AFRICAN JUNGLE GIVES AMERICANS SEVERE ORDEAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, Dec. 13.—Dr. H. L. Magoon, formerly of Chicago, and Dr. Dan W. McMillan of Birmingham, Ala., big game hunters, have reached Capetown after an expedition into the African jungle, begun last May, which was replete with most trying times. Dr. Magoon has been practicing dentistry in Salisbury, Rhodesia, for some time.

The hunters reached Capetown Saturday night, says a dispatch to the Daily Express. Dr. Magoon was suffering from an injury to his eye, due to the explosion of his gun, and a dislocated shoulder, sustained when he fell from his spirited horse. McMillan is nursing an infected arm growing out of lacerations made by a thorn. Dr. Magoon's negro housekeeper, who was brought back by the party, has jungle fever.

Dr. McMillan, who financed the expedition, joined the hunters when two cars in charge of Dr. Magoon reached Grootfontein, British Bechuanaland, in mid-June. It was his intention to shoot black-maned lions and giant rhinoceros. At Angola, Portuguese West Africa, a white official of the Portuguese outpost suspected them of being British spies and kept them under native guard. The original guide of the party, a professional hunter named Piennar, supported the Portuguese. He is said to have bribed six natives to say that Dr. McMillan tried to murder him. The expedition escaped one night, leaving Piennar and his wife behind. Eventually the party

MARKETS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13.—Produce houses in Portland's wholesale district were boxed up tight Monday morning with every precaution taken to prevent perishable stocks of fruit and vegetables from freezing. There was no sidewalk displays and the street looked almost as barren as a holiday.

Cold weather is expected to stimulate the demand for the heavier vegetables and will probably reflect later in prices on potatoes, onions, cabbage, spinach, celery and lettuce. It is still too early to learn the actual damage to local truck gardens although growers in the market today report crops badly frozen around Portland.

The cold wave sweeping over the country is expected to put an end to the slump in fresh egg values and caused prices to reset sharply. Prices opened unchanged in the local market at the 49 cent top on extras.

The butter market is steady and unchanged. High score cubes are still in demand and higher values are expected as a result of the cold weather.

Country dressed meats and poultry were nominally steady this morning with not enough trading to establish new levels. The hop market is steady with

ALLIES TO RELINQUISH GERMAN ARMS CONTROL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) GENEVA, Dec. 13.—Inter-allied control of German armaments is to cease January 1 next and in its place the League of Nations, by means of commissions, will ascertain whether Germany is carrying

out the conditions for disarmament laid down in the Versailles treaty. This decision was reached by the foreign ministers in session here outside the meetings of the council of the League of Nations.
