**AUTO ACCIDENT
LEADS TO DAMAGE
SUIT IN SUM \$1500**

Suit was filed in the circuit
court today by Elsie Russell
against P. W. Beckley, the action
being one in which Mrs. Russell,
who was injured on October 30,
when struck by an automobile
driven by Lola Beckley, a daughter
of P. W. Beckley, is seeking dam-
age in the sum of \$1500.00. The
accident happened while crowds
were going to a football game at
Finlay field, Mrs. Russell and her
small daughter being knocked
down as they were crossing the in-
tersection of Madrone and Chap-
man streets. It being alleged in the
complaint that the automobile was
traveling on the left side of the
street and at an excessive rate of
speed. Injuries sustained by the
small daughter of Mrs. Russell in
the same accident are not involved
in the present suit.

Mrs. Russell alleges that as a re-
sult of the accident she suffered a
permanent injury, and is seeking
to recover \$22 damages for medical
fees paid out and \$1500.00 for the
injuries sustained. She is repre-
sented by Attorneys R. W. Mar-
sters and B. L. Eddy.

MELLON TARGET ON FLOOR OF SENATE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—
The story that Secretary Mel-
lon advanced \$5,000,000 to the
Republican national commit-
tee for the Harding campaign
of 1920 was repeated on the
senate floor today by Senator
Heflin, Democrat, Alabama,
who told his colleagues that
Secretary Mellon has not de-
nied the truthfulness of the
charge.
"He simply waved his hand,
looked uneasy and said it was
a delirium," Senator Heflin
continued. Then he para-
phrased a line from the poets:
"Old distiller of beer, wine
and rum."
"Mellon, thy name is Delir-
ium."
