an appreciable amount of alcohol sufficient to cause the craving, has not been determined, as far as I know. I don't remember ever reading of any scientific work on the subject.

Bread and other starches have come in for condemnation on the alcohol question also, so you will be interested to read an excerpt from an article, "The Chemistry and Physiology of Bread, Biscuits and Crackers," written by J. P. Street, on the amount of alcohol in these products. I'll quote: "The use of any yeast naturally gives rise to the presence of small amounts of alcohol in the finished product. Bolas found from 0.22 to 0.40 percent of alcohol in new bread, or about 16 grains per average loaf... so that the danger of alcoholic stimulation from eating bread is indeed remote."

(As there are approximately 80 grains to the teaspoonful, there is, then, approximately one-fifth of a teaspoonful to the average loaf of bread.)

Most of us like bread so much

that we are glad to absorb it from any sinister trait. When we think of a good meal, we always think of some good bread with it, and bread (especially whole grain bread with milk) is a valuable addition to the diet. Being more or less neutral in taste, bread serves to accentuate the tastes of other foods. However, those who are inclined to overweight almost invariably eat too much bread, and, of course, butter with it, and bread and butter is probably the cause of more overweight than any other factor in the "eats," not even excepting candy.

As excess of starchy foods is also unwise for those suffering from acid stomach and rheumatic conditions and some other ailments. Of course, for that part, any excess of any principle of the diet—the meat element or the fat—are unwise also.

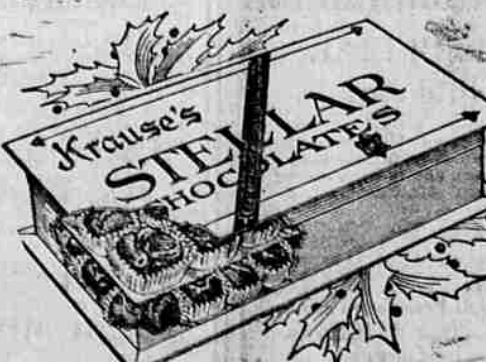

CADET TRYING TO STAND PROPERLY BREAKS HIS NECK

WORCESTER, Mass., Dec. 10.—A West Point cadet who broke his neck while trying to meet the academy's standards of erect posture is recuperating at his home here. He hopes to rejoin his classmates next June.

Adrian J. Van Leeuwen, a first year man, contracted measles soon after entering the academy in July and when he reported again for instruction an upper classman noticed he was not standing straight at drill.

As was customary, the senior ordered him to report to another upper classman for instruction and while he was trying to brace himself "to get the small of his back and neck on a straight line so that no light would shine on the back of his neck," it was noticed he was in pain.

An examination revealed a bone in the neck had been broken and an investigation board found an "anatomical peculiarity" responsible for the injury.

STATE TEACHERS TO HEAR SIX OF OREGON FACULTY

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 9.—Six University of Oregon faculty members will appear on the program at this year's meeting of the Oregon State Teachers' association, which meets in Portland December 28-30.

Dr. Henry D. Sheldon will speak before the principals' section and the library section of the meeting. Earl B. Douglass, professor in education, will speak to principals on "state uniform grading system."

F. L. Stetson, another professor in education, will speak on "the supervision of high school teaching." Harold S. Tuttle will report on the reorganization of the state department of education. Dr. Homer P. Rainey will talk on "school finance in Oregon." Dr. D. W. Debusk will tell of investigations carried on in the grade schools.

F. C. Wootton and Mrs. Edith B. Patton, both instructors in the university high school, will speak before history and languages sections of the conference.
