PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—Roy W. WINTER WHEAT SOWN EXCEEDS 1925 AREA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Winter wheat was sown this fall on 41,807,000 acres which is five per cent more than the revised estimate of 39,750,000 acres sown in the fall of 1925, and the condition of the crop on December 1 was 81.5 per cent of a normal, compared with 82.6 last year, and 84.4 the ten year average, the Department of Agriculture announced today.

Possible successors to Hornsby is Rogers Brenahan, a Giant coach, but Brenahan insists that Rogers has no "inside track on the job." The club president was outspoken in his announcement that failure to agree with Hornsby whether he should have a one year or a three year contract was the cause of the trade. Brenahan had offered the playing manager a one-year contract with a yearly salary of \$50,000 but Hornsby remained firm in his demand for a three year term with the same remuneration. His salary had been \$30,000 a year and his old contract still had a year to run.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 21.—Rogers Hornsby is just in his prime and still has many more seasons of playing ability and will be an asset to any team that obtains his services," declared Babe Ruth, a warm friend of Hornsby's, who is filling a vaudeville engagement here, when informed of the sale to the Giants.

"The managerial task before him last year greatly interferred with his playing ability, I believe," Ruth stated.
