PACHITCH, NOTED SERVIAN, DIES IN EIGHTIETH YEAR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

BELGRADE, Dec. 10.—Nokola P. Pachitch, 80, former premier and minister of foreign affairs, died today.

It was Pachitch, premier a dozen times and cabinet minister, probably who received in 1914 the fateful Austrian ultimatum which precipitated the World war.

He was also at the helm in the winter of 1923-24 when a crisis arose over the disposition of Plume, the fate of which had not been definitely settled by the treaty of Rapallo. Restraining the hot heads who demanded forceful action, Pachitch negotiated an agreement by which Plume went to Italy and Baros to Jugoslavia.

His last cabinet was that which resigned in April of this year, to be succeeded by the Ouzounovitch government.

HEADS EUGENE LEGION.

COST OF STATE SUPPLIES REMAINS ABOUT SAME

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10.—Bids opened by the state board of control yesterday on food and clothing supplies for the next six months indicate that expenses will be about the same during the first half of 1927 as during the last half of 1926.

The bid on coffee has dropped from 29 3/4 cents six months ago to 26 1/2 cents. The beef bid is \$7.70 a hundred against \$7.50 last June, and bacon is 8 1/4 cents cheaper. The low bid on flour yesterday was \$5.47 against \$5.52 six months ago. Bran has increased from \$27 a ton to \$29.30 and shorts from \$27.80 to \$31.
