Brothers Are Arrested On Liquor Charge
Enmitt and Herbert Crouse, of Lystal siding, near Glendale, were arrested today at McMinville, at the request of Sheriff Starnor, who holds warrants for the arrest of the two young men on a charge of possessing a still. A search of the house which the young men have been occupying, revealed the presence of a 30-gallon copper still, and three barrels of mash. The Crouse brothers left Lystal a few days ago to visit over Christmas with their parents at Newberg.

The discovery was made following the arrest of Carl J. Christensen at Glendale last Saturday. Christensen was picked up by Constable Hayes charged with possession of liquor, a gallon of moonshine being confiscated. Christensen is being held in the county jail on an open charge, but will probably be arraigned for possession. An officer will leave tomorrow to bring the Crouse brothers to Roseburg.

MARION PIONEER DIES

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28.—Francis Xavier Moisan, a pioneer of 1845, died at his home at Brooks today after a short illness. He celebrated his 81st birthday on December 16, having spent his entire life on the farm upon which he was born. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Moisan and in 1872 married Mary Manning, daughter of another pioneer family, who survives him. He is also survived by a brother, Alex Moisan, whose farm adjoins his, and twelve of his fourteen children.

STAGE OPERATOR JALOFF WINS IN SUPREME COURT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28.—An opinion of the supreme court today holds that A. Jaloff of Portland, operator of the Columbia Stages, shall recover \$7356.14 from the United Auto Indemnity Exchange, representing damages paid by Jaloff to persons injured in a traffic accident. The opinion was written by Justice Brown and affirms Judge John H. Stevenson of the lower court for Multnomah county.

The accident was a collision between motor stage No. 48 and an automobile driven by C. A. Wells near Cascade Locks August 17, 1924, in which members of the Wells party were injured. The insurance company set up the defense that the insurance policy did not cover car No. 48, but the supreme court holds that it was the mutual intention of the insurance company and the stage company to cover that particular car when the policy was written. In regard to the will of Alfred Houch, deceased, appeal from Douglas county, suit to contest will. Opinion by Justice Brown. Decree of Judge J. W. Hamilton modified.

AUTO TRUCK KILLS COOS COUNTY BOY

R. B. KUYKENDALL SLATED FOR CREWS' PLACE IS REPORT

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28.—Rumors heard in the capital today would place Major Robert Benson Kuykendall, state Republican committeeman from Klamath county and strong supporter of Patterson in the recent election, as state corporation commissioner, succeeding W. E. Crews, with the new administration which comes into office January 10.

Major Kuykendall is a law partner of his brother Judge D. V. Kuykendall in Klamath Falls. In 1922 he was defeated for the Republican nomination for attorney general by L. H. Van Winkle. He is 35 years of age, the son of Dr. William Kuykendall of Eugene, a graduate of the University of Oregon and Columbia University law school. He saw service as a captain of the 91st division in France. Before going to Klamath Falls he was associated with a law firm in Portland.

CENTRALIA LADY SURVIVES ATTACK OF A STRANGLER

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 28.—Captain of Detectives John T. Moore, of the Portland police, and two of his inspectors, last night at Vancouver, Washington, interviewed Mrs. Sarah Roberts of Centralia, proprietor of a rooming house, who reported yesterday that she had been attacked by a would-be strangler. Captain Moore said he was convinced that the man who attempted to strangle her was not the strangler who killed Mrs. Blanche Myers in Portland some weeks ago, and Mrs. Florence Eltham onks of Seattle. Captain Moore said the Centralia assailant did not fit the description of the man sought for the Portland and Seattle murders.

Exhibiting a bruised throat, Mrs. Roberts reported that a man who gave the name of Mason attempted to choke her after he had inquired about a room. As she struggled with him he warned her: "Shut up or I'll kill you."

Her cries attracted a lodger and the man fled.

SEIZURE OF BOOZE BRINGS STATEMENT FROM CANADIAN

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 28.—Following confiscation of the liquor cargo of the steamer Chris Moeller at Victoria, B. C., W. D. Euler, demolition minister of customs and excise, declared today in Ottawa, "We propose to protect the revenue of Canada and to enforce our treaty with the United States. We have information that cargoes are diverted not only from their stated destinations into the United States, but also into Canada. There is no doubt that the Moeller cargo, which was billed to San Blas, Mexico, was not really going there."

