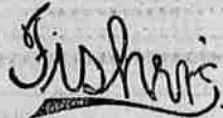

on Colombia's Atlantic coast. They will retraced their flight from that point to France, England and again fly south to Valdivia, which is in about the center, north and south or day of flying will bring the Neuquen, Argentina, almost directly east of Valdivia, across the Andes, is the next stop and another day of flying will bring the aerial conquistadors back to the Atlantic seaboard where they will turn north along the coast. At Buenos Aires the party will descend from water to land, to the Parana River to Santa Fe, Corrientes and Asuncion.

The return to the seacoast will carry the squadron back to Buenos Aires from where it will make its way north, around Cape Darien to the three Guianas. A short hop across the Atlantic will put the squadron in its base at Trinidad. From Trinidad a visit will be paid to Venezuela before the flyers start on the last lap of their journey home.

SMOKING CABINET MADE BY LOCAL FIRM ON DISPLAY

A beautiful smoking cabinet, made by the Roseburg Lumber and Manufacturing company, is on display in the window of Hartha Toggery and is a fine example of the splendid workmanship that can be put out by local industry. The stand is thirty inches high and the wood is of blue gum. It features a finished inlay of ebony and white maple, all hand work, and the interior of the cabinet is composed of shelves, fitted for the storage of tobacco and cigars. A soft polished finish enhances the cabinet both on the outside and interior. The set was designed by Frank Alley, architect for the company, and all the mechanical work was done by Chris Hespness of the cabinet department. The cabinet was put out for a special order and is being displayed preceding delivery. It is a class of work seldom seen except in the larger manufacturing establishments.

STUBBORN FIRE AT C. A. LOCKWOOD LAURELWOOD HOME

The fire department was called out this morning for a stubborn basement fire at the C. A. Lockwood home in Laurelwood. A spark from the furnace apparently caught in a pile of rubbish in the basement and smoldered for considerable time before the fire was discovered. The fire department was greatly handicapped by the volume of smoke which had to be cleared away before the flames could be reached. Although hose was laid and made available in case of necessity, only chemicals were used in fighting the fire. Mr. Lockwood highly praised the department following the fire for the efficient manner in which they handled the situation, and particularly for their care in avoiding any more damage than was absolutely necessary in order to get to the flames which were in a difficult place to reach. The loss will probably amount to over \$1,000, which is covered by insurance.
