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THE YULKINIDE SPIRIT.

Roseburg's Yuletide spirit is greatly enhanced by the adornment of its business streets with Christmas trees in common with nation-wide custom.

The usual prominent part which trees will play in this year's Christmas celebration the country over is indicated by an Associated Press dispatch saying that the nation's bill for trees will be about \$5,000,000.

"Cut your Christmas trees properly for conservation is wise. This when done properly means a thinning which the forest needs.

The Nature Association agrees with Prof. Woodbridge Metcalf of the School of Forestry of the University of California, who says:

"Because of the wastage and an exaggerated notion of the influence of Christmas tree cutting on the future supplies of timber for the nation some well intentioned but misguided individuals have, in recent years urged that the cutting of Christmas trees be prohibited by law or at least frowned upon by forward looking citizens.

"The success of the movement for forest protection depends largely on the development of a very widespread appreciation of the forest in the minds of the American people. There is probably no better way of instilling a love for trees in the hearts of the rising generation than the use of the little evergreen as the central figure of the Christmas Festival."

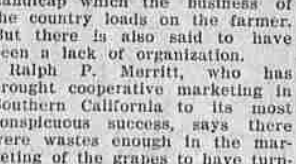

BEAUTY CHATS

GLOSSY HAIR

You can do a lot for dull hair by brushing it, and a lot for dead looking hair by this method involving massage of the scalp.

So brush and brush if you want glossy hair. And if your hair goes oily quickly, and apparently goes oily more quickly as the result of the frequent brushing, do not discontinue this very good habit. Simply, between shampoos, sprinkle the hair with powdered orris and brush and brush and brush—brushing out the powder, leaving the hair clean and soft and lustrous, and giving your scalp another massage.

I'd suggest ten minutes vigorous brushing a day. It will make the hair grow thicker and longer. If you're bobbed you may not relish the idea of hair growing long at a very fast rate! It will help do away with dandruff; that's the plague of more than half of us.

Blame your felt hat, or recent neglect of your hair, or anything else, if your hair goes oily very quickly after a shampoo. It shows the scalp needs treatment, either by you, or by a specialist—probably it needs nothing more than a little attention with hair tonics.

"I would be sure to tell her that she is doing finely, and I would be sparing of criticism. Appreciation of her efforts will encourage her to still better efforts."

"There are two ways of going about installing a maid. One way is to tell her everything all at once, thereby discouraging her and—probably losing her. The other way is to teach her things gradually and keep her."

I believe that if housekeepers would not expect perfection of the assistants in their kitchens, they would not find it so difficult to get a maid. Another mistake they make is to expect twelve-dollar efficiency from a ten-dollar maid.
