OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 11.—Roseburg is represented at the college this year by 46 students, many of whom are taking an active part in campus life. The registration from Douglas county is 76. The total enrollment, including that of summer session is 4492 for this year.

AVIATOR FERRENZE KILLED IN CRASH

LONG BEACH, Cal., Dec. 10.—Lieutenant Chad Ferrenze, naval aviator of San Diego, was killed here today in the crash of his pursuit plane from a height of 250 feet while attempting a landing at the municipal air field. Lieutenant Ferrenze and eight other members of a squadron of naval aviators from San Diego were landing on the field when the accident occurred. The plane got out of control and went into a nose dive, observers said. The planes were here to participate in maneuvers with the Pacific fleet.

TELEPHONE COMPANY ADDS TO ITS FACILITIES FOR HANDLING PICTURES BY WIRE

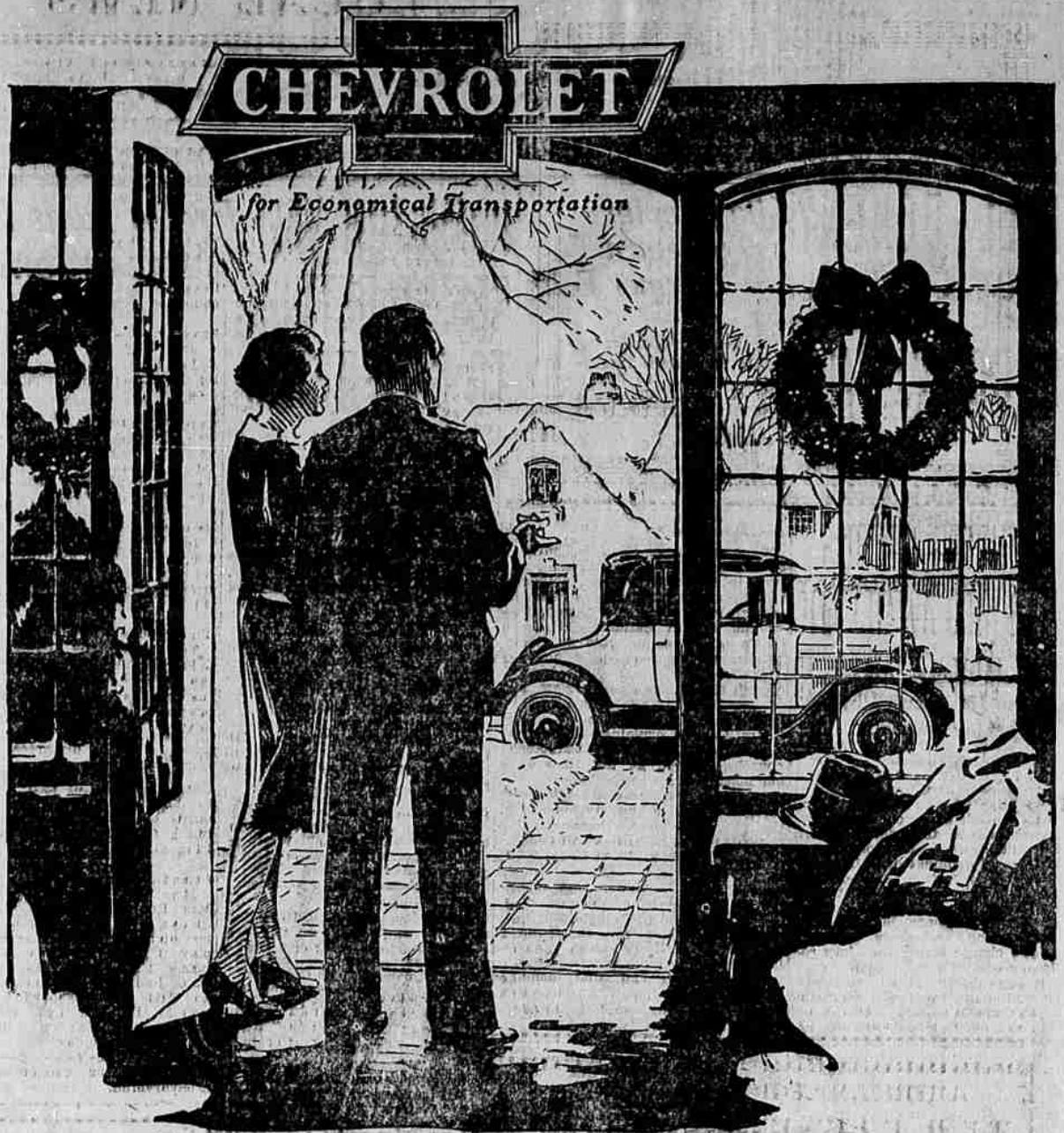
A new sending and receiving station for the transmission of pictures by wire has just been established by the American Telephone and Telegraph company in Boston, Mass. This new station for telephotograph work makes the fourth of its kind in this country, as New York, Chicago and San Francisco have been sending pictures by telephone for some time.

At the same time this addition to the telephotograph equipment was announced a substantial reduction in the rates for this service was made. This reduction was made possible by the further development in this new art and to increased use of it, as a great many firms and newspapers have utilized this speedy picture service to transmit important events and documents.

It is now possible to send a single picture from New York to San Francisco for \$45.00 or Chicago to San Francisco for \$35.00 and from Boston to San Francisco for \$30.00. This is a decrease of \$15 on each of the first two rates. The rate for sending a picture from San Francisco to New York and Chicago has dropped from \$75 to \$50.

The time consumed in the actual sending of these pictures over the telephone lines is less than ten minutes, which means that events that occur in the east may be accurately reproduced in the west almost at the same time that they occur. The use of the air mail has made it possible to have these pictures in the northwest the day after they are sent from the east.

The size of the pictures transmitted in this manner is about five by seven inches, and the hours for handling them are from 3 a. m. to 9 p. m. daily except Sunday, and on Sundays from 10:30 a. m. until 4:30 p. m.

CHINESE RELEASE

ONE PRISONER; 2 OTHERS IN PERIL

at Foochow say the Rev. B. G. AMOY, Dec. 11.—Reliable sources at Kuitien, 80 miles northwest of there, who was kidnapped December 1, has been released. It was learned that the missionary had been taken by bandits at the instance of disgruntled students. He reported that he had been treated kindly. No ransom was asked.

Officials of the Cantonese government have telegraphed to Foochow a repudiation of the action of students there who overran the city last week after the northern forces had been dispersed, killing several northern officials and menacing those who attempted to stop them.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Two American women missionaries are reported to be isolated in Yunchang, Yunnan province, China, through the capture of the city by Chinese bandits, who massacred many of the inhabitants.

Reports from China today said the two missionaries were British, but the China island mission, to which they are attached, said they were believed to be American.

COUNTY HEALTH UNIT TO GIVE IMMUNIZATIONS

The County Health Unit is beginning a weekly immunization clinic to be held in the Health Unit office every Saturday morning from 9:30 a. m. to 12 o'clock. The clinic is for the purpose of immunizing children against diphtheria and vaccination against smallpox. Children from 1 year of age up will be immunized against diphtheria, and from 6 months up against smallpox.

All mothers wishing to have their children protected against diphtheria or smallpox should bring them in to the immunization clinic. The immunizations will be done at cost. The health unit can furnish further information to anyone interested.
