Drains of Nature

A careful survey of the underground water courses in the carboniferous district (limestone region) of Yorkshire, England, has revealed the fact that there exists in that country an extensive system of subterranean streams, many of which issue miles from the points called "sinks," where the water, which is drained from the surface enters the rocks. Similar phenomena in other parts of the world, not yet carefully investigated, occur on a much larger scale, and recent studies of the ocean bottom near the borders of continents have shown that rivers of considerable size sometimes enter the sea beneath the surface.

Moore's Famous Poem Sold Before Written

The full quotation runs: "The trail of the serpent is over them all," and means, "They are all tarred with the same brush," or "They are birds of a feather." The line is from Tom Moore's poem, "Lalla Rookh."

"Lalla Rookh" is little read today. Moore's fame resting solidly and lastingly on his "Irish Melodies." But Moore was a immensely popular in his lifetime, and a substantial sum for every song he wrote.

Mr. Stephen Gwynne, in his "Life of Moore," tells us that John Murray offered two thousand guineas (\$10,000) for the copyright of "Lalla Rookh" before it was written.

Moore's friends thought he should have more, and gave to Longman the rival publishing house, they claimed Mr. Moore should receive the highest price ever paid for a poem.

"That," said Longman, "was \$3,000 (\$15,000) paid to Scott for 'Rokeby'." Longman was inclined to stipulate for a preliminary perusal. Moore, however, refused, and the agreement was finally worded: "That upon giving into our hands a poem of the length of 'Rokeby' you shall receive from us a sum of \$3,000." It is probable that the publisher did not regret his bargain, for the poem had a tremendous sale.

Dual Set of Manners Sign of Boorishness

Many a man is crabbed, moody and stingy in his home and among his family and servants. But let the doorbell ring! Let a visitor call! As if by magic this man becomes suave and generous. He puts on his company manners.

A story is told of a capable executive who lost an opportunity for promotion because his manners among his business associates were not carried over into his home. The president of the concern, who learned in time the dual code of the man, decided not to trust him in a post where instinctive good manners were a prime requisite. The bear had come home, unaware that his superior had preceded him with the offer of advancement, and, before his meek wife could break the news, had growled out his true nature.

Early History of Books

Zangwill Not Exactly Ideal, Obedient Son

Europe Slow to Make Use of Pyrotechnics

The first European display of fireworks was at Florence, Italy, 1611 years ago, a crude pyrotechnic spectacle being then arranged by a Florentine inventor. It was not until the latter part of the sixteenth century, however, that fireworks were exhibited as a spectacle on anything like a grand scale in Europe, although the Chinese invented and used fireworks in remote times.

The first big fireworks display in England was in 1597, when \$40,000 was spent on a display to celebrate the peace of Ryswick. Another memorable display was seen in London in 1748, following the peace of Aix-la-Chapelle.

Our forefathers of Revolutionary days knew little of fireworks, and it was not until after the Revolution that fireworks spectacles on a grand scale were introduced to celebrate Independence day.

Original Cinderella

An authority says that the story of Cinderella is founded on fact, and that she lived 2,000 years before the Christian era, being known in history as the "Rosy Cheeked Queen."
