If ever a picture deserved the adjective "stupendous" — Frank Lloyd's "The Eagle of the Sea", at the Antlers Theatre is it. After sitting through eight reels of romance, thrills, smiles and tears, this writer is convinced that the film is worth every cent of the great fortune Paramount must have poured into its making. Although of a spectacular nature, "The Eagle of the Sea" cannot be described as such. It is more than a romance. Although historical, thrilling and adventurous, it cannot be tabulated as any of these. It is all of the above woven together with a deftness of which only Frank Lloyd is capable.

One story, that of the most adventurous body of men ever gathered — weather-beaten buccaners of the Spanish Main — is pictured so accurately that as one views it he wonders whether the exploits of those old seafarers didn't come to life while the picture was being made.

This splendid action picture, Jean Luitto, leader of the Mexican Gulf, who because he aided General Jackson in the Battle of New Orleans, was pardoned for his desertions as a private. Learning of a scheme to involve Eng-

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land and the United States in war, he resumes his sea roving to capture the plotters. A terrific battle takes place in which Jean violates his parole and defeats his enemies.

LIBERTY THEATRE

The most terrible form of duel in the world, the fearful, almost always fatal battle of the South American plainsmen, in which two men, stripped to the waist, last at each other's bodies with heavy-

bull whips until one falls from exhaustion, is the sensational spectacle, staged for the first time in screen history in the new Cosmopolitan production of Vicente Blasco Ibañez, "The Temptress", at the Liberty Theatre for the last time today.

The battle, staged just as it is fought by the cattlemen of the South American pampas, is fought by Antonio Moreno, playing the role of "Roldo", and Roy D'Arcy, who plays the bandit "Manos Doros" in the picture, in which Grete Garbo plays the little role.

Although the actors fought the battle with great care to avoid injuring each other, whips are uncontrollable things, and both men took fearful punishment in making the scenes realistic.

Both were carefully coached in the use of the great bull whips by Colonel Fred Lindsay, famous English officer and explorer, held the world's greatest expert in manipulating these whips. D'Arcy, who in his earlier days managed a South American ranch, knew something of the technique of the whip, beforehand.

FORMER PASTOR

ROSEBURG BAPTIST

CHURCH IS DEAD

Mrs. Addie Aldrich returned last night from Napavine, Washington, where she was called by the death of her father, Rev. J. P. Yarboro, a former Baptist preacher of Roseburg. Rev. Yarboro, who was assistant pastor of the Roseburg Baptist Church during the pastorate of Dr. Eaton, and who had charge of the out stations at Glendale and various other points, died very suddenly at Napavine, December 3, death resulting from heart failure. He was buried at Winlock, Washington, December 5. He had been a Baptist preacher for more than forty years and was active in the work until the time of his death.

Beside the daughter in Roseburg he leaves a son, Marion Yarboro of Olympia, Washington, two daughters in Washington and two daughters in North Carolina. He is also survived by a widow who will make her home with the son in Olympia.
