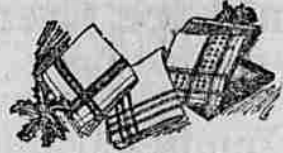

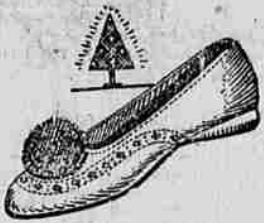

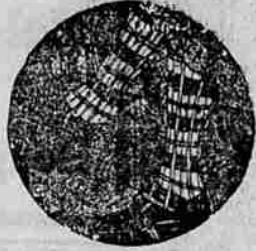

American Husband Now Has Chance to Invest Sum in Six Figures for Christmas Gift.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—The adversity that off-bests kings and the prosperity that has thrived in America have combined in a few years to turn a small section of Fifth avenue into the jewel market for the world.

And today, a survey shows, the perplexed American husband, who has the wherewithal, is fortunately enabled to solve the problem of what to give the wife for Christmas by simply buying her the largest blue-white diamond in the world—available at \$300,000—or a czarist necklace, Josephine trinket, or an emerald at \$175,000.

The diamond, a lone star of amazing brilliance, weighs 127 karats, which, experts say, is good weight for the money. It is larger, too, it is said, than the Kohinoor which flashes on England's queen on special state occasions.

Within a few blocks are to be found other jeweled trinkets which, the dealers contend, make the glories and the splendors of Rome a twinkling insignificance. For never in history, they claim, have such intricate and beautiful things been created with precious stones as at the present day.

For instance: Brooches of mother-of-pearl, inlaid to form clouds and trees, with fountains of diamonds playing in the foreground.

Lorgnettes concealed in crystal rings. Necklaces of invisible flexibility which hoop around the neck under a clasp of a single large gem.

Old gold coins, opening with an invisible spring to display a watch. Watches, giving the days of the week, month and the phases of the moon.
