expressions of belief in the integrity of Spaker and Cobb.

Wood To Talk Later.
Athletic officials at Yale University, where Joe Wood is baseball coach with another year of his contract to run, expect to listen to his story after the holidays. Wood will be asked to explain his letter to Leonard, in which he spoke of a wager on the Detroit-Cleveland game of September 25, 1919—a game which Leonard charged was "fixed" with the knowledge of Spaker and Cobb.

The sum paid Leonard for the letters that are the basis of the charges, has not been made public but \$20,000 is the figure generally discussed. Henry Killilea, attorney for the league, said he had purchased the evidence, but did not say how much he paid for it.

The investigation also has revealed that since Landis became baseball commissioner there has existed a surveillance system which keeps the players under constant observation.

McGraw Defends Game.
NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—John McGraw has come to the defense of modern ball players as "honest because it is part of their nature to be that way."

Commenting on baseball's most recent scandal, in which Tris Speaker and Ty Cobb have been involved, the veteran New York giant pilot reminds fandom "that this thing happened back in 1919, before the White Sox players decided to throw that series to the Reds. The fact that it is brought to light now does not prove that the game continues to go wrong."

Cobb's Statement.
ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 23.—The Atlanta Journal, in a copyright interview today with Ty Cobb, homebound to spend Christmas with his family in Augusta, Ga., quoted him as categorically denying charges involving him in baseball's latest scandal and remarking "I am not done with Dutch Leonard."

Denying generally that he ever had fixed or connived at fixing any ball game, the Journal says Cobb specifically states that he had no knowledge of the game between Detroit and Cleveland September 25, 1919, being fixed and added: "I do not believe it was fixed."

Regarding betting on games, the "Georgia Peach" is quoted as saying he placed wagers on only two games in which an American league club was involved. These were the first two games of the White Sox and the Cincinnati Reds. Cobb said he bet \$50 on the first and \$100 on the second, and the White Sox lost both. So did Ty.

Referring to the 1919 game in controversy, the Journal quotes Cobb as saying, "I am guilty of just one thing which I regret—I fulfilled a promise to this man Leonard to find out from Wood (Joe Wood, former Cleveland pitcher) after the game how much money had been bet. Leonard had gone west before the game." Cobb said he wrote to Leonard and that his letter was in guarded terms so as not to indicate that there was any betting proposition involved, "but I did not try to bet on that game myself or intend to bet on it."

"So far as I know," Cobb continued, "Judge Landis first heard about this Leonard business from me. I told him about it last summer, in July or August. I've been to Chicago four times in the hope that Leonard would appear. The last time we had the hearing anyway."

Atlanta Plans Welcome.
AUGUSTA, Ga., Dec. 23.—"He may have his faults, but dishonesty is not one of them," Mrs. Tyrus Cobb said today in commenting on the charges involving her husband in baseball's latest scandal. "I believe that Mr. Cobb has completely answered the accusations," she added, "and I wish only to add that I know the charges are untrue in every detail. I know him better than anyone else. He has lived clean and played the game clean. His case is safe in his friends' hands."

Cobb is due to arrive here today and his friends plan a big welcome for him. The city council last night adopted resolutions describing Cobb as "our esteemed citizen and the world's greatest baseball player," and asserting that the charge against him is "untrue and an act of vindictiveness."

"I'm innocent," Wood. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 23.—Innocence of any wrong doing and that he never bet on a "fixed" ball game in his life were the claims today of "Smoky" Joe Wood, Yale baseball coach, who has been connected by Baseball Commissioner K. M. Landis with the latest scandal in professional baseball.

Wood said that he had bet on the game played between Detroit and Cleveland on September 25, 1919, but there was no agreement to which team should win as charged by Hubert "Dutch" Leonard.

Wood said, before going to see Burnside Winslow, chairman of the baseball committee of the Yale Athletic association:

"I am absolutely innocent of wrong doing and never bet on a 'fixed' game in my life. What I had to say about the 'baseball scandal of 1919' uncovered in Chicago a few days ago was said under oath to Commissioner Landis. Any further statement should come from him."

ERROR FOUND IN BOUNDARIES OF FOUR COUNTIES.

county.

Upon a map the discrepancy in boundaries may be easily shown.

The existing maps show the Douglas-Klamath line making a dip into the Crater Lake national park, then swinging back north to join the range line, leaving Crater Lake park almost entirely inside Klamath county.

In actuality, however, the Klamath county line strikes west from the sharp angle of this dip into the park for about three miles and then roughly bisects the national park area, going south almost squarely through the center of the lake, then following a roughly triangular course, leaving a gap about six miles wide at the top, and narrowing down until the line intersects the range line between towns 35 and 36 south, so that the line is considerably east of the location shown at present.

This condition puts Crater Lake park in three counties, Lake, Klamath and Douglas, while Lake county is in two sections. The area which rightfully belongs to Douglas county, now shown as a part of Klamath county, amounts to approximately 22,000 acres, while the section belonging to Lake county amounts to about 100,000 acres.

The boundary question was recently referred to Attorney General Van Winkle, who is to call the attention of the legislature to the discrepancies during the coming session in order that the condition may be corrected.

American-Made Toys on Rapid Increase.

1925 Output Worth \$0 Million to Exceed This Year; News Heads Give Ideas.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—American foodstuffs, pushed by American salesmanship, have entered every country of the world.

A recent survey shows that "buyers' resistance" and the economic prejudice of home-farers have capitulated to a tickled palate.

Japan and China smack their lips over steaming corned beef hash and canned sausage. India is growing sturdier on Columbia river salmon and California fruit. And Brazil keeps the American market swamped with demands for canned asparagus.

Tariff Walls Scaled.
Not even tariff walls, which the European nations erected hastily after the armistice, have been greatly effective before the onslaught, export records show.

Salesmanship is largely responsible. Salesmen in foreign countries generally adopt the same methods used in America. It is pointed out. It pays to advertise—anywhere. And canned milk with a Burmese label appeals as strongly to the Asiatic fancy as the American label appeals here.

Imports Follow Immigrants.
In most cases, American goods are not competing with native goods. They are filling a demand they have themselves created. Fish and fruit bulk large in the

exports, but candy stays at home. Confectioners who, on the basis of wartime demand, dreamed of a world-wide sweet tooth for American products, saw a twenty million dollar export drop in one year, when the army returned from abroad. The consumption of sweets was almost entirely among the soldiers and confectionery and tobacco exports now get little further than the West Indies.

Americans are demanding more and more European goods, importers say, while immigrants, conservative in adopting a new country's dishes, cling to their own cuisine. Hard sausage, black bread flour and strong cheese the immigrants want, and there is a large import market in New York that caters directly to the demand.