MONSTER OF LAKE OKANOGAN VICTIM OF HEAVY FREEZE

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 28.—Okanogan, sheep-headed monster of Okanogan lake, who started a scare of lake residents last summer, is dead, a victim of cold weather, the Morning Star reported today. He was frozen under by ice which thinly covers the lake's surface.

Peter Simon, half breed Indian of Kelowna, B. C., told of the death struggle, which he alone saw from behind a tree.

"Heaving cracking ice torn asunder by some monster's struggles and thrown into mounds on the shore, the rant form, sinuous and powerful, the tall thrashing for freedom and the huge head bearing a ghastly resemblance to a cheen."

After seeing this Peter crept cautiously to the shore, assured himself the monster was dead, dropped his rifle and ran for home.

FIVE MEN HURT IN WATER FRONT FIRE

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Dec. 28.—Five men were injured, three seriously, and the Amerline-Hewitt Steamship company dock and warehouse at Wilmington were damaged in a fire which broke out from an undetermined cause this morning and was under control in 25 minutes. The men were burned when an oil line under the dock, where the blaze is believed to have started, caught fire. They were given emergency treatment at Wilmington.

GOVERNMENT MAN GIVES ADVICE TO PRUNE GROWERS

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28.—Packers and growers of the Pacific northwest will join hands in an effort to pull the prune industry out of the slump into which it has fallen in the past few years, if plans discussed at a meeting here today are finally put through. Details of the plans have been left in the hands of a committee of five members, who are to report at another meeting to be called by William S. Walton, Salem banker, who presided over today's meeting.

Fourteen growers' organizations and packing industries were represented at the meeting here today, which had been called to discuss the prune situation with B. H. Critchfield, of the federal department of agriculture, who has been in Oregon for the past several weeks making a study of growing and marketing conditions in this section in an effort to find a solution to the problem.

According to Critchfield, the great need of the prune industry is a stabilization of prices and more orderly marketing than has existed in the past. It was with a view to bringing about this remedy that the organization of growers and packers is to be brought into being.

Representatives of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and the Salem chamber who attended the meeting promised the cooperation of those organizations in bringing about the proposed organization.

MUSIC COMMITTEE GIVES PROGRAM AT KIWANIS MEETING
The music committee of the Kiwanis Club had charge of the program for the weekly luncheon of that organization today and sprang several surprises upon the club. One was the first appearance of an orchestra composed of the committee members, which is to be extended to include other musicians of the body. This orchestra played several selections during the hour.

As other musical features Frances Lintott played two piano solos and Lyman Spencer sang two pleasing tenor solos.

The attendance prize was given by Irwin Brunn and was won by Walter Day, who was the closest guesser to the size of the shoes worn by five fellow members.

Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, the retiring president, spoke briefly of his appreciation of the cooperation given during the past year, and in reciting the club's achievements, together with his hopes for the future. He then planned the president's luncheon upon Napoleon Rice who is to take over the office of president the first of the year.

COOS-CURRY PHONE RATE CASE TO BE HEARD DEC. 30TH

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 28.—Oregon public service commission announces a hearing will be held in Marshfield December 30 on the application of Coos and Curry Telephone company to increase rates throughout the district. The Coos and Curry company is a subsidiary of the Bell Telephone company and if the application is granted it is believed here that it will be the basis for general advance in Oregon phone rates.

STATE AUTO TRUCK CASE IS BACK IN SUPREME COURT
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—The state of Oregon today asked the supreme court to decide on its merits the case brought by truck owners involving the validity of the orders of the state highway commission in limiting loads on state roads.

The case was dismissed several months ago because an order of the commission which was in question had been revoked. Later, however, other regulations were made effective and the truck companies asked that the case be reopened.

Attorney General Van Winkle in a brief filed today said Oregon wanted to have finally determined its authority over its highways and to have decided in the public interest the rights of the motor companies. He said that during the bad weather in the winter state highways were in danger of being injured by the hauling of the maximum load of 20,000 pounds which will become effective on January 1, next, and that it was necessary that the highway commission should have the right, under authority from the legislature to reduce this maximum to meet certain conditions.
