EXTENSIONS TO TELEPHONE LINE NOW COMPLETED

Extensive additions to the existing long distance telephone facilities in Southern Oregon, which have been under construction for eleven months are now completed. Eight o'clock Sunday morning, December 19, marked the moment when the new circuits were put into service according to J. H. Farrington, manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

The new additions are part of a general project for the increase of long distance facilities between Northwest points and San Francisco. This project has been necessitated by the constantly growing business and social needs of this community and the Pacific Northwest.

Three additional circuits from the California state line to Ashland, two thence to Medford, one from Medford to Gold Hill and three from Gold Hill to Grants Pass are thus provided. In addition there are two additional circuits from Grants Pass to Glendale Junction, three from Glendale Junction to Canyonville, two thence to Myrtle Creek, thence three additional to Roseburg and one additional circuit from Oakland to Eugene.

For the completion of the new improvements it was necessary to install five hundred and ninety poles, twelve hundred cross-arms and a hundred and thirty-three anchors and guys, and to string three hundred and thirty loop miles of copper wire. The total cost of these improvements approximated \$110,000.

"Increasing long distance traffic, resulting from increased population and business, have made these improvements necessary. Existing business houses are also using long distance telephone service more and more, finding it the most convenient and economical method of getting and maintaining business relations," said Mr. Farrington.

OREGON U. DROPS COACH ELLINGER; LIQUOR RAID ECHO

(Associated Press Local Wire.) EUGENE, Dec. 20.—Harry Ellinger, line coach of the U. of O. varsity football team, will not be reappointed to that position, according to information from university sources. Ellinger's contract was for one year and upon its expiration no new contract will be signed.

Head Coach John McEwan is out of town on a hunting trip and Jack Benefield, graduate manager, is also out of town, having left before news of the Ellinger case came up. Ellinger is hired by the Associated Students of the university. He coached under McEwan at West Point, and was brought to Oregon when McEwan took the football helm here.

The action in letting Ellinger out is believed to have resulted from a liquor raid last summer. Ellinger was arrested, but the case against him was dismissed. Ellinger, having been legally cleared of connection with the liquor party, went ahead with his coaching work, filling out his one-year contract.

SUICIDE LEAVES WARNING AGAINST MAIL ORDER WIVES

Wilmer, aged about 40, found dead yesterday in a gas filled room, left a note in which he warned all men "not to marry a woman from a matrimonial agency." Wilmer declared that his wife, who he obtained through a matrimonial agency, had "ruined his life." He asked that "his wife," now in Phoenix, Ariz., be notified.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 20.—Print butter is being quoted at 52 cents today, an advance of two cents, as announced last Saturday. Cans are selling at 33c. The advance is the result of cold weather throughout the country which curtailed the production and increased the demand.

An advance of two cents is also effective in the butterfat market but prices are badly mixed and bids range all the way from 45 to 21 cents in the country and from 55 to 54 cents delivered Portland. An official butterfat price in this market appears to be a thing of the past.

Pilcher Case Advances

SETTLEMENT NEARS WITH JUDGE SIGNING ORDERS.

Fees Fixed for Persons Connected With Bankruptcy by Federal Jurist.

The settlement of the bankruptcy case of the R. A. Pilcher company, operators of a chain of stores on the Pacific coast, was advanced another step yesterday when Federal Judge Bean signed a number of orders and otherwise disposed of various phases of the case. A. F. Lience, receiver for the bankrupt stores, filed his report with the court, after which Judge Bean appointed Robert Maguire master to hear the disputed claims against the estate.

The chain of stores went into bankruptcy last June. Oregon stores were located at Klamath Falls, Roseburg, Eugene, Albany, Portland and Pendleton, and there were a number of others located in Washington and California. Mr. Lience reported there was \$488,000 cash on hand as a result of operation of the stores up until they were sold. Of this amount creditors will get some 40 per cent of their total claims after \$13,000 has been deducted for court and other costs.

The New York receiver in the bankruptcy was allowed \$1000, while Lience, who has handled the bulk of the detail, was allowed 7 per cent of the money handled by him, which, it was said, will make his fee about \$18,000. Edward R. Eliassen, attorney for the receiver, has been granted fees of \$2500 at Spokane, \$500 at Seattle and \$10,000 at San Francisco. He was granted a fee of \$10,000 here for the work he has done.
