PROMINENT NORTHWESTERN BUSINESS MAN IS DEAD

SEATTLE, Dec. 27.—Frederick Charles Johnstone of Seattle, who in 1911 converted the Glorv of the Seas, a clipper built in 1869, into a world's first floating cannery, died here today.

Johnstone, a salmon packer, was credited with creating the first concrete structure in Alaska, the Tongass building at Ketchikan. He was president of the Tongass Trading company and of the Tongass Investment company, Ketchikan concerns, and of the Alaska Fish company and vice president of the Pacific Fisheries association.

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Few Have Ever Found

Humming Bird's Nest

Comparatively few people ever have the pleasure of peeping into a humming bird's nest, to behold two tiny eggs like round white beads, or to see two birdlets which sometimes resemble little beetles. In the first place, the nest is so small and so resembles the surrounding shrubbery that it is easily overlooked. Then, too, it is so cleverly hidden by its wise builders and so disguised in its construction as to require an experienced eye to discover it.

Built of soft, pliant hairs and adorned with bits of moss and feathers, it forms a downy, cuplike, secluded home. The fairy hummer of Cuba, the smallest of all the humming birds, builds a nest so tiny that it can be covered completely with a copper cent. Its eggs look like two little pearls.

The humming bird, more than 500 species of which have been classified, is distinctly American. In the main, it is a tropical bird, as fewer than 20 species are found in the United States.

The one known to residents of states east of the Mississippi is the beautiful ruby throat, Audubon called humming birds "glittering fragments of the rainbow," so gorgeous are they in color.

Soldier's Name Well

"Worth Army Corps"

When the French revolution flamed out, the aristocratic La Tour d'Auvergne, disdaining pleas of his fellow officers to leave France, threw in his lot with the revolutionists. Time after time he emerged from battle with his clothing torn by bullets, but unharmed, and so he gained his reputation of bearing a charmed life. Stories of his amazing courage reached the enemy and inspired terror.

This reputation enabled him to capture San Sebastian, Spain, single-handed. He arrived in a little boat bearing a tiny cannon, disembarked, marched to the citadel, announced he was the advance guard of the French army and demanded that the place be surrendered. The Spanish commandant was so intimidated that he was willing to surrender, but asked La Tour d'Auvergne to fire one shot, so it could not be said he had given up without being attacked. La Tour d'Auvergne obligingly consented. A volley replied, and then the commandant capitulated.

Trombone Long Popular

The trombone has been recognized as a meritorious musical instrument for centuries. The Romans knew it as the tuba duella, and there is some evidence that the trombone was known to the ancient Greeks. The bands that played at the fetes of the doge of Venice when that city was queen of the Adriatic, consisted of trombones only, according to some historians. It is also on record that there were ten trombones in the state band of Henry VIII and six in the state bands of Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth. Really eminent musicians have sometimes played the trombone. Sir George Macfarren preferred it to all other instruments in the orchestra and frequently played it at concerts conducted by Sir Michael Costa. It also was an instrument in which Alexander H. Russell took great delight. —Vancouver Province.

He Got His

Diamond Jim Brady, who used to consume at one sitting at Rector's in New York, by the testimony of George Rector, two, three and four dozen big oysters, a dozen soft shell crabs, six or seven full-grown lobsters, a huge steak topped off with coffee, an entire tray of pastries, and a two-pound box of candy, washed down with three and four carafes of orange juice, was warned often against the many social leeches that preyed on his lavish hospitality.

Cyrus Used Boiled Water

That a safe water supply was considered essential to an army by the military leaders of ancient times is evident from a statement in Herodotus that Cyrus the Great of Persia carried with him on his military expeditions boiled water from the Caspian river, transporting it in silver vessels on four-wheeled wagons. This famous general died about 530 B. C.

The following bulletin has been issued by doctors against worry: "So far as is known," the bulletin says, "no bird ever tried to build more nests than its neighbor; no fox ever fretted because he had only one hole in which to hide; no squirrel ever died of anxiety lest he should not lay by enough nuts for two winters instead of one; and no dove ever lost any sleep over the fact that he did not have enough bones laid aside for his declining years."

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CONGRESS MAY BE ASKED TO PROBE BASEBALL MESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Friends of Ty Cobb and Speaker at the capitol and elsewhere waited patiently today for the two former American League baseball managers to put in an appearance to lay their cases before government officials.

Just what action the men intend to take as a result of the charges made against them in documents made public last week by Kenesaw M. Landis, commissioner of baseball, has not been disclosed.

There were reports that they might ask for an investigation of baseball under the anti-trust laws, or try to interest some members of congress in their cases in an official way, but no steps in such direction were apparent. No engagements were listed for them today at the department of justice or the post office department, while Senator Harris, democrat, Georgia, whose office Cobb was expected to visit, had not been informed that he was in Washington.

Cobb and Speaker were reported last night as being enroute to Washington but neither has been seen around his old haunts here.

Senator Harris said today he was willing to assist Cobb in any way that he could.

"Cobb is a native of Georgia and is held in high regard by the whole state of Georgia," the senator said. "It seems to me that Cobb has been badly treated, and certainly he has a case for damages in the courts. It appears to me to be purely a legal matter, and I am ready to aid Cobb in any way that I can."

CHAPLIN SIGNIFIES SUIT FOR DIVORCE

NOGALES, Ariz., Dec. 27.—The Herald says this afternoon that a prominent attorney of Hermosillo, capital of the state of Sonora, Mexico, says he has been in communication with Charlie Chaplin, motion picture comedian relative to obtaining a divorce under the Mexican laws.

The newspaper says that the attorney will not allow his name to be used in connection with the case. Chaplin, the newspaper says, first wrote the Hermosillo attorney "shortly after his marital break with Lita Grey Chaplin."

HISTORIC HOTEL IN OLDEST CITY OF U. S. BURNED

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Dec. 27.—The famous old Hotel Magnolia, which escaped the conflagration that swept over the ancient part of St. Augustine in 1913, virtually was destroyed by fire today.

Breaking out shortly after one o'clock from undetermined causes, the fire burned down the main structure and damaged the south wing. Police believe all the guests and employees escaped.

The flames spread to adjoining buildings and for a time a large portion of the old business section was threatened. Shortly after 3 o'clock the fire was under control.

Eighty-five of the 95 rooms in the wooden structure were occupied. Although the Magnolia is now a commercial hotel, it quartered a number of tourists.
